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Message from Rabbi Karol "If I can help somebody as I pass along" -Reflections on the CCAR Convention in Atlanta (March 19-23, 2017) - D'var Torah for Vayakheil/P'kuday - March 24, 2017

This has been a difficult week. Some news commentators would likely apply that thought to what happened in the House of Representatives today.

Others might cite the Westminster attack, which is part of an unfortunately persistent wave of hatred and intolerance borne out in violent actions and murder.

Many Jews around the world might be thinking of the young Jewish man in Israel who is now the main suspect identified as the perpetrator of bomb threats against Jewish community centers in the United States and in two locations in Australia and New Zealand. We are still not certain whether we will ever be able to explain his actions, even with reports that a medical condition may have affected his judgment, making him somehow see his actions as appropriate. This particular situation leaves us asking more questions, even though we may have a partial answer.

In both of those cases of threat and tragedy, the perpetrator wanted to tear down a house, so to speak, or a society. There may have been a desire to replace the house with something else. Or the motive may have been simply to derive a sense of twisted satisfaction by exerting personal abilities and power to sow chaos, disruption, or even loss of life.

During the annual convention of the Central Conference of American Rabbis in Atlanta, which I attended over the last

several days, my colleagues and I saw other examples of attempts to create chaos and act upon prejudice.

Some of us participated in a tour of Civil Rights sites in Atlanta on Sunday morning. Our first stop was at an apartment and shop complex called the Pencil Factory. I immedi-



ately knew where we were. Leo Frank had moved to Atlanta from New York in 1908 to take over a pencil factory at that location. In 1913, one of his employees, 13 year old Mary Phagan, came from Marietta to pick up her paycheck and never returned home. As best as we can tell, after the revelations provided in the 1980s by Leo Frank's office helper Alonzo Mann, custodian Jim Conley had murdered Mary Phagan. Mann, who saw Conley carrying Phagan's body, was told by Conley that, if he told anyone, he would be murdered, too. The prosecutor in the case didn't believe that Conley, a black man, could have perpetrated the crime. The guilt was, instead, pinned on Frank, an easy target because of his Jewish identity.

Frank was convicted of the murder and sentenced to death, a judgment commuted by Governor Jim Slaton in 2015. Soon after that, Leo Frank was taken from a prison hospital by a group called "The Knights of Mary Phagan" and lynched. The Knights actually distributed post cards that bore photos from the lynching at that time. From those events emerged the Anti-Defamation League and, sadly, an emboldened and renewed Ku Klux Klan. So, standing at the Pencil Factory was simply chilling, and a reminder of how stereotypes and



hatred can tear down decency in our midst.

We then visited the graves of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and Coretta Scott King. We sat in the pews of the original Ebenezer Baptist

Church, where Martin Luther King, Jr.'s father had served as pastor and where King himself sang in the children's choir. We attended the service at the current Ebenezer Baptist Church. Last Sunday morning, 1500 people gathered to celebrate the 131st anniversary of the church. The service featured music led by different generations of singers and instrumentalists, dancers, a bell choir, and an inspiring sermon delivered by the Rev. Traci Blackmon from St. Louis. While the death of The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was the result of yet another person - or a group of people - who wanted to sow chaos in society, the church itself, both old and new, signified how a holy space can yield the creation of sacred partnership from one generation to the next.

Our final stop on the tour was at the NAMES Project/ AIDS memorial quilt headquarters. What we heard from the project's president and CEO, Julie Rhoad, was that this organization began as a way to draw people's attention to the challenge of AIDS through reflection and remembrance. That

left an impression on me. They hoped to make great strides in medical research that would ultimately lead to a cure for AIDS. Their means to reach that end became the creation and public displays of quilt pieces sent to them memorializing indi-



viduals who died of AIDS and donations that came in from all around the world. I admire their continuing efforts and their peaceful approach that has woven together into a human tapestry of hope so many relatives and friends of persons with AIDS who died.

And that brings us to the Torah reading for the week. Moses called upon selected artisans, led by Bezalel and Oholiab, to come forward to fashion the Tabernacle, the Israelite house of worship, and its furnishings. The people were asked to donate materials that could be used in the creation of the Israelites' sacred space.

So, they brought their contributions....and then more, and even more...until what they were donating became overwhelming. Bezalel and Oholiab and their colleagues had accumulated enough raw materials to move forward with their work. They told Moses to announce to the people to stop! The Torah says that the people "had brought enough for the work to be done, and even more."

