Message from Rabbi Karol at the May 10 Temple Beth-El Annual Meeting When I think about congregational life, there is

always one set of statements to which I return from the Sayings of the Rabbis, Pirkei Avot. In Pirket Avot, Chapter 1, Saying 6, Rabbi Joshua ben Perachyah, who lived in the Second Century

BCE, declared: ASEI L'CHA RAV – Find for yourself a RAV – a rabbi or a teacher. U-K'NEI L'CHA CHAVER – acquire for yourself a friend, companion or a partner for study. VE-HEVEI DAN ET KOL ADAM L'CHAF Z'CHUT – and judge everyone favorably, towards their merit OR give everyone the benefit of the doubt.

The first two statements of this three-part quote sound like they are appropriately paired one to the other. One is about finding someone who knows more than we know from whom we can learn. The second declares that we should find a peer, an equal with whom to study after sitting at the feet of our chosen RAV. It may be that ASEI L'CHA RAV doesn't just mean to find a teacher. It may challenge each of us to turn ourselves into teachers. Through our accumulated wisdom and experience, we can all be dedicated and knowledgeable educators and mentors. Rabbi Joshua, if he were here, would urge us to take the time and energy to make that happen: to be teachers and guides who show care and patience to those we hope to train as leaders through refining skills and sharing new insights.

The word CHAVER in modern Hebrew means more than being a colleague, peer or study partner. Its primary meaning is now "friend." That notion of friendship in Judaism still comes from the relationship of two people who learn together, side-by-side, or from the teacher-student connection.

In a story from the Chasidic tradition, a student once professed his love for his rabbi, to which the rabbi responded, "Do you know what hurts me?" The student, confused by the response, said, "My teacher, I said that I love you! Why do I need to have any idea about what hurts you?" The rabbi responded, "If you do not know what hurts me, then how can you say you love me?"

Being a CHAVER in a fellowship of study and communal activity in a Jewish context ideally means developing and sustaining a deep friendship and partnership, where two people not only learn and grow alongside each other, but care about each other as human beings. And it can apply, just as much, to congregants who work together and Temple leaders who make decisions in concert with one another, combining the best of their knowledge to take the congregation forward with a sense of meaning, vision and purpose.

So what about that third part of the saying—"DAN ET KOL ADAM L'CHAF Z'CHUT"?. Literally, it means, "judge each person according to his or her merits or good points." Working and learning in close quarters with friends and colleagues might create moments where our impatience can get the better of us. Rabbi Joshua was telling us something that we have likely learned time and again in our own lives. Sometimes we just want other people to accentuate our positive traits when they think about their partnership or friendship with us. And if we want other people to do that for us, we need to reciprocate in kind. For the rabbis, that was the key to sustaining relationships within a community. Always tipping our view of people with whom we serve towards the positive side will make any institution or organization to which we belong, including Temple Beth-El, warmer and stronger.

This saying of Rabbi Joshua Ben Perachyah is echoed in the new Temple mission statement, which brings us together under this expression of guiding principles: "We strive to be a place where spiritual growth, tradition and ritual provide meaning and comfort to every person who comes through our doors. Temple Beth-El encourages its members to learn, celebrate, serve, and grow together, so that each person will have the fullest opportunity to share the beauty of Jewish expression."

This mission statement embodies the first two parts of Rabbi Joshua's teaching by noting that, at Temple Beth-El, we "learn celebrate, serve and grow together" to seek "meaning" and "comfort." Hopefully, it is not only ritual, tradition and individual spiritual growth that provide each of us with meaning and comfort. Rabbi Joshua would remind us that it is our partnership and engagement with each other that offer us meaning, through the relationships we create and maintain, and comfort, through the ways in which we can, should and hopefully do reach out to one another. A recent article about congregational life described congregations as having the potential to be based either on gratitude for each other, including the clergy person, or on critical and harsh judgment of one another. In congregations and in any organization, no one is perfect. No one can do everything, not a lay leader, not a clergy person. Giving each other the benefit of the doubt means looking at what someone has done over the course of days, months and years. And if it seems that something that needs to get done is falling by the wayside, rather than offering criticism, it may be a time to reach out a helping hand in patience and genuine camaraderie. When we see each other as part of the whole who can lift up one another towards communal growth and achievement in the most cheerful, enthusiastic and positive way, there is nothing we can't make happen.

