

Message from Rabbi Karol

I have been keeping a blog since the beginning of my time here in Las Cruces at rabbilarrykarol.blogspot.com. Many of my invocations at board meetings, sermons, and other writings find their way onto that online presence. There are other expressions that I

post on my personal Facebook wall that put into words what I am feeling at a particular time based on recent events. I feel like I have been doing that a lot lately, due to tragic attacks around the world that attempt to sow chaos in the human community and strife that continues to emerge from societal conflict.

As I looked back on the month of July, I found these two statements to share with you because of the values in which I believe that came out, for me, at those particular times.

July 5, 2016

Some uncanny juxtapositions for the week - the last episode in the Syfy Channel's Twilight Zone July 4th marathon was "Death's Head Revisited," probably one of the earliest treatments of the Holocaust in the history of television. Rod Serling created a stunning and haunting program that leveled all the necessary accusations against the Third Reich for perpetrating the murder of so many people, including Jews, political dissidents, developmentally-challenged individuals, homosexuals, Gypsies and others. Serling accomplished this without identifying the background of the victim "Becker," a character who served as the guide for a gloating Nazi, Captain Lutze, who came back to Dachau to remember when he had the power of life and death, choosing death for too, too many people.

This episode aired about 40 hours after the funeral of Elie Wiesel, whose witness to the Holocaust told real stories that led many more survivors to tell their stories as well. There is so much to say about Wiesel, but, mainly, his central message was that we cannot and should not be indifferent to what is happening in the world, because, otherwise, we become complicit in whatever cruelty, inhumanity, and hatred may be perpetrated on our watch.

Last Friday (July 1), Las Cruces Peace Camp ended its 2016 session. I have enjoyed leading music there for three years in a row. During the closing program, the campers sang (for all intents and purposes, they could have led me) Tom Paxton's "Peace will come" - which includes these lyrics:

"Peace, peace will, peace will come, let it begin with me We, we need, we need peace, and let it begin with me Oh, my own life is all I can hope to control Oh, let my life be lived for the good, good of my soul Let it bring peace, sweet peace, peace will come, let it begin with me."

That lyric stands against what Captain Lutze in the Twilight Zone episode gave as an excuse: "I was only following orders."

NO! We have control over our own lives. We make our own decisions. There may be circumstances that seem to take us in a direction in which we don't want to go, but we can make the final choice of how to act given our situation. And what is one possible criterion for our decisions? That we live "for the good of our souls."

After watching "Death's Head Revisited" again, and considering the legacy of Elie Wiesel's teaching, witnessing and writing, I know that I will continue to try to reach across divisions, to foster understanding, and to speak out when necessary, but to do so in a way that everyone can hear. In this year of all years, we have much to ponder as individuals, as citizens of whatever country in which we live, and as citizens of the planet.

July 19, 2016

Leadership includes the ability and willingness to say these words/phrases:

- 1) I regret what I said/did.
- 2) I am sorry.
- 3) I/we should have done that another way and I/we will try to do better next time.
- 4) I will take responsibility for what happened.

These phrases do not indicate weakness, as some people seem to think.

They show a strength of character that many consider admirable.

I learned this lesson from my parents, my Jewish upbringing, my study of Jewish teachings, my school communities, my family, and many members of my network of relationships. Maybe you have learned these values, too.

Let's not forget them.

Let us hope that the next few weeks bring better news, less violence and more peace in our nation and around the world. May the One who makes peace in the highest heavens make peace for us, for all Israel, and for all who live upon this earth.

This summer has been a roller coaster of emotions for our country and world, and of which we in our Temple community often play a part and follow closely. As Americans and global citizens, we mourned the devas-

tating shootings and deaths of too many people, whether by terrorists, angry individuals, or at times, by police. Our Rabbi represented us at community vigils and in letters to the newspaper, reaching out in spiritual and congregational brotherhood and sisterhood to beckon peace to return to our horror-stricken world. Our country is also balancing precariously on an election year precipice as we watch and listen to the convention rhetoric and await the outcome this fall. Thank you, first of all, to our past president, Monika Kimball, for the dedication and support she has given to our Temple community. She is as intelligent and kind as she is charming. Forum on Poverty on July 24

The second forum on poverty, sponsored by the TBE Social Action committee, was held on Sunday, July 24, 2016 at 1:30 –3:45 pm in the Social Hall. Three presenters addressed a congregational and community audience of 30–40 participants. The presentations stimulated a lively and engaging discussion as we used a format allowing for the program presenters to rotate among the round tables of participants. Both the presenters and those in attendance seemed to really appreciate





this opportunity for more informal yet intimate conversation both with the presenters and with each other.

A number of interesting facts were offered by the presenters. Dr. Hugo Vilchis of the Burrell College of Osteopathic Medicine, among other things, informed participants that even more important than your race, DNA or family history, one of the primary determinants of an individual's health status is

your zip code! We also learned from Ryan

Steinmetz that the Network Volunteer Center has over 300 volunteers, providing over 30,000 hours of time per year to the City of Las Cruces, which saves the city over \$600,000 per year. Daniel Valverde, from New Mexico Appleseed, discussed their goal of providing at least one complete, nutritious meal per day, 365 days/year, to every child who lives in New Mexico. He is enthusiastic and thinks this is quite possible, with some help.





