

Message from Rabbi Karol Keep our views...holy and high Thoughts and a prayer on Parashat (Portion) Korach June 20, 2014

This week's Torah portion of Korach begins with selfishness and ends with selflessness. It starts with community members who sought for themselves what they thought was the ultimate power over their people without mentioning the responsibilities that come with a position of leadership.

The parashah ends with the command to the Levites to tithe, to give a tenth of all they had received from the people, back to God. Those serving the people were reminded that they were ultimately like everyone else, even while performing special duties of worship and leadership.

That lesson was one of humility, but it was also intended to elevate their souls in order to gain a divine perspective of respect and care for all of the people.

In light of this message, I offer this prayer: Eternal God,

Enable us to help and to hear those in need, so that they will be able to live with hope and security.

Give us confidence to overcome our fears when the prospect of change or the threat of discrimination or prejudice prevent us from taking bold steps forward that could enrich our knowledge, our relationships and our lives.

Bless us with Your nearness, Your mercy and Your love. Amen.

ISRAEL UPDATE

TWO CRISES by Phil Alkon (Submitted on June 22)

1. Three of Our Boys Are Taken. On the night of Thursday, June 12th, three Israeli teens - Naftali Frenkel (16), Gil-ad Shaar (16), and Eyal Yifrach (19) - were abducted while at a hitchhiking stop on their way home from a day of religious study at the famous Makor Hayim yeshiva. Hitchhiking is a common form of transport among Israeli youth, and even though their stop was on the West Bank side of the Green Line, the surrounding Jewish communities of Gush Emunim are considered "safe," and will be incorporated into Israel proper under any conceivable two-state peace arrangement with the Palestinians. By Israeli standards, at least, the boys were engaged in normal commuter behavior. At the time of this writing, some 10 days later, they are still missing, and it now appears certain that Hamas operatives kidnapped them. As you know, Hamas is the Jihadist Palestinian organization that controls Gaza, and also enjoys considerable popular support in the West Bank. The "moderate" Palestinian Authority (PA) recently formed a unity government with Hamas, thereby precipitating an abrupt cessation in the U.S.-sponsored peace negotiations between Israel and the PA. In a region of endless ironies and hypocrisy, PA President Mahmoud Abbas actually condemned the kidnapping to the outside world, but the crime was heartily endorsed by the leadership of Fatah, his own political party and sole power base. Given that Abbas' PA has done nothing in 40 years of power to diminish Jewhatred among the Palestinian people and the delegitimization of Israel's right to exist in the international community, why are we not surprised by Fatah's celebratory stance?

Israel has mounted a massive effort to save the kidnapped boys, including house-to-house searches and the roundup of Hamas activists. The IDF rescue mission has focused on the Hebron area, where Israeli intelligence believes the boys are being held and may still be alive. That effort has generated mob violence among Palestinians against Israeli soldiers and has reportedly resulted in the death of two Palestinians. The Israeli public and much of the Jewish world is galvanized in the hope of a expeditious rescue, despite a possibly delayed reaction by the police in response to a cellphone alert by one of the victims soon after they were in the kidnappers' hands.

Why are we also not surprised that much of the world press response to the incident is ambiguous at best, if not downright hostile to Israel. Some examples, led by the reliably warped British media, included a Sky News headline reporting that *Israeli Arrests Risk Igniting a New Conflict*. Their reporter's ingenious explanation was that "Making Hamas pay for a crime they've been accused of may make sense to the Israeli mind-set, but unleashing military force on a political organization inevitably impacts the lives of civilians living in and around them." So Hamas is really no

more dangerous than the British Labour Party, and how can you really blame the Hamas "activists" for not realizing that Israeli teens were civilians in a civilian community? The Independent, another staunch ally of Palestinian victimhood (at least when it comes to Israel), headlined a Facebook note by one of their reporters that Israelis were being called upon to kill a Palestinian terrorist for every hour until the missing teenagers are found. No question of who the real baddies are; and no mention of Gaza residents passing out candies to passers by in celebration of the kidnapping as yet another heroic act of Palestinian resistance. The New York Times' Judie Ruderon, continuing her campaign for Palestinian spokesperson of the year, could not fail to mention the inconvenience that the kidnapping and its aftermath was creating for West Bank residents. One Palestinian complained of possibly having to delay his daughter's wedding owing to the entire hubbub; and the local social media, she dutifully reported, was full of commentary that Israel itself had actually staged the kidnapping to get back at Hamas. Meanwhile at the UN, the Secretary-General's office announced that it had no evidence to confirm that the Israeli youths had actually been abducted. It's hard to forget that the UN Human Rights Commission has found Israel guilty of 80% of the world's human rights violations (according to the cases it has undertaken to review). No question of hard evidence there.

Finally, another heart-warming story pertaining to the Israel-Palestinian conflict, but much closer to home. The Presbyterian Church of the U. S. has tossed its hat (or mitre) in the BDS ring. At it's recent annual meeting, the church voted to cancel a \$21M investment in three U.S. companies (Caterpillar, Hewlett-Packard and Motorola) for their involvement in the Israeli crimes against the Palestinians. According to the Presbyterians, these companies have variously contributed to the destruction of Palestinian homes, the naval blockade of Gaza, and the militarization of illegal Jewish settlements. But don't take this in the wrong spirit. Church leaders assure us that the decision was not a judgment against Israel; and in no way reflects on "our lack of love for our Jewish sisters and brothers." Whew! For a minute they had me worried.

2. Now Iraq Implodes. Not much space left to discuss the disappearance of the Syria - Iraq border, the ascendency of religious and tribal extremism in the region, and other deep turmoil plaguing the Arab Middle East. We are witnessing a historical convulsion of Tolstoyan proportions, and there is nothing that the outside world can do to manage the process. In contrast with the barrage of inane military and political solutions offered by the talking head community in the U.S., Israel is not saying much. But I do believe that Israel is identifying it's *ultimate* security priorities in the face of the regional upheaval, and assuring that it can act expeditiously to meet these *essential* needs. A good model for the U.S. and the Western World, I would say.


