Message from Rabbi Karol D'var Torah for Parashat Vayeitzei December 9, 2016 What is it that gives life meaning?

It might be our relationships, our hobbies and personal interests, our past accomplishments, or our continuing involvement in the greater

community.

We may realize what has meaning to us while we are moving through an experience or, only afterwards, when we have a moment of peace.

Sometimes the realization that something significant has happened to us hits us in the silence that follows a moment of joy or satisfaction.

This past weekend, I heard one of our Youth group members talk about the feeling that participants have once they return home from regional events shared with their peers, including many friends. They call it "withdrawal," something



events shared with their peers, including many friends. They call it "withdrawal," something that, when I was a youth group member many years ago, would have been referred to as "letdown." It is that sense of having been present in moments unlike what we encounter in

having been present in moments unlike what we encounter in everyday life that can make a re-entry into our routine harder than we might expect.

The special, perhaps, even holy, nature of a particular experience may become clear to us afterwards because it is only when we do come back to our usual activities that we understand the lasting impact of where we were and what we did.

Such was the experience of Jacob at the place that would become known at Beth-El.

The description of Jacob's dream, of a ladder to the sky with angels going up and down on it, has inspired artists as well as biblical commentators for centuries.

They have, in their own way, attempted to portray the contents of the dream and to communicate what this vision meant to Jacob and what we can learn from it.

The greatest lesson of this passage may not have to do with the identity or purpose of the angels on the ladder.

The central message is likely in Jacob's reaction to it after he awoke. He declared: "Why, ADONAI is in this place, and I, I did not know it! How awe-inspiring is this place! This is none other than a house of God, and that is the gate of heaven!"

Jacob set up a stone as a remembrance of his dream and named the place, "House of God/Beit El/Beth El." That marker demonstrated that Jacob realized that what came to him that night was incredible, inspiring, and even life-changing.

Nowadays, we don't tend to put up stones after something amazing happens to us. We might tell a story of the event, or write about it, or create an artistic piece that might reflect its impact on us.

Or, these days, our marker for remembrance might be photographs that we have placed in an album on our coffee table or in a picture frame.

That means that the collected photos of weddings, bar/bat mitzvah celebrations, special birthdays, or retirement parties,

or other images that we treasure, enable us to relive memories of those events not just as milestones, but as HOLY moments. They are holy because we want to remember them. Framed

images are all around us as reminders of someone special or an important time. They are like the pillar Jacob put up at Beth-El.

Judaism teaches that God is with us at all times. It may be that, at or after those special occasions, we feel a touch of the divine in our lives more keenly.

But the story of Jacob has one more lesson for us about how special any particular experience or place can be.

Think about the setting in which Jacob found himself. He was likely concerned about his future after leaving behind an angry brother from whom he stole a birthright and blessing, and a father who was likely aghast at what had occurred. Jacob was alone, or so he thought.



He laid down for the night with a plain stone as his head-rest. It was just a non-descript location outdoors along his journey. The Torah says

VAYIFGA BAMAKOM – he came upon the place. It was specific, but it was also generic. It could have been any-where.

But this story tells us that the stone was more than a routine rock, the place was unlike any other, and that what could have been a simple and mundane moment in the life of a patriarch bore pivotal significance in Jacob's personal tale.

This passage uses the Hebrew word MAKOM for place.

The Rabbis turned that word into HAMAKOM, "the place," a name for God that means the "omnipresent One," God who is in everyone, and in every seen and unseen location in our world.

That means that, if we keep our eyes, ears, minds and hearts open, we will be able to see something significant happen at almost any moment, even if the full understanding of its meaning comes only later.

Or, perhaps, our sense that God is with us wherever we are may lead us to make something special happen. We, as God's partners, always have the capacity to infuse sanctity into our little corner of the universe.

Every minute of our lives and every place where we find ourselves carry the secret and the promise of Jacob's dream: that we are always connected to what is holy in the world and in ourselves. That holiness is borne out in memories and mementos that we associate with our own pinnacle experiences.

And so, may we, like Jacob, seek and find what is meaningful and sacred all around us, and may those discoveries direct us to approach every place and every person in the world with gratitude, wisdom and joy, so that our mutual inspiration will take us to a holy place.

From the dedication of our new entry doors December 23, 2016

THE MENORAH—Exodus 25:31-33: You shall make a lampstand of pure gold: the lampstand shall be made of hammered work; its base and its shaft, its cups, calyxes, and petals shall be of one piece. Six branches shall issue from its sides: three branches from one side of the lampstand and three branches



from the other side of the lampstand. On each branch there shall be...cups shaped like almond-blossoms.