A multitude of opportunities for individual and group volunteering were discussed for addressing both the acute needs of our community, such as food, shelter and safety concerns, and more social justice needs, such as advocating for funding, systemic change and addressing policy issues.

The Social Action committee hopes to develop some opportunities which we can present to the Board of Trustees that we may be able to get involved in, not only as individuals, but as a congregation. Stay tuned....

2016 Matzo Ball Open Golf Tournament


It's back...

- 6) ALL donations are noted in the Adelante. The Treasurer provides the list of the persons donating, the funds designated, and the Rabbi makes sure it goes into the Adelante.

If no Fund is designated on the check and/or in a note accompanying the check, the contribution goes to the General Fund.

Las Cruces Sun-News, Letter to the Editor, July 19, 2016 Another local vigil was held to honor police

We read with interest the report on the vigil held July 13 organized by La Piñon "to honor area officers for their service and to remember the five officers killed last week in an ambush in Dallas."

That gathering was not the first or only event intended to offer affirmation to law enforcement and to remember the officers who died in the line of duty in Dallas.

A candlelight "Vigil of Peace" was held July 9 at Albert Johnson Park to memori-

alize those who had died during the week of July 4 in Baton Rouge, Louisiana; St. Paul, Minnesota; and Dallas. There was representation from a wide range of local officials, religious leaders, and organizations

that work for greater understanding and social justice. Mayor Ken Miyagishima, District Attorney Mark D'Antonio, City Council member Gill Sorg, and Las Cruces Police Chief Jaime Montoya all spoke, followed by representatives of the NAACP and various religious congregations and organizations.

One participant in the vigil reflected on the event: "Nearly 200 people attended a vigil tonight in Las Cruces to mourn the continuing loss of precious life due to hatred, ignorance and gun violence. Speakers included clergy representing a diverse spectrum from Christian, Jewish, Muslim and Bud-

dhist traditions as well as public servants dedicated to community safety and well-being. In conclusion, all sang together: 'Peace will come; let it begin with me.'"

Many thanks to organizers, participants, and all who came together for remembrance and resolve to strengthen our community as we reflect on events across our nation.

Both of these vigils were important for Las Cruces and worthy of acknowledgement in the local media. Perhaps, in the future, we

can truly come together for one event that

can engender unity and hope throughout our city and community.

Temple Board of Trustees Meeting Summary July 21, 2016

The Rabbi reported on a very busy summer, including two sessions on Rabbi Shmuly Yanklowitz's book, *The Soul of Jewish Social Justice*, a future presentation on Rabbi Jill Jacobs' *There Shall be No Needy*, and a candlelight vigil on July 9 for the victims of shootings in Baton Rouge, St. Paul, Dallas, and Orlando. He serves on the Children's Reading Alliance bylaws committee, serves as secretary of the Las Cruces Peace Village Board, and convenes a monthly Third Thursday clergy breakfast, as well as much more.

President Ellen Torres reported that, while this has been a very glum time for our world with multiple killings and attacks, our little world of Temple Beth-El here in Las Cruces is a primary place of support to find solace, to work with others to bring about social justice, and to pray to God for spiritual support. She took note of one positive action taken by TBE: delivering a donation of \$700 to Camp Hope to support the good work they do to help the homeless and downtrodden in our community. She also recognized the efforts of TBE members who volunteer their time to our Temple, and sent out a huge "THANK YOU!"

Treasurer Allen Blum reported that progress continues to be made in using Rakefet for the budgeting as well as income and expense reporting for TBE. The TBE Budget for 2016/2017 was presented by Budget Chair Steve Halper. The budget process is now automated through Rakefet, and the funds and accounts now match up with Income/Expense summaries. Several funds which have been regarded as restricted will now be managed as restricted funds through Rakefet. These include BETY/BEMY, the Memorial Garden and Brick Walkway, Send a Kid to Israel, the Library Fund, the Batkin Fund, the Rabbi Gerald M. Kane Fund, and the Rabbi's Discretionary Fund. The budget was approved by the Board as presented. It was discussed that the budget leaves no room for additional or unexpected building expenses, and that as the building gets older, we can expect to see more needed expenditures.

Michael Mandel, Dues Committee Chair, updated the Board on discussions addressing anticipated needs for expenditures in the coming months and years for items at Temple needing repair or replacement. Michele Blum reported for the Sisterhood Council that grants have been awarded to Temple Beth-El Library, the Biblical Garden and Brick Walkway, BETY, the PJ Library Book Club, and Campership.

Jeff Lewis reported for the Mensch Club that the application for a booth at the Renaissance Fair is moving forward. They are coordinating with the Center for Spiritual Living to split the cost of a booth, with The Center conducting business on Saturday, and TBE taking over on Sunday to sell pastrami sandwiches and other items. The Mensch Club believes that participation at the Renaissance Fair will not only be profitable, but that it will help promote TBE in the community.

The Acquisitions, Specific Gifts, and Aesthetics Committee reported that they are continuing to research the design and cost for new TBE entry doors and hope to have a recommendation for the next meeting.




