
Temple Beth El is proud to present noted Tony award winning playwright, screenwriter, filmmaker, director, actor and professor

Message from Rabbi Karol

At this writing, I am about to lead the Shabbat service that features the Torah reading VAYEITZEI, which opens with the patriarch Jacob's dream at Beth-El. This passage is often on our minds and right before our eyes when we attend services. The Neir

Tamid in our Sanctuary places the ladder/stairway in front of us every week, uniting the symbolism of light with a connection between heaven and earth.

The rabbis imagined Jacob to be somewhat hesitant to step onto the ladder because of the risk of failing to rise to the top. In one midrash, God showed Jacob how the great powers of the world (represented by the angels going up and down the ladder) would rise and fall, while the children of Jacob would not suffer the same fate. In those rabbinic interpretations, we never see Jacob taking the step onto the ladder, at least not at that point. In Genesis Chapter 28, Jacob essentially declared that if God took care of all of his needs and saw him through his coming challenges and adventures, then Jacob would fully believe in God. Such a conditional approach has bothered some commentators, but it demonstrates Jacob's humanity. Even making such a pledge was still a commitment to a future relationship, which only would be fulfilled if Jacob continued on his journey to find a wife and to create and raise a family. We know, from the end of the story, that Jacob did act out of his own initiative without waiting for God to do everything for him.

Worship in most any context is a lot like Jacob's relationship with God. The words, the melodies, and the possibility of community are always there, waiting for us to take an active participatory step to make prayers and expressions of belief, commitment, joy, and hope come alive. The generations before us provided us rituals, symbols and an order of a service that reminds us of the wonder of creation, the gift of wisdom, and the trust that can lead us to a sense of security and optimism as members of the Jewish community and of the family of humanity. The Siddur/prayerbook expresses gratitude to our ancestors for establishing a foundation for our community and to God for sharing with us the strength to reach out to others to provide them with freedom, care and support. We focus on aspects of life that are holy and unique that we might consider to be miracles even when we have created them with our own knowledge and insight. We say "thank you" for everything we have and we pray that peace will finally come to our world and encompass all of humanity and all of creation.

The ways in which we express ourselves vary from week to week on Friday night and Saturday morning. On the first Friday of the month, our 6:00 pm Family Service features the central prayers of our liturgy in a relaxed family setting that is open to members of all ages. A potluck Shabbat dinner follows that brings the generations together in Shabbat

joy. The second service on the first Friday is an equally relaxed service that gives congregants a chance to take part in a discussion on an aspect of the weekly Torah portion with the goal of finding lessons for modern life. The "middle Fridays" of the month usually feature a Torah reading with a brief D'var Torah that expresses my current thoughts on the meaning we can derive from the ancient text. On the last Shabbat of the month, the "Shabbat Service for Renewal of Spirit" brings readings and music together to create a context that gives us a sense of peace and healing that can continue to guide us in the coming days. This service will again be preceded by a time for meditation, led by David Fishman, on December 26 at 7:00 pm.


Shabbat morning services are our most informal, with an opportunity for those present to share "miracles" in our lives, to engage in an in-depth discussion of the Torah portion for the week, and to sing and read prayers that we might not hear on Friday evening. When we reach our minyan of 10, we read Torah and still engage in a lively conversation about the text that has been handed down to us over the centuries.

We are now looking forward to our celebration of Chanukah, which begins on Tuesday, December 16. We know well that the Chanukiah/Menorah does not light itself. It needs us to put in the candles and kindle each light so that the glow will inspire us to new acts of preserving freedom and justice for all people. Think of our Shabbat worship like a Chanukiah. When we are here, together, the light from our souls will shine brightly and there will be a special spirit emanating from our Sanctuary, creating a stairway/ladder to lofty places. Each of us can be like Jacob, making it possible to see that "God was in this place, and I, I did not know it."

Best wishes for a happy Chanukah, with a hope that we will all find the light that is at the core of our lives and our souls.


young children to be donated to Jardin de Los Ninos. It's always nice to be able to care for those in need.



