Message from Rabbi Karol

"Impress these instructions upon your children. Recite them when you stay at home and when you are away, when you lie down and when you get up." This passage from Chapter six of the Book of Deuteronomy, one of the most familiar texts from the Torah, directs us

to impart our values to future generations.

A passage from the Talmud (Tractate Ta'anit 7a) asserts that this learning process can go both ways: "Rabbi Hanina says: 'I have learned much from my teachers, more from my colleagues, but from my students most of all.""

As we began a new Religious School year, our faculty and members of our Religious School committee created rules for school and classroom conduct based on sayings of the rabbis from the classic text Pirkei Avot. On the first day of Religious School on August 24, students developed their own rules, some also based on that ancient collection of rabbinic wisdom. See the original quotes from the rabbis that were used as a basis for some of these discussions on page 7.

Here are standards from our students and teachers that can apply to us all and provide wisdom as we approach the beginning of 5775:

Kaitlyn Mead's Pre-K/K Class

- Share
- Don't bully.
- Let your friends come over and play nicely.
- Be kind to other people; give to one another.

Sarah Mindlin's 1st-2nd Grade Class How we show KAVOD (honor/respect)

- Listen to the person who is talking, whether teacher or classmate.
- Respect your classmates; be kind to others.
- Help others.

Rhonda Karol's 3rd-4th Grade Class Rules for COMMUNITY

- Think positive thoughts
- Respect everyone
- Work as a team so we can be stronger
- Be responsible for yourself and your belongings
- Listen while others are speaking.
- Be kind to your peers, your teachers and your environment.
- Use quiet voices and kind words.
- Apologize if you hurt someone's feelings. Use your manners.

Fifth-Sixth Grade Class (Christi Rubin led this discussion)

- Jewish study is important.
- Have respect for others and take study seriously.
- Be yourself. Be a good example for others. Follow others who are acting appropriately.
- Listen to people with knowledge.
- Have self-control; be understanding of others.
- Be a part of your community; think before you speak.
- Have respect for other people's property.
- Be fair, tell the truth, be kind, be peaceful.
- Stand up for others.

Rabbi Karol's Machon Class (7th-10th Grade)

- Stay away from peers who are disrupting class and from bad situations (if you can).
- Find a friend to help guide you through life.
- Treat everyone with respect.
- Don't be selfish, and take part in the community.
- Speak clearly so everyone understands you.
- Don't procrastinate.
- Be proactive as a community member.

From Religious School Faculty and Committee members

- Learn from everyone. People have different views and life experiences. Respect the wisdom of congregants of all ages.
- Do not join with a disruptive classmate. Move away if necessary. Work with students who help you learn and won't distract you.
- Encourage classmates to study and bring Torah into their own lives. Be a friend. Let everyone play. Look for lonely students. Be inclusive.
- Take care of yourself. Remember that you are part of a team or group. Every day is a new start.
- Come and learn; act and speak kindly; bring your best self.
- Think about the other person before you get mad.
- Act kindly, speak kindly, treat everyone with compassion and respect for their individuality.
- Verify the story: there are two (or more) sides to everything.
- Kindness and peace within ourselves leads to peace in our community.
- Always include everyone (that means YOU as well) as part of the group.
- You know what it feels like to be hurt don't hurt others.
- Think before you speak; use your time wisely.
- Keep your hands to yourself
- Respect other peoples' belongings.
- Listen when others are talking.
- Be kind with your body and your words.
- Treat others the way you want to be treated.





JEWISH FEDERATION OF NEW MEXICO TO CONDUCT FIRST STATE-WIDE SURVEY OF JEWISH COMMUNITY Study to Help Reveal Jewish Demographic in New Mexico

Albuquerque, N.M. – September 2, 2014 – The Jewish Federation of New Mexico, an Albuquerque-based, multifaceted social service organization that serves the needs of New Mexico's Jewish community through leadership, philanthropy, education and social action, announces today the launch of the first comprehensive state-wide survey to determine the demographic composition of New Mexico's Jewish community at jewishsurveynm.org.

