#### Message from Rabbi Karol

At this writing, on the day after Thanksgiving, Israel is very much on my mind. There are fires that are raging across the country. Some of the fires are the result of arson, with alleged perpetrators likely taking advantage of high winds and dry ground to inflict damage.

The blazes pose a physical threat to Israeli citizens of all backgrounds. It is heartening that a variety of countries have assisted in fighting the fires, including firefighters from the Palestinian Authority. It is unfortunate when anyone believes that setting a fire makes a personal or political statement. Judaism views the preservation of nature (and human life!) as a mitzvah. Hopefully, by the time you see this article, most of the fires will have been put out. Our hearts and prayers go out to those who were touched by this unfortunate and unexpected challenge to their well-being.

Thanksgiving morning in the United States brought the news that Kehilat Ra'anan, the Reform synagogue in Ra'anana, Israel, had been covered with graffiti from members of a sector of Israeli society that vehemently opposes the creation of an egalitarian prayer space in the Western Wall area. My college contemporary, Judy Katzin, a long-time member and leader of the congregation, posted updates on Facebook which kept me informed of the events related to this unwarranted attack. There were envelopes with threatening messages placed on the building. They were addressed to Rabbi Rick Jacobs, President of the Union for Reform Judaism; Anat Hoffman, director of the Israel Religious Action Center; and Gilad Kariv, Executive Director of the Israel Movement for Progressive Judaism. Knives affixed next to the envelopes bore excerpts from rules about murder from Jewish law. Spraypainted onto the building was a verse, from the book of Obadiah in the Bible, that encourages violence against heretics. Another spray-painted message bore a quote from the Midrash: "The Divine Presence never moves from the Western Wall."

However, the Divine Presence, the Shechinah, according to Jewish belief, exists throughout the universe, not just at the Kotel/Western Wall. No one has a monopoly on the Shechinah and on what God wants from us. After watching the hatred of certain individuals, expressed through picket signs and faxed fliers bearing hateful messages during my years in Topeka, I see this vandalism as an expression of people who have made their ideology their idol. If they really believed in the Divine Presence, they would take the precept of God's Oneness and the potential to bring humanity together under the Divine Unity as a sign to find other ways to register their disagreement. The same could be said of arsonists who set the fires in various locations in Israel. Perhaps these individuals bent on destruction of the property of others should truly try to find God in themselves, so that they might make other choices on how to approach other human beings and the natural world.

In recent days, I have been thinking a lot about values as the basis of human community. Our discussion on humility at our program on November 18, "Humble Enough? An Interfaith Conversation," was a reflection of how people of different backgrounds and faith can come together to share their views and create a common language. This can only be done in a spirit of mutual respect and a commitment to work with each other as equal partners. That has always been the guiding principle of my work within the Jewish community and in an interfaith setting.

During our first session of the Judaism: Roots and Rituals class on November 15, I asked the students to generate a list of values that they believed to be part of Jewish traditions based on their current knowledge. Their list captured many of the fundamental tenets of our heritage. At the Board meeting on November 17, I offered an invocation based on the comments from my students. As we move into the coming months, may we answer the questions posed by this prayer, with the hope that we can arrive at responses that will lead us to paths of combined action to sustain the best of our values in our community and nation:

God of our days and years,

We look at the times in which we live and consider How the gift of our heritage can guide us in our lives. We call You our Creator. What can we do to help preserve the natural world around us?

We call You our Teacher, the One who has revealed to us knowledge and wisdom through the Torah and other values that have come down to us. How can we gain enlightenment from that learning, and how can we teach others what we have learned in a way that will resonate with them? We see You as our Companion throughout the course of history. How can we hear Your voice and recognize Your presence in ourselves, in the wisdom that others share, and in the events that shape our times?