Here was a group of people, in the wilderness, having just escaped slavery, able to be exceedingly generous. After some of their fellow Israelites had previously given their jewelry to create the golden calf, a sign of communal breakdown and chaos, the people had learned from the past and reached a new level. They understood unity. They understood the honor of giving to something sacred. They understood how important it would be, in their present and their future, to build up, whether it was raising their own spirits or raising a structure where they could go to feel the presence of God with them.

One moment that I haven't mentioned from the convention exemplified how history can create a holy foundation upon which we can build in the here and now and in the fu-

ture. Mary Gurley, who is now 88 years old, sang in the children's choir at the Ebenezer Baptist Church with Martin Luther King, Jr. During the funeral of the civil rights leader, she was called upon to sing a song called "If I Can Help Somebody." Just before the Kaddish during our conven-



tion service this past Monday morning, the service leader spoke about Mary Gurley (SEE PHOTO). Then, to the surprise of some of us, she herself walked up to the stage in the hotel ballroom, took her place at the microphone, and sang these words: "If I can help somebody as I pass along, if I can cheer somebody with a word or a song, if I can show somebody he is travelling wrong, then my living shall not be in vain!"

Know that among the 500 rabbis and other family members and guests gathered for that service, there was likely not a dry eye in the house. That song's lyrics describe some of the most crucial building blocks of community because they direct us to act with kindness, with compassion, and with enough of a sense of fellowship to reach out to support others along our shared life's path.

What we do in our lives should not be about power, or control, or being more important and precious than anyone else. We can be like the Israelites who brought their best to build a holy space where they would meet God. And we, in our day, can do the same with generous hands and open minds and hearts.

May the space we create allow all people to enter, remembering that God's house can and should always be a house of prayer for all peoples. May we make it so.



### DEATH, ISRAEL STYLE By Catriella Freedman

I wasn't surprised, but I also wasn't prepared. After living in Israel for 10 years, you get used to everything being served raw without much subtlety. This is terrorism. This is childbirth. This is the supermarket on Erev Yom Kippur. This is your child's elementary school. This is the evacuation of a settlement.

And then, this is my mother, dead. Eight months after she moved to Israel, to Zichron Ya'akov, to the same city where she had dated my father more than 62 years before.

The 5'9" woman who towered over me most of my life was now shrunken to the size of a small child, with nothing but a thin, form-fitting shroud wrapped in such a way so that I could make out the shape of her nose, her face, her arms. Like everything else, the Israeli shroud seems to say, Diaspora Jewry's simple pine box will not do; it glosses over reality. One must face the facts.

And this is my father, wracked with grief, crying and crying out with abandon. I don't remember him ever crying; but 60 years of being in America, all that learned westernization, is wiped away in a cemetery in Israel, and he is finally returning to his Middle Eastern roots. He doesn't realize that I've seen this identical image before, eight years ago, when his brother with the same face, buried his wife, the love of his life, in Petach Tikvah. That brother died seven years later, they say of a broken heart.

Into the earth she goes. Unceremoniously lowered in, cement bag-sized buckets of dirt are thrown in after her.

She died at nine in the morning. The silence in her hospital room the first sign that things were different. The monitors quiet, the sun streaming in, she was lying there as though napping, still warm, or was it the sun? The reaction of the staff was the second sign. Always on the move, never much time to talk or confer, nurses, doctors, orderlies, always a racing streak of white, green, and blue.

Suddenly they appeared. One by one, they stopped, they gave hugs, they cried. For once, they didn't tell us to leave the room. I guess it didn't matter anymore. The physical therapist who had helped her with her breathing had tears streaming down her face. Doctors who never had time to talk now came. The beautiful nurse with the perfectly white hijab insisted we keep drinking, forcing cups of water into our hands. And finally, Ra'ad, the Arab nurse who had become our ally and our friend, appeared at 12 and said, you must take your father, you must get ready for the funeral. I promise you, I will not leave her side until the Chevre Kadisha comes to take her. I will not leave her. *Rak b'smachot*, he added, next time let us meet at a joyous occasion.

And then there was the cemetery. So many people. They had dropped everything, work, family, school, they had driven, taken buses, walked. They had come from Ashdod, Jerusalem, B'nei Brak, Ra'anana, with little more than two-hours warning, they arrived on time to witness the shrouded body and the heartbroken husband. Family, friends, many who knew my mom, many who didn't. My children's classmates, even 8-year-olds showed up to stand by my youngest daughter.

I wasn't surprised, but I also wasn't prepared for how seriously Israelis take the shiva period. A steady stream of people bearing food, stories, large ears for listening, and an ability to stay, stay, stay. Secular men arrived with kippot. Non-religious joined in the constant *minyanim*. Haredim melded with non-Haredim. It all seemed like a well-orchestrated opera; everyone knows it will be dramatic, and yet everyone knows their part.

