





<u>Message from Rabbi Karol</u> <u>Remarks at TBE Annual Meeting</u> <u>on May 10, 2018</u>

This is the day that the Eternal One has made! Let us rejoice and be glad in it! ZEH HAYOM ASAH ADONAI - NAGILAH V'NIS'M'CHAH VO.

Every day should be such a day as declared in Psalm 118, but we fall into our routines. We may see some of our activities, our time spent with family, and our presence in the community, as special. Still, days that "God has made" may be, for most people, few and far between,

14 years ago today was my mother's funeral. A few weeks later, that verse from Psalm 118 became the basis for a song that I created to remember my mother at the urging of Debbie Friedman herself. I applied that phrase to my mom's life because I felt that she treated every day just that way.

In our family, and in the world of Reform Judaism, this past Sunday promised to be a day that God had made, as Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in New York City was holding its ordination ceremony for rabbis (including our daughter-in-law Juli) and cantors at Congregation Emanu-El on Fifth Avenue, I was all set to march with the students and alumni in the processional, to sit with Rhonda, Adam, and Juli's parents, Steve and Nancie Schnur, and to ascend the bimah with Juli to give her a blessing after she was formally ordained by HUC-JIR President, Rabbi Aaron Panken.

It should have gone just that way, but...it didn't.

We had been with Adam, Juli and Josh on Saturday afternoon and evening. Earlier that day, I had attended the chapel service at Congregation Rodeph Sholom, where Juli will be an assistant rabbi come July 1. I went to the service so I could recite Kaddish for my mother on the day before the 14th anniversary of her death.

After we returned to our hotel room Saturday evening, I called Juli's parents, and Nancie Schnur asked me if I had heard what happened. She told me that Rabbi Panken, an experienced airplane pilot, had been flying that morning with an instructor in a single engine plane. The plane had crashed, and while the instructor survived, the EMTs were not able to save Rabbi Panken. At that point, we were able to find a few reports online about the tragic accident.

One post on my rabbis' conference Facebook members group on Saturday evening, wondering if we had heard about a terrible turn of events, became an online ongoing communal expression of shock, sadness and poignant remembrance. "This was the day before ordination," some said. "What will the service be like?", they wondered.

Rhonda and I wondered that, too. Adam spoke with Rhonda and I called Juli a bit later. A rabbinic student at HUC-JIR in Los Angeles texted me to tell me to give Juli a hug for her.

We arrived at Temple Emanuel on Sunday, not knowing what to expect. The staff was there, and some of my rabbinic colleagues were arriving. The HUC-JIR faculty had taken the students into a private room to speak with them, to comfort them, and to enable them to express their grief, as it was the first time they had all come together after hearing the sad news. The rabbi who was supposed to ordain them would not be able to finish the task he had begun as their leader and mentor. Rabbi Norman Cohen, a scholar, author, former provost of HUC-JIR, and one-time acting president of the college, was chosen to ordain the students as they came up before the ark, one-by-one, during the service. Alumni who had come to march in the processional were comforting students, staff, and faculty, as well as each other. Students gathered for preservice photographs and still smiled, knowing that special moments and the culmination of their studies awaited them, as well as the beginning of their journeys as rabbis and cantors.



The sadness in the air in the downstairs social hall accompanied us to some extent as we moved upstairs and processed into the sanctuary. Faculty and others who spoke at the service made sure that the students knew that while it was appro-



priate for them to feel grief for the death of their teacher and leader, and gratitude for what he gave them in his service to the college, it was also fitting for them to experience joy on this milestone day. Once the ordination part of the service began, there was a gradual change in mood in the Congregation Emanu-El sanctuary. The students went before the ark to receive their individual blessings from Rabbi Cohen. When it was Juli's turn, she and I ascended the bimah together. Rabbi Rick Jacobs, president of the Union for Reform Judaism, gave Juli a

hug, having known Juli and her family for many years as his

congregants at Westchester Reform Temple (Rabbi Jacobs is at the far right in the blessing photo above). Rabbi Cohen ordained Juli, and then invited me to come up before the ark to offer my private words of blessing and encouragement to Juli.

After that special moment, we descended the bimah, where Adam



and Josh were waiting for us in the aisle towards the front of the Sanctuary.