So look at the listing of Temple programs provided tonight and you will see the blessings that our partnership brings us. Worship, study, opportunities to socialize, giving back to the community, and hosting our neighbors for our amazing and wildly successful Jewish Food and Folk Festival show what we can do when we are partners, colleagues and friends who work together for the betterment of our Temple and of Las Cruces. There are many areas in which we can improve and refine how we do what we do in order to be more caring, more open, more welcoming, more inclusive, and more thoughtful. We have established strong foundations in all of those areas upon which we can build to make our congregation a place that reflects the best of the Jewish heritage and spirit.

President's Report, Annual Congregational Meeting May 10, 2016

In my May Adelante message, I have tried to provide my personal thoughts related to my experience as president, so today, I would like to briefly mention the board's accom-

plishments since May 2015. The credit goes primarily to many of the Temple committees that have worked diligently to make improvements in their areas of responsibility. Moreover, the recently added *Security Management Committee* is bringing a new and necessary level of attention to temple security.

You might know that we have a new website, e-mail system, and PayPal is being used for donations and Dues payments. We had a bit of a crisis when our accountant quit, but an ad hoc committee worked hard and our financial accounting system, with the help from an excellent bookkeeper, is supporting a new transparency. As a result, the Treasurer and Budget Chair are now able to provide accurate accounting data using Rakefet. Rakefet is the Jewish Institutional Software program that also enables us to keep all necessary data related to the congregation in one location for easier access and updates.

You may have noticed that the temple grounds are looking better and better in large part due to the Memorial Garden and Brick Walkway, a work in progress about which you will hear more from Alison Mann. The new benches also add a touch of class. Additionally, as you may know, there is a new or renovated front door in the planning stage which will further improve the aesthetics of the temple.

The revival of the Mensch Club will hopefully convince more men to become members, not only for the benefit of TBE but also for their personal enrichment as Jewish men in a small Jewish community. Congratulations to Jeff Lewis, its new president and representative on the board of trustees.

By now, you will have received the newsletters from the Jewish Federation of El Paso in addition to the NM Jewish Federation's publications. We are members of both organizations and we can henceforth apply for grants and enjoy programs offered by both. El Paso (our primary Federation affiliation) asked for TBE representatives and two of our members, Bill Stein and Dave Zeemont, have agreed to represent us on the board of the Jewish Federation of El Paso.

Mike Batkin is renewing his pledge to match donations to the Batkin Fund up to \$1800. Recently, Mike provided additional funds to add to the interest we received from the Fund's investment which was used to assist 5 families for their children's religious school tuition. He also offered to sponsor 2 trees in the Memorial Garden. We thank Mike, who, despite living in El Paso and belonging to all 3 shuls there, continues to remember us in his philanthropic giving. You might have heard about the Verizon proposal to install three small cell antennae on our roof in the back of the building. It is awaiting the board's approval subject to contractual language. If agreed to, it would provide a monthly income of \$300 (It's the maximum we could get).

Finally, we are blessed to have been remembered in the last wills of a former congregant, Mary Fitzgerald, and a friend of the temple, David Brandhorst, who both died last year. May they rest in peace. What a lovely way to remember a community you love, by helping it even after you've left this earth!!!

David Brandhorst's generous gift enabled us to share a portion with the **Center for Spritual Living Las Cruces**, whose members cared deeply for the deceased, both in word and deed. You will hear more about this from Dave Zeemont tonight.

Special mention needs to be made of the two fundraisers that keep our financial situation in a positive mode. The Matzo Ball Open Golf Tournament in the fall is one, and the Jewish Food and Folk Festival last month is the other. This community is so grateful for the efforts of all involved. Moreover, these events bring the community together. Shortly you will hear from the two women behind it all.

Our congregational community was brought together at the TBE Board sponsored FestivUS celebration in January which was enjoyed by young and old alike, and I received many compliments and encouragement to do it again.

Much good has been accomplished and much needs to be done. Only by volunteering your time and expertise can we continue to exist, let alone thrive. If you are not already doing so, please consider becoming involved.

Thank you for the trust and kind words I have received from you. In retrospect, this experience as your president has enriched my life, and I will always be devoted to TBE. As I mentioned in my Adelante article, my husband, Bob Kimball has been an extraordinary helpmate, hands-on and intellectually. Much credit and gratitude goes to him, so, in the near future, I'm taking him on a trip abroad!