We call You Compassionate One. How can we apply our own approach to compassion and mercy in a way that will touch all of humanity and offer them help and hope? We call You the Author of Freedom and the True Judge. How can we work with others to find the middle road that will sustain freedom and justice for all people? We believe in You as One who remembers what all people say and do. How can we write upon the scrolls of our lives thoughts and deeds that will deserve to be remembered in centuries to come?

We see You as our partner in celebration. How can we better find the joys that have been given to us, and how can we create moments of contentment for ourselves and our community?

Be with us, Eternal One, every single moment, and take us forward to where we need to go to make a better life for ourselves and for all humanity.

#### President's Message (Report at the Board Meeting on November 17, 2016)

Forty years ago today, November 17, 1976, I almost lost my life. I woke up to my Albany, New York, apartment being engulfed in smoke. My throat was burn-

ing and there were flames on the other side of my bedroom door. I was very disoriented and ran to my third story window to see what my options were. There was a fireman on a ladder below the window, telling me to climb out of the window, but his ladder wasn't high enough and he wasn't able to reach me. I ended up falling and hitting a metal railing, almost being impaled on a metal spike. As I fell from that 3<sup>rd</sup> story window, I saw my life unfold before me. After hitting the railing, I bounced to the concrete and found myself in a puddle of water with a severely broken femur and pelvis. They didn't think I would survive, and I spent a week in the intensive care unit hooked up to machines. The next few months of recovery from traction to surgery with a metal plate being installed in my leg, found me in a hospital bed coming to terms with my feeble physicality but praising God for saving me and protecting me through this horrific accident. I thank God every day for being alive and allowing me to embrace my humanity in all its forms throughout these many years. This event was a watershed moment in my life--one that reminds me of the fine line between life and death and how God and our faith carries us through our tragedies and our joys.

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Since we last met, the following events occurred: 1) many wonderful Shabbat services; 2) the Matzo Ball Open Golf Tournament at Red Hawk, which was a fun and engaging event (my husband and I even helped collect money for an activity at one of the holes and I learned a few things about golf); 3) the Renaissance Faire Pastrami and Hot Dog Booth, where TBE got to resurrect our much loved food booth at one of Las Cruces' special events of the year; 4) two meetings of the ad hoc Leadership Committee headed up by Jim Rosenthal; 5) our Grant presentation to the Jewish Federation of El Paso's grant committee; and 6) our Special Congregational Meeting on Nov 10. In addition, the Adult Education Committee hosted an Interfaith Discussion on Humility on Sunday, November 20. This was a program that the Rabbi and I developed last year, in which leaders of various religious organizations in Las Cruces participated in a very thoughtful panel discussion on thankfulness. And of course, I hope that all of you and your families enjoyed a wonderful, joyous Thanksgiving holiday.

I want to thank you for your participation and support at the November 10 Congregational Meeting. It provided members of the congregation an opportunity to discuss the issues and to clarify some points. About 60 votes were cast, with the Rabbi receiving 72% of the vote, reelecting him as our Rabbi. When the vote was announced, people seemed genuinely pleased and gave the results, and the Rabbi, a round of applause. I thank Gil and Becca Krebs and Margot Leverett for volunteering to provide a delicious bounty of refreshments that everyone thoroughly enjoyed. I also thank Mark Saltman, Chair of the Security Committee, for giving those present an update on the items we have purchased to maintain a higher level of security for our members.

The ad hoc Leadership Committee, comprised of Jim Rosenthal, Rabbi Karol, Renee Frank, Diane Fleishman, Dee Cook, Sue Brown, Terri Sugarman, and myself, have met twice and will hold a third meeting on Sunday, December 4 at 1:00 pm. Pearie Bruder has indicated that she would like to join us as well. We have read an article and are spending time fleshing out what we feel should be done in regard to improving our leadership skills and how we are going to do it. We have written paragraphs in response to an article we read, and we have discussed our thoughts about our goals. We have also talked about how to utilize resources to create a leadership program here and have discussed the importance of unifying our leadership in order to unify the congregation. An important topic is how we as a board, as leaders, and as a congregation, can become more welcoming. We are working on clarifying our expectation of leadership and determining our commitment level. What do we do that reflects our culture and values? We will share our progress and let you know how it goes.

