Message from Rabbi Karol

New York City will be thematically and visually represented at this year's "Chai Five" Jewish Food and Folk Festival. It really isn't that easy to create an ambience in Las Cruces, New Mexico that truly approximates the feeling of walking on a street in Manhattan, Brooklyn or Queens

(based on my own personal experience). We can, of course, present culinary offerings that are common in or near a city with a large Jewish community.

During Rhonda's and my "spring break" visit to the Big Apple, we were treated to the sights, tastes and smells of characteristic Jewish foods. Eating establishments on the Upper East Side of Manhattan (near where the New York Karols live) feature bagels, lox and various cream cheeses; kosher meat dishes (chicken schawarma has become my favorite);

and a breakfast café, where Adam, Juli and I heard several conversations in Hebrew. A nearby supermarket touted the widest selection of Passover items in the city. One bakery displayed small challot, challah rolls and sweet delicacies right in the window. My choice for lunch at "Russ and



Daughters" at the Jewish Museum featured a pumpernickel bagel, cream cheese and lox with a Dr. Brown's diet black cherry soda.



While these foods may represent a definite component of Jewish identity, we know that Jewishness goes much deeper than stimuli for our taste buds. Our visit to the Jewish Museum on March 19 was not just about food. There was a major exhibit of items from their long-term collection that

are not always on display. That included ancient artifacts that bore a 7branched Menorah and six-pointed stars; paintings and sculptures that portrayed Jewish holiday observances; and a presentation of home symbols such as mezuzot, chanukiot, wine cups and Havdalah sets in various shapes and sizes. There was an ark that had been housed in a synagogue in Sioux City, Iowa, up-river from my hometown of Kansas City.



What affected me the most were the

items displayed in two adjoining galleries. The first gallery presented items from Terezin, the Theresienstadt "campghetto" in Czechoslovakia, which existed between November, 1941 and May, 1945. According to the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum website, Theresienstadt served as a transit camp for Czech Jews to be sent to other camps, and, later, as a ghetto-labor camp where the Nazi regime created a cultural life that successfully concealed the nature of the camp



itself and the ultimate deportations. The exhibit included an art piece with verses from Psalms that were suggested to the artist by Rabbi Leo Baeck, a liberal rabbi in Germany who survived throughout the war and settled in Lender of

in London afterwards. There was a

chanukiah and a piece of jewelry with multiple symbols, both fashioned in the camp. There were drawings that depicted scenes in Theresienstadt that offer evidence of life there at that tragic time.




In the next room was an exhibit of stereographic photographs from the Middle East from the years before and after 1900. There were viewers provided for visitors to look at the images in their "near-3D" format. One stereograph showed worshippers at the Western Wall (men and women together). There were other scenes of

Jerusalem and Jewish settlement in the land at the time.

Before we moved on to another floor, I took a moment to reflect on what I had just seen. There were images and items that reflected vibrant Jewish communities over the course of centuries. There were paintings and expressions of our ritual and religious tradition that had been created even amid the harsh reality of a seeming ghetto/village that expressed anti-Semitism through subterfuge and hidden cruelty. There were visual portrayals of the developing Jewish community in what is now the State of Israel, which is approaching the 70th anniversary of its creation.

As we now observe our festival of Passover, with its theme of freedom, it bears a strong message for us in the present day. We are standing on the shoulders of Jews and their communities that demonstrated commitment and persistence in sustaining Jewish life. We, as members of a Jewish congregation and community in the United States, have the unique opportunity to maintain that spirit for the present and the future. We declare, as the Passover Seder concludes, "Next Year in Jerusalem!" May the "next year" and the decades to come in Las Cruces and throughout the world bring an ongoing renewal of the Jewish soul, in our taste-buds, for sure, but, primarily, in our minds, hearts and souls!

Participants will start by writing their

prayers. Participants will start by writing their own six-word prayer, and then go deeper to look at how our own "deepest desires" can be expressed in our own words.

Alden Solovy spreads joy and excitement for prayer. A liturgist and poet, his work has been used by people of all faiths throughout the world. He's written more than 600 pieces of new liturgy, offering a fresh new Jewish voice, challenging the boundaries that often separate poetry, meditation, personal growth and prayer. He's a teacher, a writing coach and an award-winning essayist and journalist. His ELI talk, "<u>Falling in Love with</u> <u>Prayer</u>" was recently released.