ALDEN SOLOVY DREWORD BY RABBI MENACHEM CREDITOR



The service continued with a sense of accomplishment and simchah not only for the students, but also for all of the family members and friends present to celebrate the moment. The assembled congregation had come together in the spirit of Mazal Tov, and, on that day, there was an added touch of ZECHER TZADIK LIVRACHAH, may the memory of a righteous teacher who had died the day before be for blessing, and may his legacy continue.

Juli wrote on her facebook page on Sunday: "Today I experienced how strong community can be. Today I was ordained a rabbi."

Fourteen years ago, after my mother had died, I witnessed her community in Kansas City and my community in my own congregation offer comfort, support and solace in great measure, to the point where I was able to celebrate my mother's life on the day of her funeral and afterwards. This past Sunday, family members, rabbis, cantors, friends, HUC-JIR staff and faculty, and rabbinic and cantorial students about to be ordained, lifted each other up more than enough to be able to feel joy even while harboring grief at the loss of a teacher, rabbi, colleague and friend.

And isn't that what community is about? Aren't we supposed to be present for each other at times of joy and achievement, as well as at moments of sadness and challenge? If a sudden and unexpected death does anything, it makes us realize what is important in life and in the relationships we create as part of a congregational community. It's about the creative ideas that we fashion together and then bring to fruition. What is important is not that we always agree, but that our disagreements find a pathway to resolution and to making us and our congregation better than we were before. What is important is that we stand by each other, realizing that we are part of the same team, where any divisions we may perceive melt away when we consider how well we come together at times of triumph and accomplishment, and how we are sincerely present for one another at times of sorrow. What is important is that we successfully commit to standing by and with each other during a four-hour period each year at the Jewish Food and Folk Festival, fulfilling the Jewish value of welcoming guests, being as hospitable as Abraham and Sarah, and feeding them as well! What is important is that members of all ages at Temple Beth-El can find ways to practice the seven habits of happy people cited on the website <u>www.pursuitofhappiness.org</u>: express your heart by cultivating relation-ships; perform acts of kindness for other people; keep moving; find your flow, an activity in your skill set that gives you enjoyment; discover meaning and your purpose and place in life; discover and use your strengths; and treasure gratitude, mindfulness and hope.

Most of you gathered here tonight know that we try to provide opportunities to practice these habits of happy people. Those avenues of pursuit and experience materialize when we join together to make them happen. That means that we need to frequently be HERE, as one congregation, as one community.

As your rabbi, that's all I ask. Rhonda and I were with a community of people on Sunday who had never been together before, and will never be together again in the same place for the same purpose. Somehow, we were all able to forge our way onto the same page, in a spirit of holy presence, cooperation, and, for many, love. I know we can do that, too.

Through the leadership of our board, led by Ellen Torres as Temple president; through committees that have been active and contributed quality to our Temple life reflected in learning, camaraderie, and giving; through the sparkle in the eyes of our children in Religious School and in BETY/BEMY; through Sisterhood and Mensch Club programs; and through your presence here for worship and at other events and programs, most any day at Temple Beth-El can be a day that God has made, a day on which we can rejoice and be glad.

At this point in the continuing history of Temple Beth-El, I hope that we will continue to be partners in fellowship, in creativity, in friendship, and in engendering wisdom, joy and hope among us now and in the months and years to come. May our efforts make that vision come to fruition on every single day of our time on this earth that God has made just for us.

Dave Zeemont to be recognized at the Jewish Federation of Greater El Paso Annual Meeting on June 6, 2018 As Temple Beth-El Volunteer of the Year

The Temple Board of Trustees has selected Dave Zeemont to be recognized as the Temple Beth-El Volunteer of the Year at the Jewish Federation of Greater El Paso annual meeting on June 6.

Dave Zeemont grew up in New Jersey and graduated from Fair Lawn High School and Rutgers University. He and his wife, Lynn, moved to Las Cruces, New Mexico, from Rockland County, New York, settling in the Coronado Ridge area of Picacho Hills. He

spent most of his working career as an independent general insurance agent and broker.

He is a past President of the Picacho Hills Property Owners Association, having served on their board for six years. He is currently President of the Coronado Ridge Neighborhood Association.

He was also a board member of Safe Haven Animal Sanctuary, the only no-kill shelter in southern New Mexico and was their immediate Past President.

