Message from Rabbi Karol

"Why do we always make a paper chain to decorate our Sukkah?"

Sarah was an inquisitive and precocious nine year-old. She was always drawing, painting, questioning, and singing. The arts were her best mode of expression. She liked soccer, too. And baseball. Somehow, though, as Sukkot was coming once

again, she was thinking about how to make this year's paper chain for the Sukkah even longer than last year.

She always joined in on the fun. In her small Temple, even when there were only 20 students in her Religious School, there was a friendly competition between one group of children and another. Once they all had completed their work of carefully curling the paper segments and stapling or taping them together, admiring their miraculous work, they would

join their separate chains together. What had been a series of long chains became one mega-mega chain.



Before they attached it to the Sukkah, they extended it to its fullest length. The rabbi and some of the parents would stand by, snapping pictures of the children brimming with pride at their work.

Sarah asked her parents why they thought this "paper-chain Sukkah decoration" was so popular. They told her that they remembered doing this themselves "back in the day." It was fun, and no one had told them why they did the activity, other than that it was easy to prepare, it took time, and it occupied the students for a while. And, of course, the result was always impressive.

So Sarah decided to ask the rabbi what the paper chain meant.

The day came for putting up the Sukkah and making decorations. She found the rabbi in his office before the program began, preparing for the service in the Sukkah later that afternoon.

"Rabbi, we always make paper chains to put on the Sukkah. Why do we do it?

I know that it adds some color, and that it is a fun thing to do. There has to be some other reason to make the chain."

The rabbi had never been asked the question before. He had, for many years, in several different congregations, watched the students in each Temple Religious School create construction paper-strip chains of 30 feet, 50 feet, 70 feet. He realized that he hadn't thought about a deeper purpose...that is, not until now.

"Sarah, that is an excellent question. No one has ever put that question to me. I suppose it is because it is easy to set up and you all have so much fun doing it. You are so excited when you are finished, and you hang the chain on the Sukkah with incredible enthusiasm! You know, the chain doesn't always make it through the whole week of Sukkot, due to wind and rain. It always looks great, though, on the first day."



"So here is what I think. Do you remember, Sarah, when we took out the miniature Torah and unrolled it last year during our school assembly before Simchat Torah?"

"Yes, I do!" Sarah said. "You pointed out some of the special sections on the scroll, like the Shema, the special blessing of the priests, the Ten Commandments, the song the Israelites sang after crossing the sea, the dream of Jacob, and the story of creation. That was great. So what does that have to do with a paper chain?"

"Sarah, sometimes I talk at services when a boy or girl becomes Bar or Bat Mitzvah about a chain of the Jewish people and our tradition," the rabbi explained." Each link in the paper chain can represent a generation in your family history, or maybe special people that you recall. The chain can signify your own family story going back for centuries. It's the same when we open up the Torah. We usually just read a little bit of the Torah every week. When we open up the Torah on Simchat Torah, and see it all at once, we realize that we are

part of an amazing tale of teaching, learning and survival. It is like the paper chain, demonstrating

every point in a ever-growing story. The blessing we say on holidays and at special times thanks God for keeping us alive, for sustaining us, and bringing us to special times. Each time we say that blessing, it's like a link in the chain. Do you have anyone special that you think about from your family history, Sarah, someone whom you never met but about whom you have heard stories?"

"Rabbi, I heard that my great-grandmother Surah - I was named for her - came to this country all alone on a boat nearly 100 years ago. She was only 15. She did have an aunt and uncle waiting for her when she arrived, but I can't imagine how she made that trip. She must have been brave. The rest of her family - two sisters, a brother, and her parents - joined

her, too. It is because of her that we are here. You know, we even have a photo of her with her son and daughter-in-law my grandparents - and her oldest grandchild - my mother - at the synagogue Sukkah."

"See, Sarah, that photo you just described to me is also one link in the chain of your family story and in our ever-unfolding Jewish history. Our stories make each of us special. So, are you ready to make a new chain this year?"

"Yes, rabbi, am I ever!" Sarah exclaimed.

She joined the other children and got to work on making the longest paper-chain Sukkah decoration ever created.

This time, she added something new. She took one paper strip, found the nearest marker, and wrote the name "Surah."

And she said to herself, "I am still here, great-grandma. This one is for you."



I would like to invite you to join our next short story group as we read "Fools," by Joan Silber. Our first session will begin on **Monday**, **Oct. 8 at 10 a.m.** in the social hall and contin-



ue Mondays for six weeks. The paperback version is widely available at Amazon and other places.

Silber has written seven books of fiction, including *The Size of the World* (finalist for *Los Angeles Times* Fiction Prize), *Ideas of Heaven* (finalist for the National Book Award) and *Household Words* (winner of the PEN/Hemingway Award). Her stories have appeared in *The New Yorker* and *The O. Henry Prize Stories*. She lives in New York and teaches at Sarah Lawrence College. She won the 2017 National Book Critics Circle Award in Fiction and the 2018 PEN/Faulkner Award for Fiction for her novel "Improvement."