Death creates a chasm between the living and the mystery of life. To the mourner, it feels as though that mystery will never be regained, will never be felt again. Israelis, from hard-earned experience, understand this. It seems that as a nation they are determined to carry each mourner back to the other side. \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

### Temple Board of Trustees Meeting Summary – March 16, 2017

The meeting was called to order by Ellen Torres, President at 7:02 pm.

**Rabbi's Report**. Rabbi Karol reported that nearly 50 people attended the Family Shabbat/Shabbat Across America service on March 3. The local chapter of Hadassah led a Hadassah Shabbat service on March 10. The Mensch Club has approached him wanting to take part in a Shabbat service soon. The Purim Carnival and Dinner was successful, with a multi-generational crowd on March 11.

The series on the book WISE AGING concluded on March 8, and this year's series of Judaism: Roots and Rituals concluded on February 28.

The Rabbi was a participant in a discussion of anti-Semitism during the Las Cruces International Film Festival on March 9, following the screening of the 1992 film, "School Ties."

**President's Report**. President Ellen Torres had sent out a survey questionnaire to Trustees prior to the board meeting asking questions about our thoughts on TBE relationships, meaning and impact. She had learned about this survey at the URJ's Scheidt Seminar for Temple Presidents, and felt this would be a very effective point of discussion. She urged each Trustee to turn them in to her.

Ellen is still looking for a replacement for TBE's open seat on the Jewish Federation Board, and encourages anyone interested to get in touch with her. She will also be calling for nominees for the Volunteer Recognition at the Yom Ha'atzmaut Israel Independence Day event on May 7.

**Treasurer's Report**. Treasurer Allen Blum provided an extensive Statement of Activity for the period ending February 28, 2017. The main concern is that TBE may fall short of collecting member pledges that were budgeted for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2017. All other receipts and expenses are in line with expectations.

He reported that he has been working with Linda Kruger and Dave Zeemont (see Library Committee report below) to locate and restore missing funds that had been pledged to the Library. Approximately \$5,000 has been identified and is being restored to the Library fund.

### **Committee Reports**

1. History Committee - Jeff Brown has agreed to chair the committee and is working on developing a statement of duties for the committee to be included in the By-Laws.

2. Nominating Committee – Jim Rosenthal, Chair. The Nominating Committee has held a couple of meetings and is continuing to meet. Jim recommended to the board that the requirement to present two additional nominees for the Board over the actual number of vacancies on the board be removed from the By-Laws. 3. Ways and Mean Committee – Lionel Jacobs, Chair.

A flurry of work is underway to prepare for the Jewish Food and Folk Festival, which will be on April 23. Depending on volunteers is the only way that JFFF can happen! Please let Rose Jacobs (at arejay11@icloud.com) know that you can volunteer for a shift that day. Sue Mazer is collecting nice items for the Silent Auction. Her contact info is on the sheet as well. We could always use more sponsorships and ads in the program book. We would like to ask Board members to recruit any sponsors and contact Terri Sugarman to coordinate. You can buy a one-line message in the program book for \$18. You can contact Emile Elias to have one included in the book. We need people to bake the desserts that will be sold. We are adding rugelach this year. If you would like to help, contact Dia Taylor.

4. Youth Activities Committee: Leora Zeitlin, Chair.

Because of her travel schedule, Julie Seton has had to resign as Co-Chair of the Youth Activities Committee. Leora Zeitlin will be stepping back in as the Chair. She reported that students are registered to attend the NFTY Social Action Weekend (SAW) in April, and that they are looking for scholarship support for them to attend.

### **Old Business**

Mike Batkin February 26 Meeting Update: On February 26, Mike Batkin met with Temple President Ellen Torres, Treasurer Allen Blum, and Rabbi Karol (these 3 individuals comprise the Trustees of the Batkin Fund). Currently the Irving Batkin fund balance is almost \$20,000. Mike Batkin announced he will match any contributions to the Batkin fund up to a total of \$1800 this year.

### **New Business**

Based on his report to the Board, Jim Rosenthal presented a proposal to remove the wording of Article 2. Duties of Committees, Section 11, Article 2 of the Bylaws requiring there be "at least two (2) names in excess of the number of vacancies on the Board of Trustees for the annual Congregational meeting." A motion was made and seconded to propose that change in the By-Laws to the Congregation at the Congregational meeting. The motion carried.

The date of the congregational meeting has been tentatively set for May 16. During that meeting, members will vote on the slate of nominees for the Board of Trustees, and will vote on any proposed changes to the Constitution and/or By -Laws. Ellen has asked trustees to review the TBE Constitution and Bylaws and determine if additional amendments should be brought to the Congregation.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:15 pm.