"We are thrilled to launch our first survey to better understand the Jewish community in New Mexico and assess their current and future needs," said Sam Sokolove, executive director of the Jewish Federation of New Mexico. "The results of the survey will help the state's Jewish agencies, congregations and communal organizations to more effectively serve the Jewish population for years to come."

The study, which commences today, is being conducted by Marina Arbetman-Rabinowitz, Ph.D. and Kupersmit Research, a Denver-based research firm that specializes in customized research, and provides cutting-edge tools and technologies to better assess diverse populations. It will include a two-phased process to determine attitudes and behaviors, and to identify groups requiring specific communal services.

The survey will be launched on Tuesday, September 2nd with telephone calls from the research company. The survey will go live online on Wednesday, September 10th. Members will be able to access the website and take the important survey at that time. Mailed questionnaires and telephone calls to a sample of New Mexico residents with Jewish surnames and other sources will be conducted to maximize reach. "It is important for everyone to complete the first phase of the survey to help us assess the needs of New Mexico's Jewish residents," said Marina Arbetman-Rabinowitz, Ph.D., New Mexico project consultant for the survey.

Once the results of the survey are received, the second phase of the study will be introduced. Phase two will consist of focus group research and interviews. It will allow for a more detailed depiction of the Jewish communities' patterns and behaviors, and how they differ among age, gender, affiliated and unaffiliated individuals. "We expect the results of the landmark survey to be truly transformational and provide a picture of the affiliated and unaffiliated Jewish households in New Mexico. The data will help us better recognize the challenges and barriers New Mexico Jews have faced, as well as their motivations and aspirations," said Arbetman-Rabinowitz.

The history of Judaism in New Mexico stretches from the colonial period to the present day. Many of the first settlers were crypto-Jews who escaped the Spanish Inquisition in the 16th and 17th centuries; but the community, which openly practiced Judaism, started with 19th century German merchants who eventually settled in Las Vegas, Santa Fe and Albuquerque. Although the Jewish community of New Mexico is concentrated in the larger cities, smaller communities such as Roswell and Las Cruces have seen the birth of synagogues and Jewish organizations. "The Jews of New Mexico have had an extraordinary impact on the history of the state and the cultural, political, business and social lives of people living in the Land of Enchantment," said Sokolove. "The results of the survey will help us plan for the future of our community as it expands throughout the state."

ISRAEL UPDATE

MIDDLE EAST REPORTING: THE GOOD, BAD AND THE UGLY by Phil Alkon

Media attention of the Israel Hamas war has exposed us to an onslaught of news coverage that I would characterize as moderately to blatantly anti-Israel, with a very few sources of objective to marginally sympathetic reporting. The most ugly of the lot to my mind are the BBC, Guardian and most British newspapers, joined by the gray old lady, herself, the New York Times. British media has long adopted the "Israel can never be right, Palestinians never be wrong" mantra, so that source of Israel demonization was not surprising. The NYT's voluntary enlistment in the "Israelis are the oppressors and Palestinians are the victims" camp has been noticeable for some time. It reached a crescendo (or nadir) in the Gaza conflict thanks to their newest Israel-based correspondent, Judy Ruderon, who does not even pretend a veneer of objectivity in her slanted anti-Israel coverage. With the Times leading the way, the "Israel must be to blame" assumption has, in fact, enveloped much of the national and international press. For those interested in objective news coverage, I recommend starting with two web sources: Times of Israel (www.timesofisrael.com) for solid reporting on all the latest news from Israel, warts and all; and Al-Monitor: the Pulse of the Middle East (www.al-monitor.com), for solid coverage on the entire region, including Israel. As for TV coverage, I started watching CNN for what I hoped would be a balanced take on Gaza, but its overall coverage has vacillated from moderately bad to ugly. They not only cast a sharp, focused light on the bad and the ugly, they also actually get them to publically apologize and correct their stories. We really need them
