The Temple Beth-El Social Action Committee and Adult Education committee will present a forum and discussion on poverty in Las Cruces on Sunday, Jan 24 at 2:00-**4:00 pm.** The program will begin with a panel comprised of six presenters: Dr. Jim Peach, NMSU economist: Amanda Formica. Ocotillo Institute for Social Justice; Kasandra Gandara, Las Cruces City Council, District 1; Martin Nanna, manager, El Caldito; Matt Mercer, Camp Hope; and Micah Pearson, National Alliance on Mental Illness, Dona Ana County (NAMI). Presenters will discuss the economics of poverty and its impact on Las Cruces; the educational impact of poverty; its impact on families and children; observations from a "soup kitchen"; its impact upon one who has experienced poverty; and the psychological effects of poverty. Ned Rubin will moderate the panel and subsequent discussions.

After the presentations, there will be ample opportunity for those in attendance to ask questions and to have discussion among themselves. There will be some social time for informal discussion with food after the forum ends.

Message from Rabbi Karol

At this writing, I am watching the December 26 snowfall. I was among the many Las Cruces residents who made a last minute stop at the grocery store before significant ground accumulation began. I have taken several photographs already of the scenes of "real winter" around our home.

Normally, the photos I take from our back patio are of the beautiful sunsets to which we get treated on a regular basis. That same vantage point now bears a white covering which is actually just as visually appealing.



Earlier this month, it was Chanukah that added brightness to our community. On Friday, December 11, our Religious School students and faculty presented these thoughts about light: We are a light to others...

- when we help someone.
- when we are honest and caring.
- when we give without being asked.
- when we cheer someone up.
- when we create community.
- when we bring happiness to another otherwise sad person.
- when we are loving and involved with others.
- when we make someone feel welcome.
- when we make people feel good about themselves.
- when we say kind words and make people laugh.

• when we give wisdom, a listening ear, joy and hope. Over the last couple of days, I visited a congregant in an assisted living facility. We spoke for a few moments, and then I read the prayer of hope from the end of the service and we sang "Bayom hahu" together. It definitely brought tears to my eyes to see how a worship melody offered such a strong, enduring memory.

It was an honor to be one of the Temple members who served breakfast at Camp Hope on December 25. It meant rising very early, but it was very worthwhile. We are commanded by our tradition to be eager to perform a mitzvah. I recited the blessing for community service as we began: Blessed are You, Eternal One, our God, Sovereign of the Universe, who made us holy with commandments and commanded us to occupy ourselves with the needs of the greater community." I engaged one man who had come to eat in conversation about scripture and its application to modern events. He and others who came to partake in the meal expressed their thankfulness for the light and kindness we had brought to their day.

Then came Shabbat. On what is a major holiday for the general community, we had over 30 people of all ages gathered for worship, including extended family members of some of our congregants who were visiting from out-of-town. There is a point where we reach a critical mass in the way in which our voices come together for reading and singing. We had that on Friday, December 25 (as well as at our Family

Shabbat on December 4 and our Shabbat Chanukah service on December 11). Each person who joins in participating in the service adds to our collective sound. There are times when that sound approaches the beauty of Las Cruces sunsets or the peaceful nature of the scene of snow upon our landscape. On Shabbat morning (December 26), a number of guests and a core of regulars brought us well over a minyan. That special sound returned, and the conclusion of our worship gave us a chance to speak at length with our visitors (who will return to Las Cruces soon). We then went outside to see the first snowflakes begin to fall.

On December 21, 15 congregants and guests gathered for the first session of our series devoted to Rabbi Dayle Friedman's book, *Jewish Wisdom for Growing Older*. Each person was asked to tell why he or she was attending that night. Their comments and questions all reflected an ongoing search for meaning in our lives:

- How can I remain optimistic and cheerful?
- How do I make the future more welcome?
- How do I become wise? How do you tell your grandchildren what they need to know?
- Learning Jewishly has given me great strength. How can continued learning give me even greater strength?
- How do we learn to move on to the next level of life, whatever that might be?
- How can I continue to be a positive journeyer?
- How do I develop more spirituality in a Jewish framework?
- Having a purpose is the key to living longer. How can I continue to sustain and redefine my purpose in life?

There is so much for us to learn to deepen our knowledge and continue along a path to fulfilling our own purpose and personal mission. We may accomplish those goals through travel, writing, artistic pursuits, reading, and individual study and prayer. My participation in the national conferences that I choose to attend enables me to keep Temple Beth-El connected with the greater Jewish world and to bring back new ideas about how congregants of all ages can generate a special Jewish spirit in the course of study, worship, celebration, community programs and social gatherings. I am grateful for those opportunities to seek new wisdom that can assist us in fashioning meaningful moments that can leave indelible impressions upon our lives.



Sunsets and snow scenes tend to remain with us, as our minds engage in their own type of "photography" to preserve images of beauty. May we do what we can, as partners in Jewish life, to recreate such beauty in our words, in our wisdom, and in the work we do for the betterment of our community.



