Yevgeny Kutik, a Russian-American concert violinist, will present a "Meet the Artist" event at Temple Beth-El on Wednesday, March 2, at 7:00 pm. He will appear with the Las Cruces Symphony Orchestra on the weekend of March 5-6, 2016 as well. Mr. Kutik will play a few unaccompanied short pieces and speak about his family's emigration from Belarus. Message from Rabbi Karol "What if the lights go out?" - D'var Torah for Parashat Tetzaveh - February 19, 2016 "You shall further instruct the Israelites to bring you clear oil of beaten olives for lighting, for kindling lamps continually...L'HA-ALOT NEIR TAMID."

Aaron and his sons, the Israelite priests-to-be, would set up the lampstand of gold - M'NOROT ZAHAV - on which the lights would be kindled.

And, as the Torah tells us, so they did. And there was later a menorah in the Temple in Jerusalem, also with seven branches, that was kept lit with the same dedication and commitment.

That Temple did not endure, nor did the second Temple.

The Arch of Titus in Rome shows someone - likely a Jew from vanquished Judea after the failed Revolt - carrying the Temple

menorah in Rome as one of the spoils of a difficult war. So what happened when the lights went out?

And they did go out - at least, the lights on the Temple lampstand (and lamps designated as perpetual lights in the

Temple) did.



There were other lights that took their place.

There was the menorah image that began to grace the walls and floors of ancient synagogues, such as the one in the photo from the Beit Alpha synagogue in northern Isra-

el. The menorah, as well as the Eternal Light, the Neir Tamid, became standards symbol in Jewish houses of worship.

There were also physical candleholders or lamps and real lights that became part of each Jewish home, in the form of Shabbat and holiday lights. There were no Temple priests to kindle those candles or lights. The responsibility fell upon each family, especially the woman of the household, to be sure that those lights burned every week. Where the Torah said that the Israelites would be a dominion of priests, that designation comes true at every Shabbat dinner. When Shabbat blessings are recited at home on Friday night, the family members are like the priests of old.

There are other lights that could have gone out. But they didn't.

The light of faith in God continued because we learned that God's presence need not be confined to a Temple - it could be anywhere. We realized that it was possible to approach God through prayer wherever we might be, including when we gather in synagogues as a community. Prayer, the rabbis explained, was the offering of our hearts.

The light of learning could have stopped 2000 years ago, but it didn't. Rabbi Yochanan Ben Zakkai, who escaped Jerusalem under Roman siege during the revolt of 66-70 CE, was granted the right to set up a house of study, a BEIT MIDRASH, in Yavneh on the Mediterranean sea coast. His persuasive powers enabled Jews to continue to discuss,

debate, and develop their heritage, a practice that has come down to us today. Classes for members of all ages in modern congregations are a tribute to the rabbis who sustained our tradition against great odds so long ago.



There is a light of hope that could have been extinguished many times throughout history, but it wasn't.

So many places where Jews have lived were inhospitable to some degree. The communities survived because their traditions of prayer, celebration, study and performing acts of lovingkindness strengthened them throughout the centuries. If one country sent members of its Jewish community packing, they almost always found a new home and thrived once again. That would include, among other places, the United States and the State of Israel.

There is a light of freedom that has inspired members of Jewish communities to work for liberty wherever they have lived. There are scholars and leaders who claim that freedom may serve for some as a chance to leave Judaism behind. Oth-



ers disagree. Dr. Jonathan Sarna of Brandeis University noted that, in 1818, the United States Attorney General, William Wirt, declared that no Jews would

be left in our country in 150 years, or by 1968. In 1964, Look Magazine featured a cover bearing the title "The Vanishing American Jew." That article of the same title by Rabbi Max Schenk suggested that the American Jewish community would disappear in a generation or two. The last time I checked, we are still here.

Some predictions today claim that all liberal forms of Judaism will die out in the next 50 years due to a declining interest and participation in synagogue life and a decreasing birth rate.

Will our light, in fact, go out?

Not if we continue to gather as a community.

