Message from Rabbi Karol

I first visited there in 1965, with a return visit in 1966. I can remember some confusion with streets the first time (don't worry, I wasn't driving!). My mom attended a national Hadassah convention there in 1966, and we stayed at the Sheraton Boston Hotel.

Yes, I still have photos from that trip, including views of the city from the top of the Prudential Center.

The then-Union of American Hebrew Congregations held its biennial convention in Boston in 2001, with sessions at the Hynes Convention Center. Rhonda and I attended as delegates from our congregation in Kansas. Across the street is one of the buildings of Berklee College of Music, where our son Adam attended, leading up to his May 8, 2008 graduation when Rhonda and I again stayed at the Sheraton Boston hotel. I wrote the song "Eitz Chayim," on my latest album, that night in our hotel room.

The Union for Reform Judaism returned to Boston for its 2017 Biennial Convention at the Hynes Convention Center. Our Temple Beth-El contingent included Rhonda and me and Ellen and Fred Torres. There was also an expanded Karol contingent: my brother, Rabbi Steve Karol, attended, as well as his daughter, Samantha Tananbaum, who now is a Social Media specialist at Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in New York City. We were joined by Adam, Juli and Joshua Karol, with Juli attending the biennial as a fifthyear rabbinic student.

Biennial participants included many, many people whom I knew from my years in high school, college, rabbinic school, and throughout my rabbinate.

For me, the conference began on December 6 with a biennial-sponsored "field trip" to the John F. Kennedy Library and Museum. Ruth Klepper (mother of Cantor Jeff Klepper, whose music we sing often), a docent at the JFK Library, spoke about a Torah scroll that was placed on display for our group. It had been presented to President Kennedy in 1961 by Rabbi Maurice Eisendrath of the UAHC, in a ceremony at the White House that coincided with the dedication of the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism. Freedom 7, the Mercury capsule in which Alan Shepard became the first American to fly in space, was on display, as well as the text of President Kennedy's inaugural address.

The learning sessions I attended touched upon a wide range of knowledge and expertise. During "Expect the Unexpected: New Insights from Diverse Jewish Sources," four professors from HUC-JIR offered brief lessons on why people turn to Psalms in times of crisis, the significance of medieval Jewish texts that mention or relate to Muhammed, the importance of minority opinions in Judaism, and how Judaism is intrinsically, and thankflully, a complex religion. In her talk on "Prophetic roots of modern Social Action," Dr. Andrea Weiss explored passages from ancient prophets that have relevance for our lives today. In "Music for a new reality," eight artists performed their new songs on the theme of

social justice. In "Taking a Stand," two HUC-JIR professors spoke about their projects that present religious viewpoints in a public forum. At the presentation on "When Hate Comes to Town," National Anti-Defamation League director Jonathan Greenblatt, along with Rabbi Tom Gutherz of Congregation Beth Israel in Charlottesville, VA, spoke about the demonstrations in Charlottesville in August 2017 and how they were handled by the congregation and community. They offered advice on how we should be vigilant in our communities if we face such a challenge. After speaking on Rosh Hashanah morning about Bruce Feiler's book, *The First Love Story: Adam, Eve and Us,* I thought it was only fitting to attend the Shabbat luncheon that featured the author speaking about this very book.

Speakers at the large plenary programs for all delegates included The Rev. William Barber II, Massachusetts Governor Charlie Baker, Massachusetts Senator Elizabeth Warren, and Israeli author David Grossman. They all spoke about the importance of building community in a way that encompasses many people of varying opinions, based upon a strong moral foundation that can foster integrity and respect.

It is difficult to convey what it's like to pray with 6,000 people. It is inspiring, and it works because the people who attended the biennial brought their own special enthusiasm and spirit from their home communities to those moments of worship, led by rabbis, cantors and a choir of "our peers." One special moment for me was sitting for a few minutes with our daughter-in-law Juli and grandson Josh. It was the first time I had been a grandfather sitting with family in a worship setting. Hopefully, there are many more experiences of sitting with family that are yet to come.

During one of my elevator rides up to our floor, a man next to me asked the woman in front of him to move in a way that was a bit abrupt. As she stepped back, I saw that it was Anat Hoffman, Executive Director of the Israel Religious Action Center and one of the leaders of Women of the Wall. As if to soften the words spoken to her, but also to express my own gratitude for her great work, I said, "We are so glad you are here."

And I realized that community needs to be about that sentiment. We have the opportunity to be glad for our shared participation in our community locally, and nationally, and around the world. Let us do what we can to strengthen our ties here, so that our congregation can add its vitality to the continuity of Jewish life.