Finally, Dee Cook, Ann Berkson, Sue Brown, and I are planning the upcoming FestivUS event, the Board-sponsored annual dinner for all congregants to be held this year on Saturday evening, January 21. Invitations to all members will be forthcoming. Please plan on being there to partake in this fun, welcoming, congregational celebration!

I continue to thank you all for your dedication and work on behalf of Temple Beth-El, to remind you to embrace inclusiveness and tolerance, and to continue working together to strengthen our Wisdom, Community Spirit, Tzedakah, and Sacred Purpose.

better way to celebrate an historical Jewish event than to give a donation to the Temple through purchase of a brick, AND to honor a person or event in your Jewish life that is also memorable?!





## ISRAEL UPDATE (A Personal Perspective) WHAT NOW? ISRAEL AND A TRUMP PRESIDENCY By Phil Alkon

Following a divisive, often dispiriting campaign, the American people have elected a President, and a new Administration is poised to take over the Executive reigns of power. Post-election whining, wailing or celebration must now give way to serious thought of what lies ahead for our divided country and a very conflicted world. As Americans, we take great satisfaction in an incredibly smooth and civil transfer of Executive power among deeply opposed political bodies. As Jewish Americans, we also must ask - How will the advent of a Trump Administration, allied with a Republican Legislature, impact America's relationship with Israel? Because Israel's status and fate are inextricably wedded to the future of Judaism and the Jewish people in its entirety, the implications extend far beyond boundaries of the State of Israel itself.

Let's start by considering the U.S.- Israel connection over the past eight years of an Obama administration. I liken that relationship to a double-edged sword. On the one hand, the Administration continued long-standing American policy of supporting Israel's material security needs. On the other, Obama has overseen a significant degradation of political support for and friendship between the two countries. A President who openly apologizes to the Arab Muslim world for the egregious sins committed against it by the Judeo-Christian world, and who openly dreamt of Iran's acceptance into the "community of nations," has managed to turn Israel, the only shared democracy and reliable ally of the U.S. in the region, into a virtual opponent. Critics of Israel, including "progressive" Jewish voices in the U.S., conveniently attribute this unwelcome decay in bilateral relationships to the political leadership, and specifically to Prime Minster Bibi Netanyahu. Without doubt, America's Lecturer-in-Chief cannot abide Bibi's father-like lecturing to him on Middle East realities. But the real issue is far more profound than personal relationship. Obama advertises no such personal animosity towards Turkey's Erdogan, Russia's Putin or other unsavory world figures he encounters on an almost daily basis.

In fact, evidence of a fundamental attitude shift towards Israel arose at the outset of Obama's Presidency, and has logrolled downward ever since. His first foreign policy declaration, a Cairo basedoverture to the Muslim World, pointedly blamed Israeli (i.e., Jewish) "settlements" in the West Bank and Gaza as a major source of regional friction. Although Arab-Iranian leadership totally dismissed Obama's overture for enhanced ties with the West, it was not until late in his second term that Obama found time to visit Israel. Israel's withdrawal from Gaza, the unrelenting military, terrorist and anti-Semitic attacks by Palestinian leaders on Israel during his Administration did nothing to lessen the focus on "settlement" activity (including city or new housing for Jews and Arabs in Jerusalem) as worthy of forceful condemnation. By contrast, explicit calls by Palestinian leaders for elimination of Israel and their celebration of deadly terrorist attacks were largely ignored. Similarly, the President dismissed Iran's calls for Israel's destruction and its support for an international terrorist war against Israel as "mischief." Other negative signs included: implicit blame of Israel for the failed Kerry peace process; condemnation of Israel for Gaza civilian casualties in a war initiated by Hamas; the warm welcome of PLO leader Abbas to Washington as a genuine partner for peace, while Netanyahu was denied audiences with the President; and blatant persona non grata treatment of the Israeli Ambassador to the U.S. I believe that these and other statements, slights and actions represent a concerted policy by the President himself to diminish America's close ties with Israel. The motivation behind this shabby treatment of a trusted ally is beyond my grasp. But then, much of the Administration's incoherent Middle East policy remains unexplained and hard to fathom.