Not if we find new ways to learn from one another and teach each other. Not if we celebrate holidays and special life moments that demonstrate an infusion of new ideas and revitalized spirit.

Not if we remember that the principles of "loving our neighbors" and "loving the stranger" as ourselves direct us to act with kindness towards one another and to engender partnerships with people of all faiths and backgrounds.

Our light will not go out as long as we pray, and sing, and sustain the ideas and values that lead us along a path of creating a community, a nation, and a world based upon justice and peace.

May we keep these lights burning continually as preservers of our faith and tradition and as compassionate members of the human family.

# **President's Message March 2016**

Ever since Las Cruces experienced the bomb incidents last year, communities of faith have struggled with assessing their places of worship in terms of security management. Temple Beth-El is no excep-

tion. An ad hoc committee, chaired by board member Mark Saltman and congregants Jim Rosenthal, Brad Jenkins, Terry Sugarman, Jerry Silverman, and Dia Taylor, has done an outstanding job on our behalf. They have met with local security experts, including the Las Cruces Police Department, and conducted research utilizing sources such as the Department of Justice, Homeland Security and the Anti-Defamation League. Their detailed findings and recommendations will be sent to you via temple email. If you agree that safety and security of our temple is of great importance, I urge you to read it and provide your support. Should you have questions, you may contact one of the committee members for further clarification

I think that, in these volatile times, we must be vigilant even in a seemingly safe environment such as Las Cruces, New Mexico. Therefore, I feel compelled to make this ad hoc committee a standing committee, because the topic of security is not a temporary one and continued vigilance is necessary. While we cannot eliminate all dangers, I believe that it is our duty to provide a safe place of worship for congregants and our children, now and for the future.

There are initially two components to begin the process of creating a more secure temple environment. The first one focuses on building security and the second one entails educating congregants about the new features and how to behave in a possible volatile situation. The LCPD is committed to assisting us with this task. In the meantime, I have suggested that we establish a specific fund to which you can donate money to offset security related expenses. It will be added to the list of funds we presently have and Paypal may be used to make contributions. You will see it listed in this edition of the Adelante along with the

other fund choices. At its next meeting, the board of trustees will vote on the proposal and on fund allocations. At that time, we may have to establish a hierarchy of needs, because not all recommendations might be financially feasible all at once. In any case, I strongly recommend that we start the process of creating a safer, more secure worship environment at this time. After all, it is our second home, a place we love. I hope you concur, and as mentioned above take a look at the committee's report or request a hard copy from Mark Saltman.



When Jewish sacred books those that have God's name in Hebrew (YUD-HAY-VAV-HAY)—printed in them get worn and can no longer be used, Judaism has a tradition of burying those books in a designated place. Sometimes, that spot has been inside or

near a synagogue and, when it is, it is called a GENIZAH (meaning a "hidden place").

We have a number of prayerbooks, old Torah commentaries and other texts that are ready to be placed in a GENIZAH. Rhonda Karol's 4th-5th Graders screened the books in our storage room to choose which ones will need to be bur-


ied. Congregants who have sacred books that are worn and would like to have them buried should bring them to Temple by March 4.

#### After Kotel compromise, dramatic changes still needed by Rabbi Uri Regev

There is much to rejoice over when considering the details of the Kotel compromise agreement. For the first time, there is going to be a section of this ancient site open to egalitarian and non-Orthodox worship alternatives, as well as partnership and women's *minyanim*. It's the first time that non-Orthodox representatives will be appointed as part of a governmental authority overseeing such an important site. It presents an option for the general public other than the Charedi-controlled Kotel area.