Dave spends much of his time as a volunteer driver for the Disabled American Veterans (DAV) Transportation Network, taking area veterans to their VA medical appointments in Las Cruces and El Paso. On their behalf, he has logged over 100,000 miles. He has received the President's Lifetime Achievement Award in 2015, and a Las Cruces Mayor's Citation for Community Service in 2017.

Dave was instrumental in arranging the significant bequest by David Brandhorst to Temple.

Dave's ongoing activities at Temple Beth-El include:

- Member of the Library Committee and Assistant Librarian.
- Past President of the TBE Mensch Club, currently Treasurer.
- Former member of the Board of Trustees for five years.
- Member of the Food Committee for both the Jewish Food and Folk Festival (JFFF) for the five years of its existence, and the Renaissance Faire
- Founding member and Trustee of the Rabbi Gerald M. Kane Scholarship Fund.
- Facilitates the set-up of our large video screen and video equipment for Temple events.

Happy 20 Chai

Last year the Irving Batkin Memorial Scholarship Fund produced \$1,024.00 in earnings that will be distributed as scholarships in 2018.

Shortly after January 1, 2018, I had a conversation with Rabbi Karol and I wished him a Happy New Year. He pointed out to me that the Gregorian year 2018 could be read as "twenty chai." As most readers of "Adelante!" know, in Hebrew the letters that correspond to 18 also spell the word chai (life). To most Jews the number 18 is considered "lucky". Twenty chai (2018) equals 360. Therefore, I am making the following offer for 2018: I donate \$3,600.00 in matching money, to double as many as 10 contributions of 20 chai (that's \$360.00) to the Irving **Batkin Memorial Scholarship** Fund made between January 1st and July 31, 2018. In addition, I will match all other contributions to the fund (up to an additional \$1,800.00) made in the same time frame. That's a total of \$5,400 of matching funds. I believe that there are at least ten members of Temple Beth-El who believe in the value of supporting Jewish education in Las Cruces who will donate twenty chai in 2018 and see their donations doubled, and for those who want to grow the fund, but cannot donate 20 chai, their donations (up to the additional \$1,800.00) will also be doubled.

In short, what we learn from the latest edition of KIDS' CHADASHOT is more about ourselves and our community. That's what newspapers do. By writing so clearly, interviewing members of our community, using great photos and commenting on various topics, you follow a long and proud newspaper tradition.

(This is the obituary for Rabbi Aaron Panken from the HUC-JIR website. In light of my Annual Meeting message, I thought it would be appropriate to share this with the congregation—Rabbi Larry K.)



Rabbi Aaron D. Panken, Ph.D., President of Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR), died tragically in a plane crash on May 5, 2018, at the age of 53. He served as the 12th President in HUC-JIR's 143-year history.

The funeral service was held on Tuesday, May 8 at Westchester Reform, Temple in Scarsdale, New York.

Dr. Panken led the four-campus international institution of higher learning and seminary for Reform Judaism. HUC-JIR's campuses in Cincinnati, Jerusalem, Los Angeles and New York provide the academic and professional training programs for the Reform

Movement's rabbis, cantors, educators, and nonprofit management professionals, and offer graduate programs for scholars of all faiths.

Rabbi Panken was a distinguished rabbi and scholar, dedicated teacher, and exemplary leader of the Reform Movement for nearly three decades. As a product of the Reform Movement's camps, youth movement, and seminary, his passionate commitment to Reform Judaism, to the State of Israel, and to the Jewish people worldwide inspired his efforts to ensure HUC-JIR's academic excellence in fulfilling its sacred mission. As HUC-JIR President, Rabbi Panken implemented his transformative vision by forging strategic planning initiatives: embedding new technology in support of student learning and administration, strengthening recruitment to yield the largest incoming classes in a decade, launching new Jewish education, nonprofit management, and entrepreneurship programs and academic partnerships, and invigorating the ties linking HUC-JIR's four campuses in Cincinnati, Jerusalem, Los Angeles, and New York and their larger communities and regions. He was a staunch advocate for religious pluralism in Israel and was proud to have ordained the 100th Israeli Reform rabbi graduating from HUC-JIR's Israeli Rabbinical Program on November 16, 2017.

Rabbi Panken was elected HUC-JIR President by the Board of Governors on July 31, 2013. His appointment was effective on January 1, 2014 and he was installed on June 8, 2014 in Cincinnati. Ordained by HUC-JIR in New York in 1991, Rabbi Panken joined the HUC-JIR faculty in 1995, and taught Rabbinic and Second Temple Literature, with research interests in the historical development of legal concepts and terms; narrative development; and development of holiday observances.

