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# Message from Rabbi Karol

In my service to Temple Beth-El and to the community, I have found that both ordinary days and special events teach important lessons about what is important in life. We all have causes and activities about which we are passionate. Bringing people together for commemoration, prayer, song or study are among

the passions that drive my involvement in congregational programs and local events.

• On April 7, I sang Passover songs and folk songs at the Las Cruces Public Schools Advanced Pre-School (where Rhonda teaches), including Dayenu and Puff, the Magic Dragon!





• On April 8, my talk to the Wednesday Breakfast group on "Passover and Religious Freedom" examined the place of Jews in American society in 1780-1820 and focused on the correspondence between President George Washington and Jewish congregations and other religious communities.

• On April 12, during our Religious School Chugim

(Special Interest groups) Day, I had a chance to sing with several of our students rather than a large group. That session has laid the



groundwork for more participation by Temple students in music in Temple worship and events.



• On April 16, I spoke at the White Sands Missile Range Holocaust Commemoration on this year's national theme: "Learning from the Holocaust: Choosing to Act." In my remarks, I shared

some insightful excerpts from Menachem Rosensaft's new book, God, Faith and Identity from the Ashes: Reflections of Children and Grandchildren of Holocaust Survivors.

On April 22, our Hebrew School students, joined by other congregants as well, marked the beginning of Yom Haatzmaut-



Israel Independence Day. We had a candlelighting cere-

mony with readings from *Mishkan T'filah* and concluded, after singing Hatikvah, with a joyous hora to "Hava Nagilah"!

• On April 26, many of us were present at the Second Annual Jewish Food and Folk Festival. Kudos to Rebecca Berkson, Aggie Saltman, other JFFF committee

members and all of our volunteers for a j o b w e 11 done!!!! Our choir, now



called "Kolot Bamidbar/Voices of the Desert," was intergenerational for the first time, providing a strong sound for songs about peace, love, hope, cooperation, and celebration! • On April 30, I offered the opening prayer at the New Mexico State University Memorial Service to pay tribute to faculty, staff, students and alumni who have died over the last year. My prayer included sentiments reminiscent of our own meditations before the Kaddish: "There are friends, family members, classmates, teachers, companions, who walked with us, who helped us, who provided us with wisdom, who enabled us to put new life lessons into perspective. We learned with them. We laughed with them. We may have even cried with them. And we relied on them as they renewed our confidence, refreshed our strength, and restored our hope. And now they leave a legacy to us that will remain and become a part of who we are and who we will be. May their souls be bound up in the bond of all life "

All of those events had their own unique significance and meaning, and it was an honor to join with other community members for celebration, reflection, discussion, and edification. Everyone who attended those gatherings came with their own passion and personal motivation that engendered a feeling of warmth and unity

Every week, there are two times that we gather for celebration, reflection, discussion and edification. Shabbat services, both evening and morning, offer us an opportunity to bring our best selves to Temple, to add our voices to prayer and song, and to contribute our own special spirit to our collective congregational soul. It is your presence that makes each service what it is and makes us who we are as a congregation. I look forward to seeing you soon!

Another change we would like to make is to revert Article 12 Section 1 back to

its original wording which was changed in May of 2010. The current wording reads : Affiliated organizations are organizations in the Temple itself that bear the name of the Temple and/or are under the auspices of the Temple. Examples of eligible organizations are women's auxiliary/sisterhood, men's group/brotherhood and youth groups. 5 years ago this line was added: Membership in Temple Beth-El will be required for all members of affiliated organizations. We would like to strike (eliminate) this last line.

This will make us a more welcoming community.

This is almost the end of my tenure as President, It has been a fascinating and rewarding experience, As this past week has shown, we can come together as a community and work together for the betterment of our congregation.

I want to thank the Board of Trustees for their hours of dedication to the Temple. I've enjoyed working with everyone. Good luck to the new board for 2015-2016.

### <u>ISRAEL UPDATE</u>

### SOME IMPRESSIONS OF ISRAEL by Phil Alkon

First time visitors to Israel invariably express surprise, and often admiration, at the reality of Israel- the land, the nation and the people - as compared to their preconceived expectations, perhaps more so than any other place on Earth. But for those of us who have previously lived in Israel for any length of time, a return visit represents a bit of a challenge. Why? Because much about Israel has and continues to change at a more rapid pace than any other place we have ever experienced. You can be sure of alterations, modifications and even transformations, but in what ways and how profound? Should we have accepted the axiom that 'you really can't go home'?