A Washington Post review described "Fools, which is comprised of six interrelated short stories, this way: "She has an American voice: silvery, within arm's length of old cadences, but also limber, thieving, marked by occasional raids on slang and jargon, at ease both high and low, funny, tenderhearted, sharp. It gives her the rare ability to reach the deepest places in the plainest ways."

When asked in an interview who motivated her to become a writer, Silber responded: "I was very lucky to study with Grace Paley at Sarah Lawrence College. I had originally wanted to be a poet—Grace had all her students try writing prose if they were poetry students and the prosers had to try a poem. It was my first story in college and I was quite thrilled with myself, though it was a few years before I decisively chose fiction. Grace believed that the key to fiction was character and that a story could be organized like a poem, two ideas I've carried with me. She was a great support and a great example."



Board of Trustees Biography: PERSONAL THOUGHTS ON LEADERSHIP

I was born in Fitchburg, Massachusetts in 1948. Fitchburg at the time was a major center of industry, and my father did his part while my mother was a stay at home mom. My parents were holiday Christians, my sister, two brothers, and I were raised with the expectation that we would follow along. I loved the music, sang in the choir, but the message didn't take for me. I went to school in Massachusetts before wandering off to sail the seven seas. Well, that's not quite true. I didn't see much of the seven seas, I saw too much of the Pacific Ocean, and way too much of Viet Nam.

Religion was always a sore point for me within my family. I could not accept Christianity but I didn't have a problem with G-d. Life experience, education, and friendship led me to Judaism. As you might expect it wasn't that easy. Choosing and announcing a decision to convert to Judaism contributed to family and career issues, and some confusion for my kids. It took many years, and a lot of work to complete the conversion process.

I loved the Navy and when I wasn't in Viet Nam I got to spend a fair amount of time walking the decks of one ship or another. A Naval combat ship is a community dependent on the actions of its members in much the same way our temple is a community dependent on its membership.

Something I observed on board ship that's worthy of note here is that the people who were usually happy were the most successful. They didn't just do an assigned task, they worked to excel at their assignment; then they looked for more ways to contribute. You could say they participated fully and led others by the example of participating. Some of these people were or became leaders. Some of these people were just happy to participate. All of them contributed to the success of their community by doing good work.

Merriam-Webster defines leadership as a noun meaning 'having the capacity to lead' or 'the office of a leader'. I believe those definitions miss the mark. I hold that leadership is the ability to move others to action either by influence or example.

At Temple Beth-El we have a small group of participant leaders who are directly involved in every activity that enables our community to function. We as a community need to emulate and expand membership in this group. We need people not just to worship together but to participate in the day to day functions of the community. Some might choose to become leaders, others will be happy just to participate. All can contribute to the success of our community by doing good work.

On Friday, September 7, 2018, Shabbat Under the Sky (Stars) was moved to an alternate location: Temple Beth-El's Biblical Garden and our Temple entryway. We may just do it again!

Temple Beth-El Board of Trustees Meeting Summary—September 20, 2018

Rabbi Karol distributed a report about his activities. President Ellen Torres thanked everyone involved in High Holy Day services and the break fast. She noted that Francine Feinberg and Rose Jacobs will lead JFFF this year, and that Susan Michelson and Susan Quinn will organize JFFF volunteers. She thanked Board members for their calls to Temple members thanking them for all that they do for the Temple. She discussed aspects of the October 7 2:00 p.m. TBE history play and the October 21 noon golf tournament. Treasurer Michael Mandel discussed our budget.

The Board discussed the possibility of working again with the Center for Spiritual Living at the Renaissance Faire deli booth. It discussed ideas for Jewish Federation of Greater El Paso grant applications. Dave Decker represented the Building and Grounds Committee and discussed steps to help it carry out its responsibilities. We will explore ways to augment TBE communications and publicity. Jim Rosenthal reviewed comments made by Board and other members on his Leadership questionnaire. The Board concurred that we need to be active and do things, not simply agree to try to do things.

The Ways and Means Committee proposed holding a silent auction on January 26, 2019 in which TBE members would bid for personal services and events arranged by TBE members such as dinner in a home, a literary discussion, or dog-walking. TBE will move forward in planning for the auction. The Board welcomed Anne Weinberg and Rob Goldsteen, Steven Marcus and Robin Rhodes, and Corry McKissack to Temple membership.

The Temple will host two candidate forums at 6:30 p.m. on October 9 and October 16. We will host an oral history panel discussion at 7:00 p.m., on October 30, with Debra Wechter-Friedman from Las Cruces among the panelists. The first TBE leadership training program, "Defining Spirituality," is scheduled for Sunday, October 28 at 2:00 p.m., and will be led by Rabbi Larry Karol.