LIBRARY REPORT

The announcement in last month's Adelante regarding the Library policy for book contributions (non-book formats also welcome) suggests the need for a clarification. The Library in its present configuration will always be too small. (Most libraries, regardless of type, are always too small, even when they're new!). As the last line of Ecclesiastes states, "Of the making of books, there is no limit". We welcome gifts-inkind according to the following criteria:

- By a well-reviewed Jewish author and/or a well-reviewed book on a Jewish subject
- Condition must be very good, near fine or excellent, to wit:
 - •No pencil or ink marginal notes or underlining
 - •No torn pages
 - •No worn corners
 - •Text must be attached to its binding
 - •No weakened gutters (the crease between the binding and the text block, front and back)
 - •We especially welcome new books reviewed in well-regarded periodicals, e.g. Jewish Book Council, Hadassah Magazine, New York Times Book Review, New York Review of Books, Times Literary Supplement (London), Commentary, etc. The Library's collecting priorities include: Jewish genealogy, Crypto-Jewish studies, Holocaust studies, Reference, recent Fiction, Biography, Inter-Faith topics, Art & Archaeology. We place the highest priority on Reference books (a severe lacuna), for the following reason: We will shortly join the Association of Jewish Libraries, a national organization with chapters throughout the country. Accreditation by this organization requires that the library meet its collection criteria. Reference books (non-circulating) include multivolume sets, atlases, encyclopedias, compendia, variant editions of the Hebrew Bible, etc. Additionally our library is quite weak in current commentaries on individual books of the He**brew bible.** The AJL will select a mentor to guide us through the accreditation process.

Library holdings are arranged according to a recent edition of the Dewey Decimal System, the same shelf arrangement used by the Las Cruces public schools and the Branigan Public Library. It is a very user-friendly scheme. We migrate most catalog records from the Library of Congress to our data base, adding copy-specific information as relevant. Occasionally, we consult records from the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion catalog (i.e. all campuses). As I write, there are 1,650 catalog records on the database. The goal is to catalog our older holdings concurrent with new acquisitions so that the Library catalog can be a link on the Temple's web site. We are racing but there was a half-year delay this FY due to technology system delays + an upgrade to our catalog software. (We use a program designed for synagogue and church libraries called Library Concepts, based in Ft. Worth).

We seek subscriptions to the more well-known Jewish periodicals. We encourage DVD's and CD's. We are backlogged in processing those formats.

We like to acknowledge all gifts-in-kind and monetary donations but when books are left with no donor identification, we cannot acknowledge gifts.

Per force, library materials circulate on the honor system. On the corner desk is a circulation file for the circulation card found in the card pocket on the rear cover. Sign your name, phone number, and the date you took the book and leave it on the corner desk. Materials circulate for two weeks. You can renew by phone to **575-525-9300** or by e-mail to krugerl@aol.com."

The Library applied for and received a \$300 grant from Sisterhood last fiscal year toward the upgrade of computer hardware. We have a new corner computer where the cataloging occurs (Windows 10 and other "bells & whistles") paid for from the Library Fund. Frances Williams has kindly agreed to purchase a second new computer for congregant use. Enough money has accrued in the Library Fund for the corner computer, and Windows Office 365 for the congregant computer. The Library is a mini-network. Immediately upon cataloging a title, it displays on both congregant computers. There is also enough money to purchase a library ladder (hand rails on both sides, casters that lock in place, and steps that go higher than the usual household ladder (ca. \$800.00, safety first!). For 10 years, the Library has never requested money from the General Fund.

Our volunteers, Betsy Fuller, Paula Kramer, Ruth Rubin & Dave Zeemont (our technology maven, cataloging wiz and all-around "largo al factotum") are indispensable to the Library's viability and success.

Notes from the December 17, 2015 Board Meeting

For the invocation, Rabbi read the message he was asked to write for the *Las Cruces Sun-News* (to be published December 25) about how we can find peace after a year of violent incidents in our country and around the world. After the Rabbi's report, Board members remarked about the positive PR received by Temple Beth-El, including the publishing of the Rabbi's Chanukah column in both local newspapers.

The President's report included an update on the task force she has appointed to help improve the financial reporting for Temple Beth-El. A new module was purchased for the Rakefet Temple Office Management software to enable tracking of expenses as well as income in one place rather than outsourcing to an Accountant. For now, payroll will still need to be outsourced, but the task force believes that eventually this can be handled in house as well.

Sisterhood, Mensch Club, and Committee Chairs gave reports. Linda Kruger, Library Chair, presented a report on library history and updates. Ellen Torres, Adult Education Committee Chair, provided updates for the many events planned for the coming year. The Rabbi reported for Mark Saltman, Chair of Religious School (who was absent), and for the Religious Practices committee. Ned Rubin, Social Action Committee Chair, provided updates for the Poverty Forum, planned for January, which will be open to the public. He also recommended that Committee Reports be provided in writing a week before Board meetings. This practice was adopted by the Board.

The Board voted to purchase bricks in memory of Mel Taylor and Mary Fitzgerald.

The Technology Committee, appointed to address the continuing needs for computer technology in the most cost-effective way possible, has recommended utilizing cloud storage rather than a hosted server, which could save as much as \$760 over a 3 year period.

Allen Blum is researching new front doors for the Temple, which include glass windows and "panic bars" for improved safety. He presented an option for wooden doors which would not only have all safety features, but also would be very attractive and add to the appearance of the Temple.