At his inauguration convocation, he said, "For me, Reform Judaism has always symbolized what I consider to be the best of Judaism – firmly rooted in our tradition, yet egalitarian, inclusive of patrilineal Jews and intermarried families, welcoming to the LGBT community, politically active, and respectful of other faiths and ideologies."

An ardent supporter of Reform Judaism in Israel, Rabbi Panken said, "As the only North American seminary with a full campus and programs in Israel, we are uniquely positioned to influence both Israeli and North American society, and to ensure that the relationship between these two great centers of Jewish life continues and thrives. We will work hard to improve the understanding and integration of Reform Jews worldwide with our Jewish State and with all our global partners."

A native of New York City who graduated from Johns Hopkins University's Electrical Engineering program, Rabbi Panken was a certificated commercial pilot and sailor.

Rabbi Panken is survived by his wife, Lisa Messinger, his children Eli and Samantha, his parents Beverly and Peter, and his sister, Rabbi Melinda Panken of Congregation Shaari Emeth in Manalapan, NJ. Funeral services took place on Tuesday, May 8, at 1:00 pm at Westchester Reform Temple.

Even as we mourn the loss of our colleague, teacher, and friend, the vision that Rabbi Aaron Panken brought to Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion remains a source of hope and comfort to those who mourn and the Jewish community. Annual Meeting/Board Meeting Summary May 10, 2018

The Annual Congregation meeting took place on May 10, 2018. Ellen Torres thanked many members for their services to the Temple as Board members, as committee and event chairs/ participants, as participants in onegs and worship, and as our reprsentatives to the Jewish Federation of Greater El Paso. Ellen and Rabbi Karol prepared a booklet discussing the many Temple activities and Rabbi's activities that took place during 2017-2018. Michael Mandel gave a financial report to the Congregation. Ellen and Jeff Brown led a discussion about two proposed amendments to the TBE Constitution and 13 proposed amendments to the TBE By-Laws. Jim Rosenthal introduced candidates for seats on the Board Trustees, and they gave brief presentations about their backgrounds. Members then voted on the candidates and amendments, and enjoyed desserts while Dee Cook led a team that counted ballots cast at the meeting and absentee ballots. The following persons were elected to two year terms on the Board: Sue Brown, Pearie Bruder, Cheryl Decker, Michael Mandel, Ruth Rubin, and Joanne Turnbull. All of the proposed amendments were adopted.

The Board meeting was held immediately after the Annual Congregation Meeting. Allen Blum gave a preliminary Budget Committee presentation. The following officers were elected for 2018-19: Ellen Torres, President; Jeff Lewis, Vice President; Michael Mandel, Treasurer; and Jeff Brown, Secretary. The Board discussed a meeting/orientation for former and new Board members, the Nominating Committee, and our JFGEP representatives. The Board began a discussion about Board members' responsibilities. Ellen discussed future interactions with the Jewish Federation of Greater El Paso.

<u>Update on the Verizon Cell Phone Towers</u> <u>Ellen Torres, Temple President</u>

In early 2016, Verizon approached the Board of Trustees of Temple Beth-El to lease some of our roof space for booster towers. Verizon completed an engineering study of the roof, and gave us a few different proposals, one of which was eventually accepted by the TBE Board. They offered \$300 per month, \$3600 a year, for a minimum of 5 years, which amounts to \$18,000money the Board felt we could use to help TBE with mounting expenses. The lease could be extended for up to 20 years, with the lease amount increasing in future years. It is possible that this contract will garner up to \$90,000 to TBE with little to no downside. Back in April 2016, the Board moved to accept the Verizon proposal, and the motion passed unanimously. This information was shared with the congregation. Verizon will install a sub-electrical meter to gauge their energy usage, for which they will be responsible. They are also working on covers for the towers that will match the color and texture of our building. The covers will be installed in the next few weeks. In addition, regarding radiation emission concerns, the radiation from the cell towers for any one person is less than the radiation from a microwave in a home. We will continue to share any additional information with the congregation as it becomes available. Thank you for your understanding and patience.





VISITING CONGREGANTS WHO ARE ILL OR HOME-BOUND