With all of this significant progress in mind, we should also recognize that, until it reaches full implementation, there will be obstacles and much time elapsing. Moreover, the painful sacrifice involved is mostly on the part of Women of the Wall (WOW) and the non-Orthodox movements that are now removed from the historic Kotel site — a move WOW leadership has fiercely criticized in the past, and which some of its members, as well as many Modern Orthodox women who are not part of WOW, resent because it denies them their free religious expression without their consent and without consulting them. Furthermore, the compromise cements the ultra-Orthodox control over the historic Kotel section while giving their challengers a section behind a tall partition, which was never under Orthodox authority. The key concern, though, is over the larger challenge of religious freedom and equality in Israel. The celebratory messages expressed by the parties to the agreement will undoubtedly be used by Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu as a demonstration and actualization of his promise "to ensure that every Jew will feel at home in Israel," while in truth it avoids addressing the real issues that impact the lives and dignity of so many Israeli and Diaspora Jews. So, as welcomed as the Kotel compromise is, it must not distract world Jewry from the need for dramatic changes in Israel in such critical arenas as freedom of marriage and divorce, who qualifies as a Jew, and statesanctioned, religiously based gender discrimination. Stanley P. Gold, chairman of Hiddush — Freedom of Religion for Israel, pointed to an important lesson to be drawn from this change in Israeli governmental policy. Namely, that Diaspora - and especially Jewish-American — pressure is an effective vehicle when applied in partnership with Israeli activists and organizations to bring about changes to the problematic alliance of religion, state and politics.

"It should encourage us," Gold said, "not to treat Israel as if it were some delicate china doll, too sensitive to touch, let alone criticize.

"On the contrary," Gold continued, "the progress made over the Kotel should convince our fellow communal leaders that we need to further engage in the religion-state clash, and that Israelis need our support and partnership in advancing the Jewish state's own core founding principles of religious freedom and equality for all."

#### SUMMARY OF BOARD MEETING February 25, 2016

The meeting began with a moving invocation written by the Rabbi, which was read by some of the Board Members.

Jerry Silverman then advised the Board about the Building and Grounds committee's annual budget, building and grounds repairs and maintenance needed, both immediate and in the future. In addition we were told that new granite benches were ordered for the Temple entry way and that they would arrive by March 6<sup>th</sup>.

The Rabbi reported on his successful trip to St. Louis and reported on the upcoming Shabbat Across America event on Friday, March 4<sup>th</sup> at 6PM. The general public is encouraged to attend. There will also be a special service on March 6<sup>th</sup>, 11:30 AM, when old and worn out religious books will be buried according to Jewish Law.

Monika Kimball talked about the success of the FestivUS celebration. She also reminded us that the Nominations Committee will be meeting on March 3<sup>rd</sup> to discuss the 8 nominees, 6 of whom will replace outgoing Board Members.

Paul Feil gave his Treasurer's report along with the most up-to-date figures for the fiscal year so far. A Chart of Accounts will be emailed to the Board Members shortly.

Leslie Glater, representing the Sisterhood, advised us that this year the Passover Seder will start at 6PM on Saturday, April 23 and that the cut-off dates will basically be the same as last year. She also mentioned that the kitchen ovens were in need of an overhaul.

Dave Zeemont reported that at the upcoming Mensch Club Meeting, this Sunday at noon, a new constitution will be proposed and elections will take place. As part of the Technology Committee he also stated that the 2 new computers in the Library were up and running, and that some 2,000 volumes have now been entered into the system.

Adult Education Chair Ellen Torres stated that Yevgeny Kutik, Belorussian violinist, who will perform with the Las Cruces Symphony on March 5-6, will present a "Meet the Artist" event at Temple on March 2 at 7PM. In addition, the Di Kavene Kapelye Klezmer group from Albuquerque has agreed to perform at this year's JFFF.

Chair Renee Frank reported that her Marketing and Public Relations Committee has met with the Membership Committee in order to design a user friendly spot on the Temple website for new members. They are also working on a media and press release template which will incorporate a uniform design for future announcements.

Mark Saltman, Chair of the now standing Security Committee, has received approval to move forward on the first phase of priority installations of the front door intercom and doorbell camera. Additional funds and installations will be forthcoming.

The Board voted unanimously to approve the name change of the social hall to honor past president David Steinborn. It will now be known as the David Steinborn Social Hall. The Board also approved the creation of a new separate fund which will handle all present and future gifts and bequests to the Temple in excess of \$5,000.

The next Board meeting will be held on Thursday, March 24th, at 7PM.