ISRAEL UPDATE WHY PEACE CHALLENGES THE PALESTINANS by Phil Alkon

Deadly terrorist attacks on Jews in Jerusalem days ago this time by means of cars, knives and axes - once again raise the Israeli-Palestinian conflict to headline status. As if we needed another flare-up of this 100-year war so soon after the latest round with Hamas and Islamic Jihad in Gaza. Here I consider the underlying roots of this seemingly intractable and incurable "disease." Yes, for well over 100 years - long before the Zionist movement was formalized and Israel became a reality - Jewish attempts to establish a homeland in Eretz Yisrael have met with the nearly universal opposition of the Arab World. This was true of the Arab populations of Southern Syria, as geographic Palestine was recognized by Ottoman and Arab leaders. Ironically it was "Jewish encroachment on sacred Arab land" that gave birth to Palestinian Arab national identity. Unfortunately, these new Palestinians retain the very same dysfunctional attributes that dominate the Moslem Middle East: a set of values and behaviors that allow no accommodation with real or self-created enemies. That's what really underlies this pernicious disease.

The Palestinians share three crippling socio/political handicaps with their Arab brethren. The first is a culture of self-identity rooted in hatred of the "others." This world-view extends from families, clans and tribes, to entire religious communities and peoples. It is a deeply embedded syndrome that relies on enemies to justify one's own existence, to reflexively blame others for one's problems, and to avoid responsibility for improving one's condition. The mandate of every Palestinian national and political movement to date is framed in terms of enmity to Israel and the Jews, and to act accordingly. Whether it is the PLO and Fatah of the West Bank, or Hamas and Islamic Jihad of Gaza fame, you will search their "constitutions" in vain for any goals or program that seek social, economic political or spiritual progress. Hurting Jews and Israel trumps self-reliance and self-improvement

A second symptom of the malaise is the inability of the Arab Moslem world to accept the sovereignty of other peoples within their exclusive domain. This perspective allows for no nationhood for Kurds, Arab Christians, or any other of the varied ethnic and religious cultures that have shaped the history and present character of the Middle East. It is not surprising that Israel represents an anathema to Moslem Arab sensibilities, and especially to the Palestinians of former southern Syria. Even the "moderate" Palestinian Authority (of PLO and Fatah lineage) continues to educate its people that the Jews have no historical connection or present claim on their sacred Palestinian soil. It must be especially difficult for them to consider that Israel has emerged as the only civil and functional society in "their" world.

A third manifestation is the issue of religion itself. The toxic form of extreme Islam that has taken hold of Arab cultural and political mores threatens the future of the Middle East and endangers many of its communities, Moslem and otherwise. Given Islam's checkered relationship with the

Jews, and the exclusive sacredness of much of the Middle East, the notion of a regional Jewish state has hardly been welcomed by the Moslem establishment. Two of the Palestinians' three political movements (Hamas and Islamic Jihad) are founded in Islamist core beliefs promoting jihad, violence against Jews and the replacement of Israel by an Islamic state. Has anyone heard a single call by any Palestinian Moslem cleric for peace and understanding between Arabs and Jews? Please let me know.

A psychosomatic aspect of the Arab conflict comprises an array of contradictory attitudes and behaviors that I call an intellectual disconnect syndrome. One of its manifestations is the notion of veracity as a flexible concept and practice. For example, President Mahmoud Abbas of the Palestinian Authority earnestly espouses in English the cause of peace with Israel to eagerly attentive Western visitors. Hours later, in Arabic, he extols the terrorist murderers of Israeli citizens to cheering Palestinians as he dedicates yet another West Bank street to those exemplary Fatah or Hamas martyrs. Another manifestation of the syndrome is self-delusion. The Arab claim to "ownership" of Palestine is founded on the sincere conviction that any historic Jewish connections with Eretz Yisrael are invalid or non-existent. In other words, authentic "ownership" of the Middle East begins with the birth of Islam and the Arab Conquest. Yet another disconnect is the inability to accept a linkage between hostile provocations on the one hand, and their consequences on the other. In the latest round of Gaza fighting, Hamas and many Gaza residents expressed outrage that missile and tunnel attacks against Israel could possibly result in military responses by the IDF. I have yet to hear any Palestinian leader draw the conclusion that the Palestinians' present condition is a consequence of the war that they have chosen to wage against Israel and the Jewish people over many decades.

Given these fundamental challenges, why do I retain some optimism regarding Israel-Palestinian relations? First, Israelis strongly favor a workable two-state peace settlement. Second, Palestinians possess a huge untapped potential for positive creative endeavors. Finally, Israelis and Palestinians may be increasingly drawn together in confronting common external threats. I also believe that realization of Palestinian potential and peace with Israel are inseparable. Both require that Palestinians liberate themselves from a sick culture that defines them in terms of enmity to others, rather than as drivers of a positive future for themselves. They create and nurture a leadership founded on self-reliance and responsibility. With Israel as a peaceful neighbor and partner, the Palestinians can begin to build a progressive, civil society that would serve as a model for Arab governance in the Middle East.