Mensch Club Film—*Berlin 36* Sunday, June 5, 2016—2:00 pm Synopsis by Ford Parkes-Perret

Gretel Bergmann (GB) was a German-Jewish high-jump star and would have won the gold medal in the 1936 Olympics, had she taken part. She was born on April 12, 1914 in Laupheim, a town

near the Swiss border. Her father owned a factory which produced hair products. Judaism played no part in the lives of this nationalistic family. From childhood on, GB was always engaged in various sports, including running, swimming, tennis, and skiing. She attended the town's modern secondary school, a boys' school where she played handball and soccer. In 1933, when the Nazis came to power, her high jump of 1.51 m. placed her among the best in Germany. But in 1933, she was kicked out of the Ulm soccer association because she wasn't an Aryan. Her father, Edwin Bergmann, a WW I veteran and athlete, made frequent business trips to England. In London, he registered his daughter at the London Polytechnic, where she was immediately accepted into the college's sports teams. In June, 1934, she became the English high-jump champion.

In 1936, Nazi Germany faced a crisis. The United States threatened to boycott the Summer Olympic Games if German-Jewish athletes were barred from competing. GB's family was threatened if GB did not return from England. At a government-sanctioned camp for Jewish athletes, she met her future husband, Bruno Lambert, also a high jumper, in 1935. In 1936, GB took part in the Olympics camp in Ettlingen in southern Germany. During training she was given a roommate, Dora Ratjen, who, as she found out, was a male. He was to replace her on the team. They ended up becoming good friends.

Unbeknownst to GB, she was to participate in the Württemberg Field & Track Championships in Stuttgart held 3 months before the Olympics. GB was brought to the championships and, without time to warm up, she set her best time ever and achieved the German record.

Shortly after that, the American Olympic team arrived in Germany, permitting the Nazis to conclude their charade. Now at home, GB received the following letter: "Looking back on your most recent performance, you could not have expected to be chosen for the team. Heil Hitler." The gold medal for the high jump went to Ibolja Czak, a Hungarian Jew. Her German Olympic colleagues were informed that an injury prevented her from participating in the Olympics.

But wait! The film might be almost over, but the story is not. In May, 1937, GB emigrated to the USA. She stayed with her brother, Rudolf (who lived in an apartment in Brooklyn), and worked as a cleaning woman to earn money to help Bruno Lambert to come to the States and to study to certify as a physician. She later worked as a physical therapist. Her parents and her younger brother, Walter, also came to the States. GB vowed never again to return to Germany. GB became an American citizen in 1942. During World II,

Bruno joined the US Army as a field surgeon. He took part in the Battle of the Bulge and was discharged as a major in 1946. Bruno established a practice in New York in internal medicine, while GB cared for their sons with their very unGerman names of Glenn and Gary. Her two brothers also enlisted and served in Europe. Walter was in Intelligence and interrogated German POWs. Her brother, Rudolf, later worked for CBS and became Program Director. Dr. Bruno Lambert died in 2013 at the age of 103. GB has been living in Jamaica Estates for the last 40 years. She is now 102 years old.

Summary of 2016 Annual Congregational Meeting Temple Beth-El, Las Cruces, New Mexico May 10, 2016

President Monika Kimball called the meeting to order at 7:05 pm. She welcomed all congregants and said that their presence shows they care. The Rabbi delivered the invocation (See page 9). The 2015 minutes were read by the current Board Secretary, Ellen Torres, and were approved as written.

President Monika Kimball delivered her report (see page 4 of this issue of the Adelante).

Rabbi Karol presented Monika Kimball with a plaque for her service to the Temple, and then presented his annual message (see pages 3 and 7).

Paul Feil presented the Treasurer's report. We thanked him for his service. We currently have 136 member families. Members can communicate with the Treasurer using the following email: <u>treasurer@tbelc.org</u>. He thanked the families and estates of Mel Taylor, Mary Fitzgerald, and David Brandhorst, for their generous donations to the Temple. He stated that he only has data for three-quarters of the year, but there is more money in the bank than there was last year. The fundraisers have been absolutely fabulous, a tremendous amount of work.

Dave Zeemont spoke about David Brandhorst and his ties to Temple Beth-El. He presented Temple Beth-El with a check from the David Brandhorst estate for \$50,000.

Reports were presented by the Adult Education Committee, the Youth Committee, the Biblical Garden/Brick Walkway Committee, the Israel Committee, and the Wednesday Breakfast group.

Rebecca Berkson and Aggie Saltman reported on the Third Annual Jewish Food and Folk Festival. (see page 8 for a summary of their report from the meeting minutes).