That's why Sally and I felt trepidation as well as some hopeful anticipation before our recent brief return to the Promised Land following a 7-year separation. I made my first visit to Israel as an adult in 1964; followed by a honeymoon trip with Sally in 1967. We lived in Israel from 1968 to 1971 while doing my dissertation field research; and returned for a 20-year hitch as faculty member with Ben-Gurion University beginning in 1978. Since settling in Las Cruces in 1998, we've visited Israel in 2000, 2002, 2005 and 2008, culminating in our recent 2-week stay this April. All in all, our Israel experience has spanned over five decades, has enabled us to absorb much about its history and character, has shaped our professional experience, and has served as the framework for our sons' (Danny and Aviel) education and maturation, including combat service in the IDF. It has also enabled us to share a big part of our lives with close family members, including many with deep roots in Eretz Israel.

In a nutshell, our recent stay encompassed many visits with family, friends and colleagues; planning some collaborative research; excursions in Tel-Aviv-Jaffa, Beersheva, Netanya, Jerusalem, the Coastal plain, Lower Galilee, and the Negev. Our visit was during Passover and Easter, and just followed the Israeli elections. There was much to see and do in only two weeks.

Well, what did we find? Describing our varied experiences and responses would be far easier verbally than in writing, and I hope to do that as well. In fact, I expect to devote two forthcoming Wednesday Breakfast Club sessions to our trip: one as a spoken commentary (on May 20<sup>th</sup>) and the other as a pictorial slide show (TBA). Meanwhile, let me leave you with a few lasting impressions.

The visit was memorable. This is not surprising, given that Israel remains an exceptionally intense, varied and colorful country in so many respects. It also remains the subject of unending external and internal pressures of which Israelis are very much aware.

On a personal level, our trepidations about physical changes were partially realized. Municipal areas have grown dramatically, including Tel-Aviv, Netanya, Beersheva and Jerusalem. High-rise buildings now dominate areas of Tel-Aviv, and the greatly increased density of cars makes parking there a heroic challenge. Concurrently, the country's highway system has been transformed. Former modest lanes and roads are supplanted by divided superhighways that facilitate speed and heavy traffic, but make it much harder to appreciate and connect with the surrounding countryside. All in all, it took us about three days of fretting to acknowledge and partially acclimate to these undesirable signs of "progress."

What of the positive side of the ledger? The longer we stayed, the more we began to appreciate the surprising extent to which beloved aspects of Israeli life and landscape have endured and actually improved, even without our help, if you can imagine that! In fact, my strongest overall impression is that Israel today is more robust, vibrant and prosperous than ever. Following the recent election, which resulted in a rather unclear outcome and again displayed Israel's nearly impossible political system, the country remains a lively, cantankerous and strong democracy. Watching comedians on Israeli TV skewer politicians of all stripes makes SNL, Jon Stewart, et al., seem mild and amateurish by comparison. Israeli's print and broadcast media remains vigorously opinionated and chronically hostile to "establishment" figures and institutions.

A few other facets of Israeli life that caught my attention:

- The great expansion of the Israeli Arab population as evidenced by the growth of Arab towns and cities in western Galilee, Wadi Ara and near Jerusalem; and of Bedouin communities in the Negev. Given the quality of new housing, mosques and other infrastructure, the Arab population appears to be prospering. Israeli Arabs also are taking a more active role in national politics.
- The retention of large areas of agricultural and natural open spaces in much of the country, a gratifying effort at preventing urban sprawl in the face of increased housing, industrial and infrastructure development. Much of the industrial growth reflects the prominent role of hi-tech companies rather than dirty manufacturing.
- That I heard so little about last summer's war with Hamas reinforced my faith in the incredible resilience of the Is-raeli people. Challenges that would easily destroy or fa-tally distort other societies are met on a daily basis, not by stoic robots, but by a very human and vulnerable assemblage of people. Have the centuries of persecution and displacement pre-adapted Jews to endure and thrive in their own land despite the huge obstacles? And even relish the experience.

I look forward to sharing much more of what we experienced in Israel in upcoming Wednesday breakfast meetings. I also am eager to hear your questions, criticisms and opinions regarding my take on the miraculous saga of today's Israel. Page 10


In order to ensure that the name of your loved one will be recited during services, we have instituted the following practices:
