Rubin. The riveting radio series *The Hidden Jews of New Mexico*”, first heard on NPR, revealed moving stories of present-day descendants of New



Message from Rabbi Karol
Rabbi's Remarks at Annual Meeting on
May 22, 2014

Baruch Atah Adonai Eloheinu Melech Haolam Shehecheyanu V'kiy'manu V'higiyanu lazman hazeh. Blessed are You, Eternal One, our God, Ruler of the Universe, who has kept us

alive, sustained us, and brought us to this time.

I know that's a prayer that we usually say when we're starting something new. I do think we understand that every ending is also a new beginning. We will demonstrate that with this meeting tonight which gives us a chance to look back and to look forward as well.

This is my third annual message at Temple Beth-El, and my 30th since I became the rabbi at my own congregation. It's always a challenge to try to summarize or measure a year in just a few moments. The concept of "measuring a year" is prominent in the lyrics of the song from the musical "Rent," "Seasons of Love." Through the language of our prayers, we do measure a year in daylights and sunsets. With our Wednesday Breakfasts, Oneg Shabbat receptions after services, and the spreads that follow our well-attended Adult Education events, we do measure a year in cups of coffee. With our new brick walkway and biblical garden, we will mark past and future celebrations and hold close our memories of loved ones, measuring in inches the size of each brick, the length of the walkway itself, and the specifications of the remainder of the project. We measure a year in laughter in the course of programs and conversations, and especially on Purim. I do have to admit that we measure years in strife, but the meditation that I often say before a meeting declares, "O God, may our controversies be for Your sake." We know that some of the best solutions emerge even from disagreement or argument as long as we remember that we are on the same team. The chorus of that song from "Rent" suggests that we should measure our years in love. And whether we admit it or not, we do just that when smiles are exchanged across the generations, when we celebrate life milestones, and when we remember loved ones who have died in our hearts and minds, and in the presence of friends and family. We measure in love when we open our building to the Las Cruces community for five hours on a Sunday in the Spring, relishing the chance to welcome our many guests with the sacred symbols of our bimah, and the Tree of Life in the Social Hall as the backdrop for a wide variety of Jewish foods that people in our area crave. When I went to Milagro Coffee to pick up bagels for our April 26 study session, the man who checked me out told me that he needed to pick up his Silent Auction prize. I thanked him for coming to the Jewish Food and Folk Festival, and he said, "I am from New Jersey, I had to come – where else could I have gotten Jewish food like that in Las Cruces?" It was a *m'chayeh* to witness the love and care at the heart of baking sessions, committee meetings, silent auction prize collection, gathering materials for the children's area, very colorful tickets, and a very high-tech grid for worker sign-up. We learned some lessons that day like "you can never have too much pastrami," and

"it's very important to pray for good weather" – I suppose that was my department. Mainly, we learned that in our own Jewish culinary field of dreams, "if you offer it, they will come." Those out-the-door lines may have been a surprise to many of you, but for Rhonda and me, as we watched the constant stream of people coming in, we remembered many years of a similar sight in one of our previous congregations, which was actually doing its similar fundraiser that same day this year. Here at TBE, the JFFF was successful and enjoyable because of you. Under the leadership of Rebecca Berkson and Aggie Saltman, you banded together, took your best wisdom from past fundraising experience, brainstormed new ideas, got lots of members involved in one way or another, and you did it. The JFFF photo album on the table in the entry foyer contains pictures of the many, many happy faces of our neighbors, community leaders, first-time visitors, and, especially, of us – the Temple Beth-El family. In the Torah reading for this week, God commanded the Israelites to take a census of the community. Had we taken a Temple census that day, we would have found most of our congregation right here in this space. Everyone who attended counted and contributed in some way. Thank you all, and please remember that we will need you and want you to count and contribute your energy, your hospitality and even your love again next year!

And that is what we should strive for in all of our programming at Temple Beth-El: to make our time together a season not only of God keeping us alive and sustaining us, but a season of love. This week's Torah reading about taking a census teaches us that counting every person should guide us to value everyone who comes through our door, including newcomers, congregants and community members. Our programs and events should be as open as possible, and if a limit is necessary due to space, our creativity can guide us in offering an acceptable alternative to demonstrate that we truly care.

And caring about each person who counts isn't just about those who come here. It extends to our work in the community. Our tradition teaches us to be advocates for fairness and justice for everyone so that each person will have a feeling of dignity and prosperity. Two years of offering a December 25 breakfast at Camp Hope, and many years of serving at El Caldito and giving to Casa de Peregrinos and to other agencies, are among the ways in which we make a difference. The prophets of ancient times and the Reform Rabbis of 130 years ago would encourage us to go even further. At our program on "Work, Wage, Justice and the Economy" this past Sunday, I read this quote from the 1885 Pittsburgh Platform of the Reform movement: "In full accordance with the spirit of the Mosaic legislation, which strives to regulate the relations between rich and poor, we deem it our duty to participate in the great task of modern times, to solve, on the basis of justice and righteousness, the problems presented by the contrasts and evils of the present organization of society." President's Message
President's Annual Report
May 22, 2014

Anyone who has worked on a patch-work quilt knows the individual squares are nice but until they're put together do we see the beauty in the final result. I see us as the same, individually we can accomplish things but working together we can accomplish beautiful things: much that is meaningful and worthwhile.

The last two years we heard serious reports about the financial health of our Congregation, but as a group you came forward to ease the pain. Starting with the Fair Share Campaign initiated by our previous board, thankfully, many families raised their dues. We then went forward with ideas for fund raising that would include the greater Las Cruces community as well as ourselves.

The Golf Tournament led by Arthur Berkson, Mark Saltman and Michael Stowe netted close to \$5000.00. From there we had a mini-campaign in house, suggested by Elissa Poel, to sell leaves for the tree in the social hall for a reduced price. That netted us \$1752.00. Our greatest accomplishment came next, when so many of you took part in the Jewish Food and Folk Festival. You heard the call and you were there. Under the leadership of Rebecca Berkson and Aggie Saltman, we enjoyed the camaraderie of working together. This event brought in people from Las Cruces and vicinity as well as El Paso. We had much positive feedback and with a bit of tweaking, we can make it bigger and better for next year. That event netted us \$12,000, for a grand total of \$18,752. We are now in the process of working on our brick project. You probably noticed the beginning of the path as you came in the front door this evening. Many of you have already purchased bricks and we hope others will do so as well. So you can see that we did not just sit back, we stepped up to the plate when we were faced with a challenge. Now, I'm asking you to keep your eyes and ears open for new ideas to share with us for fundraising.

Not everything was positive. We also did some cutting of resources to reach our goal, such as secretarial help and landscape services. We are relying on volunteers, including the Rabbi, to do the job.

As of now, I'm happy to report that we are financially ahead of last year at this time, which will be evident in Bill Stein's report. However, this doesn't mean that we sit back and do nothing. Many of the building and grounds projects have been put on the back burner. The time has come to work on some of those projects and that takes money. So, we need to continue to pay our dues faithfully and work on fund raising. We did it this year and I have faith that we

will continue to work together for the sake of the congregation and for future generations.

Beyond our fund raising accomplishments, we can be proud of many other things. For example, our building is always buzzing with activities. Our Wednesday Breakfast attracts many people from what I've been told - work prevents me from attending. Sisterhood is thriving, the Mensch Club keeps us aware of many things with their movie offerings. The Adult Education Committee presents varied programs that have filled our sanctuary or social hall. Our Religious School is very productive. The Social Action committee has been active and now our Religious Practices committee is starting to plan for the high holidays. Our Shabbat services are well attended and the Rabbi has offered many adult education classes. We can also be proud of our new web site which is up and running thanks to Bob Kimball. All other committees are doing well.

As I've said before, you are all important to us. So give yourself a little pat on the back for being a part of our patch-work quilt.



The Jewish Cemetery in Berlin, Weissensee. Please join us on Sunday, June 29 at 2:00 P.M. at Temple Beth-El for a documentary on the Jewish cemetery in Berlin. It will

be introduced by Klim Maling, briefly describing some of the Jewish sites in Berlin, Germany which he visited courtesy of the Berlin Senate.

"The Jewish cemetery in Berlin is the biggest in Europe. It was established in 1880 and amazingly, it survived the Nazi and the East German regimes, becoming a nature preserve in the process. For a while it became the only place where Jewish children could play in peace. It has over a hundred thousand graves and some magnificent mausolea. Since reunification of the two Germanies the work of taming the wilderness and restoring the funery materials has succeeded. A video 'In Heaven and below Ground' narrates the very human stories of families visiting the graves of their ancestors and the people involved in the work and administration. There is even a scene where the Jewish military fallen are honored jointly by Israeli and Bundeswehr units."

**ISRAEL UPDATE: THE WINDING TRAIL
OF ISRAEL NEWS -by Phil Alkon**

Some 30 years ago, a well-travelled British philosopher visiting the country for the first time, remarked that Israel was the most complex society and political entity on Earth. I'm reminded of that whenever I try to create a coherent, rational and reasonably understandable summary of current events in Eretz Yisrael for this monthly newsletter. It really amounts to mission impossible, but here goes again.

News item number one was the grinding halt of the most recent U.S. attempt to achieve a mutually agreeable solution to the Israel-Palestinian conflict. Many of us vividly recall events surrounding and following the creation of Israel in 1948; but the conflict actually dates back and encompasses some 150 years, with the emergence of modern Zionism and leading to the League of Nations Mandate for the establishment of a Jewish homeland in Palestine following WWI. At that time, the notion "Palestine" as a nation was associated solely with historic Jewish aspirations. In Arab eyes, this patch of land had long been considered as a province of Greater Syria. The apparent failure has been widely attributed to both sides: i.e., Israeli refusal of Palestinian Authority (PA) terms for a third release of Palestinian terrorists (i.e., admitted murderers of Israeli citizens); and PA reunification with jihadist Hamas of Gaza. More on the underlying reasons below.