Monika Kimball asked all Board members to stand up and be recognized. She announced those who would be stepping down and those who would be remaining. Those remaining include: Diane Fleishman, Renee Frank, Ned Rubin, Ellen Torres, and Erich Zameret. Those stepping down include: Paul Feil, Monika Kimball, David Fishman, and Mark Saltman. Members Allen Blum and Ann Berkson are on the slate for another term. She also thanked Leslie Glater, Sisterhood Council Rep, and Dave Zeemont, Mensch Club president, for being Board representatives, and who are also stepping down. Monika also thanked Rabbi Karol for all he does for the Temple and the Board.

Monika Kimball introduced Jim Rosenthal, Chair of the Nominating Committee. He thanked the members of his committee for all their hard work. Then he called up the Board Candidates to speak: Ann Berkson, Allen Blum (statement read by Monika Kimball), Susan Brown (statement read by Marieka Brown), Pearie Bruder, Michael Lieberman, and Susan Michelson (statement read by Jim Rosenthal). The slate was approved by acclamation.

A change in the Constitution to permit electronic voting by members of the Board of Trustees was approved by the congregation. Following the Annual Meeting, the new board met to elect officers. Here are the officers of Temple Beth-El for 2016-2017: President-Ellen Torres Vice-President-Ned Rubin Treasurer-Allen Blum Recording Secretary-Renee Frank Jeff Lewis, the new Mensch Club president, will be Mensch Club representative on the Board of Trustees.

Last August, the bombs that exploded at two local congregations placed everyone on alert. Even while I was away at a convention that weekend, I still received the news about what happened, and coordinated with local and Temple leaders to open up our Shabbat service that Friday night to the general community. We had an increased attendance that evening, with guests from a variety of faith groups joining us in our worship. Without changing the language of our prayers, our service was able to touch our neighbors in a way that they had not expected. That is the power of what we have as Jews, and that is a gift we can continue to share in many ways with others, and, mainly, with each other within these walls.

My deepest gratitude goes to Monika Kimball, the Temple Board, to committee chairs and members, the Golf Tournament committee and participants, Sisterhood, Mensch Club, BETY, Religious school faculty, students, study group participants, singers and musicians of all ages, and all who give to Temple something special from their own essence. Report on the 2016 Jewish Food and Folk Festival From the minutes of the Annual Meeting on May 10, 2016

Rebecca and Aggie were each presented with a bouquet of flowers and words of gratitude for their awesome JFFF 2016.

Candidate Forums held at Temple Beth-El in May

On two consecutive Tuesday evenings, May 17 and May 24, from 6:30 to 8:30 PM, Temple Beth-El, the Social Action committee and Adult Education committee, at the request of one or two primary candidates, hosted two political forums. On each night, about 10 primary candidates participated. On the first night, attended by between 50-60 people, primary candidates for the offices of



County Treasurer, District Attorney for the 3rd Judicial District, and state Representative candidates for District 35 and state Senate candidates for District 36 were invited. All invited candidates attended and answered questions formulated by the social action committee, congregation members and members of the audience. Likewise, on May 24, the second forum was held for primary candi-



dates for County Commission District 4 and District 5. At the second forum, about 35-40 people were in attendance. This also included one of the candidates from the previous forum and a candidate running unopposed in the



primary, but who wanted to know if we would be having another political forum in the fall, before the main election.

Many of the candidates participating remained after the actual forum to participate in the "social" hour for some food and more intimate conversation with constituents. It seems that the candidates appreciate the format of our forums and enjoy the more informal conversational opportu-

nities afterwards. Several made a point to comment on the comfort of our setting, format, and the number of folks who seem to come to participate in the audience. From the comments of both audience members and forum partici-



pants, it seems that Temple Beth-El is developing a reputation in the community for providing some non-partisan, educational events valued by the community at large. We



hope to provide another opportunity for congregation and community involvement in an upcoming forum, which we are planning as a follow-up on poverty and with a menu of opportunities for *tikkun olam*, by getting involved in volunteer activities available in the community.

I must thank the hard work and dedication of the social action committee, Win Jacobs and Jim Rosenthal, as well as other congregants, in submitting, developing and formulating relevant, thoughtful questions and for the active participation of the audience members in likewise submitting thoughtful questions which evoked candidate responses which were not simply parts of "canned" statements.

We anticipate another political forum in the fall for the final candidates for local and state-wide office. The committee hopes that you will participate by submitting questions for the candidates and attending the forum. 
the wonder embodied in the natural setting that surrounds us. *Mah Rabu maasecha Adonai!*