Alden's writing was transformed by multiple tragedies, marked in 2009 by the sudden death of his wife from catastrophic brain injury. As a result, he deepened his exploration of meditation, poetry, liturgy and personal prayer as a healing, spiritual practice. His third book, *This Grateful Heart: Psalms and Prayers for a New Day*, was recently released by CCAR Press. His prayers appear regularly on <u>www.reformjudaism.org</u> and <u>RitualWell.org</u>. His latest prayers are available at <u>www.tobendlight.com</u>.

Happy 20 Chai Last year the Irving Batkin Memorial Scholarship Fund produced \$1,024.00 in earnings that will be distributed as schol-

arships in 2018. Shortly after January 1. 2018, I had a conversation with Rabbi Karol and I wished him a Happy New Year. He pointed out to me that the Gregorian year 2018 could be read as "twenty chai." As most readers of "Adelante!" know, in Hebrew the letters that correspond to 18 also spell the word chai (life). To most Jews the number 18 is considered "lucky". Twenty chai (2018) equals 360. Therefore, I am making the following offer for 2018: I donate \$3,600.00 in matching money, to double as many as 10 contributions of 20 chai (that's \$360.00) to the Irving **Batkin Memorial Scholarship** Fund made between January 1st and July 31, 2018. Israel Update

A TALE OF TWO MIDDLE EASTS by Phil Alkon

My last column noted that Israel faces a grim reality regarding recent shifts in the Middle East balance of power, but is more secure regarding the thorny Palestinian issue and in its relation with its Sunni Arab neighbors. At an international scale, the UN and European community remain hostile to lukewarm regarding Israel's claims as a Jewish homeland. But increased U.S backing, and unexpected support among other nations, has restored some balance to that equation. Within the Middle East itself opposing forces have intensified in recent weeks. We'll try to tackle some of the regional dynamics here.

The grim "northern" issue reflects Iran's enlarging influence in the region and its growing proximity to Israel's Syrian and Lebanese borders. In the past, Iran's Hezbollah puppets routinely carried out terrorist and military actions against Israel from those countries. Last week, though, Iranian troops in Syria launched a renaissance drone into Israeli territory – an act of war according to international law. The IDF responded by destroying the drone base, and an ensuing conflict resulted in extensive destruction of Syrian air defenses and the loss of an Israeli jet fighter. Casualties thus far include two wounded Israeli pilots and an unknown number of Syrian, Hezbollah and Iranian - yes, Iranian - combatants. Israel announced that it would not allow Iran to establish a permanent military presence in Syria. The Iranian leadership vowed Israel's total destruction, and a full-scale war between Israel and Iran appears close. Israel is actively preparing for that conflict on both military and civilian fronts. In addition to Iranian and Syrian forces, Israel is threatened by some 100,000 Iranian missiles from Hezbollah bases in Lebanon that can hit anywhere in the country. These were transferred to Hezbollah via Syria under the very noses of the UN observers in Lebanon, who were stationed there specifically to prevent that from happening. We also know that Tehran is collaborating with North Korea in development of advanced missile systems, and that North Korea now actively sells its weapon systems to its Middle East Arab clients.

The Syrian regime's other major backer, Russia, is now also having qualms about Iran's growing belligerence towards Israel. Bashar Assad's Syria has been Russia's base of operations in the Middle East for decades. Russia's commitment to the Assad regime has been clearly demonstrated by its brutal military actions against Assad's opponents and nonsupporters. Civilian casualties are in the hundreds of thousands and 2+ million refugees to date. But Russia is anxious to avoid a regional conflict that might jeopardize its current status and incur Russian casualties, even if ignited by a fellow Syrian ally. Russian and Israeli officials, including PM Netanyahu and Putin, are in regular contact regarding events in Syria, and Russia is striving to temper Iran's hostile words and provocative moves. Putin as peacemaker? Hard to believe – but this is the Middle East. Recip Erdogan's Turkey also has adopted a hostile, anti-Israel posture in recent years that appears to be more annoying than dangerous thus far. Busy quashing Kurds and internal opponents, Erdogan is unlikely to resurrect a Middle East Ottoman empire, even in the guise of an Israel-bashing Moslem regime. Incidentally, Israel has been the Kurds' only reliable regional supporter over the years. They too deserve a non-Arab Middle East nation in many people's eyes. Unfortunately, the U.S. has let the Kurds down with a bang more than once.