LIGHT: I, the Eternal, in My grace, have summoned you, and I have grasped you by the hand. I created you, and appointed you a covenant people, a light of nations. Opening eyes deprived of light. Rescuing prisoners from confinement; from the dungeon, those who sit in darkness. I am the Eternal One, that is My name. [Isaiah 42:6-7] The Eternal One is my light and my help; whom should I fear? [Psalm 27:1] The human spirit is the lamp of the Eternal One. [Proverbs 20:27] The commandment is a lamp, the Teaching is a light. [Proverbs 6:23] Your word is a lamp for my feet, a light for my path. [Psalm 119:105]

The rabbis believed that the menorah from the Temple was so sacred that no effort should be made to reproduce it. Depictions of the menorah over the centuries sometimes had five branches, six branches, or eight branches, but artistic representations still often bore the seven branches.

These doors bear a stylized Menorah. Some see a sevenbranched Menorah in the wood, if you allow your eyes to see six branches floating on a sea of glass. Some see a Chanukiah, both in the wood and in the glass, where the space between the two doors holds the place of the middle branch. The menorah represents the oldest continuous Jewish symbol, our bearer of light from ancient times. The Chanukiah brings light to a dark time of the year. It reminds us of a crucial fight for freedom and how rekindling the light in the ancient Temple illustrates for us how we can rekindle our faith today, at any time, when we allow our heritage to inspire us.

During the day, these doors allow light to come in and for us to sense when someone has a desire to enter our space to join us. At night, we can see the light from within shine forth into the night.

As these doors allow light in, may we be open to the lights of learning, freedom, friendship, love, hope and God's presence so that they can suffuse our spirits. As these doors reveal the light within to the darkness of the outside world, may we share our lights with our community, the lights of wisdom, wonder, creativity, commitment, kindness, and peace. May we enrich ourselves every time we walk through this entryway, and may our personal and communal growth offer new and unique gifts to the world. We recite this verse from the book of Psalms to consecrate these doors and all that they represent:

בְּנְדָבָה אֶזְבְּחָה־לֵךְ אֶׁוֹדָה שָׁמְךָ יְהָוֹה כִּי־טְוֹב Bi-n'davah ez'b'chah lach - Odeh shimcha Adonai ki tov. With a generous gift, I make an offering to You, O God; I give thanks to Your name, for it is good. (Psalm 54:8)



ISRAEL UPDATE

AN ISRAEL NEWS GUIDE by Phil Alkon

There may be no better way of gaining important insights into the nature of a country or a society than by examining its media – how it functions, what it says about itself and how it sees the world at large. This is especially true for a society like Israel that prides itself as a haven of free speech and that boasts of a vibrant, contentious press. Given the dearth of objective, let alone sympathetic, coverage of events dealing with Israel in world media, Israeli news sources offer many unique insights not otherwise available to the average reader.

Here I critique some English language media sources that I rely on regularly to help fix my addictive Israel news habit. This is an admittedly personalized and selective sample of the many, readily available, Israel-based information sources. My choices do not represent the full array of political and philosophical viewpoints represented in Israeli media. But I hope they are a useful starting point for the interested reader. And most are free, on-line sites.

As hinted above, much routine media coverage of Israel is selective, incomplete and biased, especially when dealing with the Israel-Palestinian conflict. It has become axiomatic in world news coverage that Israel can do nothing right and the Palestinian Arabs can do nothing wrong. I don't recall a single opinion piece in the New York Times over the last decade, for example, that has not cast a negative shadow on Israeli policies and actions. This bias extends into reporting itself, where positive events are simply ignored and even neutral events are negatively one-sided. My first reading recommendation, therefore, deals with a corrective to false media coverage of Israel. That source is Honest Reporting (honestreporting.com) a well-informed, professional watchdog dedicated to the principle that Israel is "entitled to fair treatment by the world press according to the same standards applied to any other country." Hardly a radical call to action. HR vigorously examines a wide swath of Englishlanguage news sources, informs them directly of demonstrably unfair and erroneous coverage, and very often achieves corrective revisions in the news items. Originally founded by a group of British university students and faculty, and now based in Jerusalem, HR is an essential counterbalance to what has been an increasing trend in anti-Israel bias in the world media. I urge you to check it out regularly and support their work.

Now to Israeli news sources, and my take on three newspapers that I read on a daily basis. *Haaretz* (haaretz,com) has long represented the "progressive left" of the Israeli political spectrum and, as a former Labor Party supporter, I continue to follow its English edition. But to my mind *Haaertz* has fallen on hard times. Having hitched its political star almost entirely to achievement of an Israeli-Palestinian peace, it faces the growing reality that Palestinian leadership is organically incapable of peacefully accommodating a sovereign Jewish state under any tenable conditions. *Haaretz* speaks for a shrinking political left that now lacks a credible national political program and credible national leadership. Its news coverage and commentary is heavily weighed to shrill and tiresome attacks on the political center and right, especially as personified by Prime Minister Neyanyahu. One hopes that this old-line champion of Israeli liberalism can discover positive visions and aspirations that resonate with the Israeli people.