I attended the Union for Reform Judaism's Biennial convention for the first time, and it was an amazing experience. With 6,000 other Jews from all over North America in attendance at Boston's Hynes Convention Center, I have to say it was the most audacious Jewish experience in which I have ever participated. I attended multiple ple-

nary sessions with outstanding keynote speakers—Reverend William Barber II and Senator Elizabeth Warren were especially charismatic. Their talks brought me to tears as they reminded us over and over again of our responsibility to the poor in our country, to those who need us the most, to our responsibility to support the progressive arm of our



political process. I attended numerous learning sessions focusing on Strengthening Congregations, and particularly the Emerging Leadership trainings. These sessions included: The Why and What of Today's Governance, Volunteers and How to Get Them and Keep Them, Consensus Decision-Making: How to Avoid the Meeting After the Meeting, Making Sense of the Future, and The Emerging Leaders Lunch Meeting with URJ's Debbie

Niederman and Lisa Barzilai, who wrote valuable leadership modules that we will be sharing with congregants in the near future. I also attended the URJ's Temple Presidents' Scheidt Alumni Breakfast Discussion. (You may remember that I attended the Scheidt Seminar for Temple Presidents in February 2017 in San Diego.) 

I've learned being a leader doesn't mean you sit in the front, talk the most, and run the show. Being a leader is about collaboration, patience, openness to perspectives not your own, flexibility, being reliable, inclusive, and so much more.

We all have leadership attributes, in some form or another, as evidenced when we collaborate with others, giving our time, talents, treasures and/or a combination of them all.

My journey from being an insecure wallflower with crooked teeth, covered in psoriasis, to the outspoken, supportive, roll up my sleeves, lead-by-example person I am today is due to my whole life's experiences-good and bad.

My need for spiritual fulfilment, the relationships resulting from involvement, and the example to my children, family, and friends, are the wonderful rewards for putting myself out there.

Thank you to the many of you who have played a role through shared collaborations, your patience, flexibility, reliability, perspective sharing, in shaping who I am today. We are all important!

These suggestions are only a sample of the wide spectrum of organizations, institutions and foundations that promote the best values in Israeli society and that are deserving of our support. They also afford us all the privilege of sharing in the defining event in the history of the Jewish people during our lifetimes.

Temple Oral History Project Training and Interviews

The History Committee will supervise a 2018 Temple oral history project. This might become part of a grant for which TBE is seeking Jewish Federation of Greater El Paso funding. We plan to work with TBE volunteers to conduct interviews even if we do not get the grant. History Committee members and volunteers would interview TBE members and others about the Temple's activities, members' involvement with TBE, and the Temple's impact on Las Cruces.

We will hold a training workshop and oral history interviews in January and conduct other interviews in February or March. If the grant is funded, the oral histories, along with other materials about TBE, would provide background for Dr. Wil Kilroy (NMSU Theatre Arts) to work in consultation with the Rabbi and Committee to develop a play about the Temple's history, aspects of Jewish life and culture, and the Jewish impact on Las Cruces. The play would be presented at NMSU in later 2018.

The training workshop will be from 1:00 to 2:30 pm on Sunday, January 21 in the TBE social hall. All members are welcome, no experience is necessary. Please bring your smart phone. Young people and students are especially encouraged to participate!

We invite TBE members to be interviewed in the social hall from 1:00 to 4:00 on Sunday, January 28.



Board of Trustees Meeting Summary—December 14, 2017

Rabbi Karol gave the invocation. The Rabbi and President Ellen Torres discussed their experiences at the Boston biennial. The Rabbi signed a contract for Robyn Helzner's presentation on January 22, 2018. Rabbi Karol has a chapter included in Honoring Tradition, Embracing Modernity (CCAR Press) and will attend the Pacific Association of Reform Rabbis convention in Palm Springs on January 7-11, 2018. TBE will have four bar/bat mitzvahs through June 2018, including Joshua Rosenberg on December 30, 2017. The Board approved the Rabbi's 2018 annual parsonage. Bill Soules and Joanne Ferrary may rent the social hall for a community forum in January. Temple Beth El/Social Action and the League of Women Voters of Greater Las Cruces are sponsoring a community forum on electoral issues at TBE on January 30.

Members discussed the budget. We will ask committee chairs to submit 2018-2019 budget requests well in advance of the congregational meeting. The Leadership group is discussing ways to seek to involve more Temple members in sacred leadership. The Board discussed storage shed policies and fund raising duties. The annual congregational Havdallah and dinner will be at 5:30 pm on Saturday, January 27. It has been renamed "Erev Simcha-Evening of Joy." Ann Berkson had previously stated her decision to resign from the Board. Thank you for your service, Ann! The Board appointed Stu Fleischman to the Board, and he was named Treasurer. Jennifer Blazer will remain our bookkeeper.

Allen Blum introduced Nicole Martinez from the Community of Hope, our partners in the golf tournament. We gave a check to the Community for its role. Nicole anticipated having 34 to 35 residents at the annual Christmas breakfast. Leora Zeitlin and Amalia Zeitlin discussed annual BETY/BEMY activities and the Youth Committee's finances. The Board noted that the new telephone system has been completed. The History Committee rescheduled its oral history training to Sunday, January 21, 2018 from 1:00 to 2:30 p.m. in the temple social hall, and it will hold an oral history interviewing session on Sunday, January 28, 2018 from 1:00 to 4:00. The Library computer system has been fixed. The Strategic Planning Committee is forming and will begin meeting in January, 2018.