In the recent election campaign, Donald Trump unleashed an unbounded and unfettered condemnation of the Obama Presidency. Nary a single policy, program or Presidential action, domestic or foreign, escaped his often intemperate wrath. His overriding message was that America had suffered an unacceptable decline in self-esteem and confidence at home, and a loss of respect, influence and leadership abroad. He understood the calamity that had befallen the country, and he alone was capable of restoring "America's greatness."

Much of his path to restore that greatness, however, remained unclear. Regarding the Middle East specifically, Trump offered an array of general, often conflicting solutions. He did vow to abrogate the Iran nuclear agreement (the "worst foreign policy disaster in American history"), destroy ISIS and eliminate Islamist terrorist threats to the U. S. and the free world. He presented himself as a strong friend of Israel, and vowed to officially recognize Jerusalem as Israel's Capitol, and immediately move the American Embassy there from Tel-Aviv. We recall that this same promise, by Democratic and Republican presidential candidates, was never fulfilled once they took office. He also vowed to apply his unparalleled negotiating skills to settle the hitherto unsolvable Israel-Palestinian conflict.

Now that Donald Trump is about to assume the Presidency, what do his statements and actions to this point tell us about his administration's likely relations with Israel? First, we note that the President-elect may be shedding much of the troubling "loose cannon" demeanor that typified Donald Trump the candidate. He has adopted a civil, even respectful tone to former opponents, both Republican and Democrat, and a more considered response to programs and ideas that he once condemned unconditionally. I also am encouraged by the effort and time he is devoting to filling important posts in his administration. The surprisingly smooth transition of Executive power now taking place in Washington represents the American political dynamic at its finest. Dare we hope that the President and the President-elect's collaboration in this process may lead to a more civil national climate? No nation will benefit more from a united, confident America than Israel.

That Trump is consulting a wide range of experienced foreign policy experts and practitioners is reassuring, as is his personal outreach to many foreign leaders. Today, in fact, Trump was on the phone with President Obama discussing the implications of Fidel Castro's death. The make-up of Trump's Administration is still a work in progress, but some early choices bode well for a renewal of close and warm ties between Israel and its most important global ally. His Vice-President to be, Mike Pence, is regarded as one of the most ardent supporters of Israel on the American political scene. Pence will serve as a key liaison with a Republican Congress that is likely to strongly support positive Presidential initiatives pertaining to Israel. Trump's forthcoming Ambassador to the U.N., Governor Nikki Haley of South Carolina, is a leader in the struggle against anti-Semitism, and expected to have Israel's back in the international arena. A Secretary of State has yet to be named, but every likely candidate to date has openly embraced close ties with Israel. It is worth noting that Hillary Clinton as President would also have pursued a more robust U.S. foreign policy that encompassed enhanced relations with Israel.

#### Temple Board of Trustees Meeting Summary –November 17, 2016

The November 17 Board of Trustees' meeting was called to order by Ellen Torres at 7:05 pm. Rabbi Larry Karol gave the invocation. The minutes of the October 20th meeting were accepted with corrections.

Rabbi Karol reported on a number of events and activities, including that an online album is being assembled with songs by various Jewish musicians, that will include his song, "Natatah Simchah V'Libi" (You Put Joy in my Heart), and that the Las Cruces Bulletin has asked him to write a monthly column for the Religious section of the newspaper.