My other regular online newspaper reads are the Jerusalem Post (jpost.com) and the Times of Israel (timesofisrael.com), both of which offer wider viewpoints than Haaretz. Created as the Palestine Post in 1912-the Yishuv's first English-language daily-I would characterize the Post as providing broad and accurate news coverage with a politically right-of-center editorial perspective. The Times of Israel, founded in 2012, reports comprehensively on "developments in Israel, the Middle East and around the Jewish world," and is published online in six languages, including Arabic and Persian. It is independent and intended to not "have any political leanings." This according to Editor and Founder David Horvitz, a prominent newsman, formerly with the Jerusalem Post. Its coverage reflects a wide range of political, social and religious views.

Two Israel-based periodicals that the Alkons subscribe to are the weekly *International Jerusalem Post* newspaper and the slick bi-weekly *Jerusalem Report* magazine. Both offer well-written, thoughtful reports and commentary on a wide range of current events and issues. Either one should satisfy the interested beginner.

For computer addicts, two daily on-line news broadcasts are available in English - a morning news summary on ILTV.TV and a later daily update on jerusalemonline. Each provides brief and easy to digest headline reporting of major daily events.

In summary, my suggestions here represent a fraction of the remarkable array of English-language news sources emanating from Israel. Please let me know of your favorites, including those not acknowledged here, that you would like others to know about. Finally, at the risk of totally overwhelming the uninitiated, I must mention that various Israeli government agencies also produce excellent on-line information dealing with important aspects of life in what may be the most remarkable country on Earth. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs, for example, has excellent pieces on Israel's international relations at mfa.gov.il.

Meanwhile, happy trails on the path to enlightenment!

Temple Board of Trustees Meeting Summary – December 15, 2016

The December 15, 2016 Board of Trustees' meeting was called to order by Ellen Torres at 7:07 pm. Rabbi Larry Karol gave the invocation. The minutes of the November 17th meeting were accepted.

Rabbi's Report: Rabbi Karol reported that he is continuing to keep track of congregants who have gone through surgery and those in recovery. The Adult Education program, "Humble Enough? The event was covered on the front page of the LC Sun News on Thanksgiving Day and featured in photos in the LC Bulletin on December 9. The Rabbi made presentations on Chanukah at Valley View Elementary School, at Amistad Advanced Pre-School of the Las Cruces Public Schools, and at J. Paul Taylor Academy.

The Rabbi reported there are 4 B'nai Mitzvah coming up in 2017. He recounted a conversation with Amy Asin, the URJ Vice President for Strengthening Congregations, who said there is a good possibility that the URJ can send someone to do leadership consultation and training for us this coming year. And he announced that his and Rhonda's first grandchild is to be born in 2017 as well!

President's Report: President Ellen Torres remarked on the loss of Steve Halper and how deeply she felt about honoring him at his funeral. She also reported, as did the Rabbi, that the visit by Lynne Butner, the SW Regional Director for NIFTY, in which she met with the youth groups, parents, and board members, was quite successful and should result in renewed energy and hopefully greater participation in youth activities. She reported that the ad hoc Leadership Committee continues to meet to discuss what leadership actually means for TBE. Plans for the FestivUS, a Board-sponsored event to be held on Saturday, January 21, right after Havdalah service, are continuing to unfold. The Board is planning a very special event to honor and appreciate the TBE congregation.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Allen Blum reported that to date we have received 55.8% of budgeted member pledges, and 60% of budgeted donations and fundraiser receipts. The Matzoh Ball Open brought in about \$5500 in net income. He reported that there are still a number of pledges that have not been paid and that efforts are being made to reach out to those who are past due.

Bill Stein reported on the outcome of the Jewish Federation Grant Proposal: TBE's proposal for "Beth-El Scholars-in-Residence", received a grant amount of \$13,142.86 to bring in high profile Jewish speakers/ performers to Temple Beth-El during the coming year.

Michael Lieberman reported on an hoc committee meeting to evaluate needs for inductive loop hearing support devices at TBE, and made a motion for a short term solution of purchasing hand receivers, headsets and loops along with an ear-mounted microphone for the Rabbi. This motion was seconded and approved by the Board. Information about the availability of this equipment will be added to the Accessibility page of the TBE website. Longer term solutions for those who are hearing impaired will continue to be evaluated.

Allen Blum reported that Jeff Brown has approached him regarding a number of TBE artifacts and historical items he has and would like to provide to the Temple. Other congregation members also have historical items. The Board discussed re-activating the History Committee mentioned in the TBE Constitution, and to ask Jeff Brown to chair it. There was also discussion to consider writing a grant proposal requesting funds to cover bringing in a historian/archivist.

The Board discussed a request made by politicians Bill Soules and Joanne Farrary to hold constituent meetings at TBE. Renee Frank moved to approve the request so long as the customary fee is charged. Jeff Lewis seconded, and the motion was passed.

The Board went into Executive Session at 9:06, and adjourned at 9:23.