Meanwhile, the U.S.'s reinvigorated support of its only reliable Middle East ally - Israel – does signify a welcome shift in the regional "Game of Thrones." Iran, Russia and Turkey will not have the field to themselves. As an example, American and IDF forces recently conducted joint missile defense exercises that directly address Hezbollah and Iranian threats against Israel. The U.S. also has established a permanent air base in Israel, and has made clear its concerns regarding Iran regional ambitions and military adventures in the region. The Iranian regime must now consider a potential U.S. response in the event of war-like actions against Israel. A potential U.S. response will hopefully contribute to dampening Iran's aggressive urges, and thereby temper Israel's "northern" challenge.

Perhaps the most significant "southern Middle East" development is Israel's growing acceptance among its Sunni Arab neighbors. The ascension of Mohammad Bin Salman to Saudi Arabia's leadership is particularly telling. He is not only revolutionizing Saudi society, but has effectively accepted an independent Jewish state in the Middle East as a neighbor. Saudi religious authorities, perhaps the most influential regional clerics, have now banned anti-Jewish and anti-Israel declarations as contrary to Moslem belief. This in the nation that famously adopted a rigorous Wahhabi Islam as its religious creed, and exported it around the world. Other Gulf States also are undertaking a wide range of direct and indirect communications with Israel, thereby creating a realm of "secret" diplomacy that is known to all. Iran's territorial and Shia-only ambitions have no doubt fostered closer relations between Israel and its Sunni neighbors. But it's worth remembering that Jordan and Egypt had already concluded formal peace treaties with Israel. Moreover, many Arabs appear tired of promoting the Palestinian "cause" as a defining regional issue or as related to their own selfinterests. As far back as the post-WWI era, Emir Feisal, the most prominent Arab leader of the time, welcomed a revived Jewish Palestine as beneficial to Arab Moslem progress in the region.

There is no more challenged and divisive region in the world than the Middle East, and it is not surprising that we Jews are having issues in recreating a long-dormant nationhood in that hostile and treacherous setting. We were not promised a return to Gan Eden or even a veritable Rose Garden in our own small covenantal property. But Pesach does serve to remind us that we have been pretty well prepared as a people for that historic adventure. Hag Samayach!

Board Meeting Summary March 15, 2018

The Rabbi thanked Pearie Bruder and everyone involved in distributing Mishloach Manot bags. Rhonda Karol's religious school class produced a Kid's Chadashot newsletter. Our next b'nai mitzvah will be Kaila Brown (May 26), Derek Hyman (June 2) and Hannah Saltman (June 30). Alden Solovy will give his major talk on Monday evening, April 30 and will lead a writers' workshop on the evening of May 1. TBE members were invited to attend the Palm Sunday service on March 25 at Morning Star United Methodist Church. People from different religious faiths were invited to the service as a sign of good will.

President Ellen Torres reviewed previous Board discussions and information about the joint meetings of the Nominating Committee and the special Leadership Committee. These had been presented to the Board at a number of its meetings and had been discussed at the Board by Jim Rosenthal. Board members discussed the nomination process. Ellen encouraged members to attend the Yom Ha'atzmaut Celebration in El Paso on April 22. It will be held from 12:00 to 3:00 at Temple Mount Sinai. The Rabbi noted that there will be observances in Las Cruces as well. Some members still need to pay Fair Share dues.

The Board discussed the Library Committee report. Members suggested reducing holdings (to a small extent), adding a small amount of new books, and/or moving some books if space opens up. The Board agreed to sell excess *Mishkan T'filah* prayer books to a small temple in Sandusky, Ohio. The Social Action Committee is arranging Temple participation on April 29 in a TBE Mitzvah Day, which will coincide with the Jewish Federation of Greater El Paso's Good Deeds Day project. We will carry out Mesilla Valley Hospice yard and rock work. Members discussed potential speakers from a list provided by the New Mexico Jewish Historical Society. No costs for the first speaker would be paid by the Temple.





VISITING CONGREGANTS WHO ARE ILL OR HOME-BOUND