President Ellen Torres commented on the many wonderful services and successful events that have occurred in the last month. She thanked everyone for their participation and support at the Congregational Meeting on November 10. A total of 57 votes were cast, including absentee ballots, with 72% of the votes supporting the renewal of the Rabbi's contract.

Allen Blum gave the Treasurer's Report. He stated that the URJ has accepted our proposal for a reduced dues billing for this year. He also reported that with the first quarter income and expenses reported, we are looking at facing a shortfall for the year if changes aren't made. He stated that a significant number of congregants haven't paid their pledges either this year or last year. A discussion ensued about how to keep these congregants active and feeling welcome, and to get them to see the need to pay their pledges. He also reported that the Matzo Ball Open brought in approximately \$5,500 after all expenses were paid.

Leora Zeitlin and Julie Seton made a brief presentation to the Board regarding the Youth Activity Committee and the importance of BETY, BEMY and participation with NFTY to TBE's youth. They are asking for support of the Board with higher emphasis placed on the youth groups and involvement of the youth. Lynne Butner, the SW Regional Director for NIFTY will be in Las Cruces on December 4 from 9:00 am to 1:30 pm. There will be a bagel breakfast for parents and adults; meetings with the high schoolers and middle schoolers. There will be a Tikkun Olam field trip in which kids can decide what they want to buy for charity and an opportunity to sign up for NIFTY.

Mensch Club Representative Jeff Lewis reported that the food booth at the Renaissance Faire took first place for "best food booth". They took in about \$4500 in sales for both days, although Saturday was an ugly, dreary day, and only \$1300 came in that day. They anticipate a profit, although they are still waiting to get all the expenses tallied. Jeff thanked the 25 volunteers from TBE, saying they worked hard and the participation was great.

Membership Chair Diane Fleishman reported there is a boon in new members and inquiries about memberships. She has been following up on referrals, and encourages everyone to give her referrals of potential new members.

President Ellen Torres reported for the ad hoc Leadership Committee that there have been reading and writing assignments to help define specifically what leadership means to TBE, and how we can clarify expectations and work towards creating a more welcoming spiritual environment and inspire greater participation in TBE life.

Plans are in the works for the second TBE FestivUS, a congregational event hosted by the Board of Trustees. The Festivus will be held on Saturday, January 21, 2017.

TBE is working to take advantage of grant opportunities. Ellen reported that ideas that have been developed on how to utilize grant money from an anonymous donor, made available through the Batkin Fund. She also reported on the grant proposal submitted to the Jewish Federation, which would allow TBE to bring in very high quality programs and speakers from which the Jewish community and the community at large will benefit.

The Board meeting went into executive session to vote on accepting a new member to the congregation. The meeting was adjourned at approximately 9:10 pm.

#### Snowman Paul—Children's Book Series by Yossi Lapid



Yossi and Susan Lapid presented to Jim Rosenthal's Short Story discussion group about Yossi's new children's book series, *Snowman Paul*, on Monday, November 28. Susan read the stories, and Yossi and Susan both

offered commentary and led a discussion on the content of the stories.

Written in rhyme, the "Snowman Paul" series celebrates the magic of winter through the evolving friendship between a young boy named Dan and his mischievous snowman, Paul. Whimsical and humorous, the stories also touch upon serious themes such as friendship, peer pressure, family



relationships and ethical values. The stories are based in part on Yossi's youth growing up in a small town in Romania, where winters were long and toy stores were nonexist-



ent. Joanna Pasek, an artist from Poland, complements the narrative with vivid illustrations. Recently, the series was awarded the Silver Medal in the Best Picture Books category of the Moonbeam Children's Books Awards contest

Yossi describes the book's protagonist as someone who "has big dreams and is not afraid to be different. For nearly four decades, I was a professor of political science," he says. "It took some courage to move from researching and teaching international relations to writing picture books for young children. But writing children's books was my secret dream throughout my entire adult life and, now that I'm retired, I am delighted to be able to realize that dream."