A second, seemingly separate major event was the conviction of former Israeli PM Ehud Olmert for bribery-related corruption charges while in office. His steep 6-year prison sentence was characterized as a warning to public servants, even to those at the pinnacle of power, to stick to the straight and narrow. Although Olmert's lapses justifiably embarrassed Israel and its friends, some commentators in the Arab world expressed admiration that the Zionist enemy actually punishes anointed leaders for crimes against ordinary individuals and society.

It is worth remembering that PM Olmert played a major role in a previous U.S. brokered peace initiative with the Palestinians only eight years ago. At the famous failed Annapolis negotiations, Olmert agreed to: sharing Jerusalem as a joint capital with a Palestinian Arab state, mutual exchanges of land between Israel and Palestine, transfer of all Jerusalem holy sites to an international authority, Israeli acceptance of 10,000 Palestinian refugees and generous monetary compensation for the others, a corridor connecting the West Bank and Gaza, and U.S. security guarantees for both sides. Olmert also endorsed a peace plan promoted by the Arab League to end the state of war between Israel and its neighbors. In the end, however, Palestinian leader Abbas did not agree to peace with Israel, and thereby did not preside over the creation of the first Palestinian Arab state in history.

Unfortunately, when it comes to peace with Israel and a state of their own, the Palestinians have never missed

an opportunity to miss an opportunity. Had they and the Arab world accepted the UN Partition plan of 1947, an Arab state of Palestine could have existed since 1948. Moreover, agreement then would have ensured a much more expansive Arab state than could possibly be achieved now. Most importantly, perhaps, had they decided to view Israel and the Jews as partners in progress, rather than as enemies, an Arab Palestine could have emerged as a much needed model for civil and progressive society in the Arab Middle East.

A third seemingly separate but connected news item. A recent Anti-Defamation League survey reveals that the highest global levels of anti-Semitism exist in the Arab Middle East, crowned by a 93 percent level of Jew hatred held by the residents of the West Bank and Gaza. Of course, it would also be insightful to measure the extent of hatred that occurs among different segments of the Arab world itself, where most victims of Arab Muslim intolerance are Arabs themselves. It's not a very neighborly part of the world, with or without Jews. One might even argue that fallback Middle East view of "progress" has more to do with hurting your enemies than with improving your own condition. Is this why even the best intentioned efforts on behalf of peace and understanding in the region have yet to gain traction?

Finally, the Arabs of the West Bank and Gaza commemorated el-Naqba ("the Catastrophe") on the same date in May that Jews around the world celebrated Israel Independence Day. The cause for Jewish celebration is apparent. After two millennia of diaspora, encompassing humiliation, persecution and physical destruction, the Jewish people restored a promised homeland in the face of overwhelming odds. The sad fate of the many Palestinian Arabs that fled, never to return, is also a compelling and poignant story. But in my jaundiced view, their self proclaimed "Catastrophe" has less to do with displacement of people in the wake of war - not a rare event in the Middle East past or present - but with the fact that Israel survived despite the unquestioned certainty that the glorious Arab armies, abetted by many locals, would eliminate the hated enemy once and for all. In addition to unbearable psychological humiliation borne of military defeat by a handful of Jews, the subsequent treatment of the Palestinian refugees at the hands of their own Arab "brothers" constitutes the real catastrophe. About, 700,000 Palestinian Arabs left Israel at its founding, and they and their descendants have remained "refugees" in much of the Arab world to the present day. Even parts of Palestine captured by the invading Arab armies were annexed (the West Bank by Transjordan) or run as an occupied colony (the Gaza strip by Egypt. By contrast, the tens of thousands of Arabs who chose to remain in Israel at the time are full-fledged Israeli citizens, comprise nearly 20 percent of the country's population, and can even freely call themselves Palestinians if they wish.

bricks ordered for this first shipment because if we have 100 bricks, we avoid paying shipping (and you can imagine what shipping is for bricks!) The orders will be checked for accuracy and on June 15th, off they go.

Many of you have already seen the beginning walkway on the East side of the Temple, and the contemplation area is being worked on now. But wait until you see it with bricks that speak of events, people, and activities important to members of our congregation and our larger community.

We want you all to be part of this effort. So if you want a brick and just haven't figured out what size, whom you wish to honor, how you want to write it, or how to make out the check, we can help! Just call and we will help you put it together. Forms are available at the Temple, or through the Walkway committee members.

And thank you to all who have already discovered how satisfying it is to know that your memories are etched in stone. There will be many more opportunities to add more bricks in the years ahead because this is an ongoing project. This is just the first phase, but we want you to be part of it!



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

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
