Message from Rabbi Karol

Just after the High Holy Days, a family friend clued me in on a statement from a rabbi in a city "far, far away" on Yom Kippur afternoon that should have had all of our ears burning. On October 12, Rabbi Rick Jacobs, President of the Union for Reform Judaism,

led a study session entitled "The Jewish People: Unity, Not Unanimity" at Central Synagogue in New York City (Manhattan). He spoke about the ways in which conflicts within the Jewish world can overtake us and may, at times, prevent the possibility of even polite conversation. He cited instances in the struggle to guarantee the right to egalitarian prayer at the Western Wall which featured a lack of discourse, even when such opportunities were given (one ultra-Orthodox rabbi actually hung up on him when Rabbi Jacobs asked him for a chance to sit down and talk).

This text was all in the video that I shared in a recent email to the congregation, but I want you to see these words from Rabbi Jacobs in print: "Are we really going to make within our circle...room for people who denigrate us, who not only disagree with us, but absolutely oppose everything that we are? The answer is, I think, that's a part of what being a Jewish community is. I don't want to be in a Jewish community with just the people who are just like me. How boring would that be? I actually don't even always agree with myself....How about you? Do you ever find yourself in an internal conflict about what you really think or about what you really believe? So...how do we actually shape a community where we have people who really disagree? When I asked you before about stretching the boundaries, no one used the names of political parties. I think that it would be a good thing to figure out how...we really become a Jewish community with progressives and more conservative voices, that we have all the different polarities, all the different approaches to ritual, all the different approaches to what it means to live life with holiness, a life of purpose. So for us, this is not just an issue at the Western Wall, it's an issue here in New York. It's an issue in Las Cruces, New Mexico."

When I first heard that Rabbi Jacobs had mentioned Las Cruces, I was greatly surprised. It was special to get such a "shout-out" from the head of the Reform movement. There is more to learn and to remember from his statement. I recommend that you watch the entire video at the following link on YouTube:

For our own community and congregation, I have thought a great deal about the issues raised by Rabbi Jacobs. After listening to his presentation, here is the D'var Torah I created for the Board meeting on October 20 to address and echo his thoughts:

Eternal God, we find ourselves, every day in this world, searching for partners, colleagues, friends and community members with whom we can share our perspectives and find affirmation from our discussion.

Or, if we have the persistence, and the courage, we can engage in a conversation with people who may not share our ideology or positions, but with whom we may agree on a common hope for contentment, for personal subsistence, for a modicum of prosperity that would fulfill the statement of the rabbis: "Who are rich? Those who are happy with what they have - with their portion in life."

Take us higher, Holy God, to reach for some measure of holiness in our lives.

Guide us to work for fairness and justice that is blind to who people are in their personal heritage or background, a justice that hinges on determining which actions tip the scales of humanity towards goodness or towards evil.

Remind us, Compassionate God, that You hope that we will find our own compassion and act upon it in the presence of others.

Lead us, God of all creation, to show consideration to this universe and this world, respecting all that You have made. Inspire us, O God, Author of Freedom, to look deeply into ourselves to understand what constitutes freedom.

For us, for our fellow citizens, and for people of the world, may the memory of the slavery we left behind so long ago enable us to find ways to work together for liberty in the four corners of the earth.

And may our concern for freedom and justice lead us to make peace for all the inhabitants of the earth as You make peace in the highest heavens.

President's Message Below is my Yom Kippur Message to the Congregation. I decided to have it printed as my message for the November Adelante:

L'Shanah Tovah! Happy New Year!

I'm so happy to see all of you and to stand here as your President at this holiest time in the Jewish year. You know, when I tell my non-Jewish friends and colleagues that I'm taking the day off for the Jewish New Year, they think I am having a party. But I guess my kind of party is celebrating through prayer and togetherness with you, my tribe.

I've been reflecting for a while about what I was going to get up here and say, and it happened that I saw a tribute by Barbra Streisand to Shimon Peres on his 90th birthday on Facebook. She said she wanted to sing his favorite song, Avinu Malkeinu. I thought about that and decided I wanted to address the meaning behind the words of this prayerful melody and tie it into an important message.

During Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, we recite Avinu Malkeinu, one of the oldest and most moving litanies of the year. Translated as "Our Father, Our King," this is a prayer with many verses. Throughout the Ten Days of Repentence, five lines of Avinu Malkeinu that refer to various heavenly books include the word *Kotveinu* ("Inscribe us"). During Ne'ila, this is replaced with *Chotmeinu* ("Seal us"). This reflects the belief that on Rosh Hashanah all is written and revealed and on Yom Kippur all decrees for the coming year are sealed.

In the new Reform High Holy Day Prayer Book, *Mishkan HaNefesh*, it includes a version of Avinu Malkeinu that refers to God as both "Loving Father" and "Compassionate Mother," reflecting a contemporary revision of the prayer in the interests of gender neutrality. This tells me that we welcome progressiveness in Judaism, and that needs to be incorporated into all we do as Temple leaders and congregants, and encourages us to open our hearts and minds to everyone who walks in our doors and everyone we encounter in our daily travels.

If we sincerely believe in the importance of being inscribed in the Book of Life, then we must do what is right, be ethical in all our actions, follow the Golden Rule, and fight for a more just society. At the heart of

Judaism lies a commitment to Tikkun Olam—repairing the world. It is a sacred calling that underlies our Jewish identity. As Temple leaders, we hold high expectations for ourselves because leadership is a sacred responsibility. We work on your behalf, and we take our responsibility seriously.

I thank you for all your dedication and work on behalf of Temple Beth-El. And I want to remind you to embrace inclusiveness and tolerance, and to continue working together to strengthen our Wisdom, Community Spirit, Tzedakah, and Sacred Purpose so that our names, too, can be inscribed in the Book of Life

Shanah Tovah!



New short story series features Israeli author Amos Oz

Attention all Temple Beth-El fiction lovers. It's time once again for a new short story series, this time featuring "Between Friends" by Amos Oz. Our series began on **Monday Oct. 31 at 10 a.m.** in the social hall and will continue for six weeks.

As always, this informal reading group is open to anyone who enjoys reading and discussing short stories over a cup of coffee with a group of friendly people. The price of admission is \$18 which goes to the temple Adult Education Committee for future programs. If you want to join us, all you have to do is purchase the book which is available on Amazon and, perhaps at local bookstores, and then just show up. Oz, who is regarded as Israel's most famous writer, is a novelist, journalist and professor of literature. He served in the Israeli army (1957–60, 1967, and 1973). After the Six-Day War in 1967, he became active in the Israeli peace movement and with organizations that advocated for a two-state solution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. In addition to writing, he worked as a part-time school-teacher and laborer.

In "Between Friends," according to Amazon, "Oz returns to the kibbutz of the late 1950s, the time and place where his writing began. These eight interconnected stories, set in the fictitious Kibbutz Yekhat, draw masterly profiles of idealistic men and women enduring personal hardships in the shadow of one of the greatest collective dreams of the twentieth century. A devoted father who fails to challenge his daughter's lover, an old friend, a man his own age; an elderly gardener who carries on his shoulders the sorrows of the world; a woman writing perversely poignant letters to her husband's mistress. Each of these stories is a luminous human and literary study; together they offer an eloquent portrait of an idea, and of a charged and fascinating epoch. Amos Oz at home. And at his best."

Temple Board of Trustees Meeting Summary -October 20, 2016

The Board of Trustees met on Thursday, October 20, 2016. Rabbi Karol gave the invocation, and reported that during the High Holy Days, 76 individual members of the congregation participated in our worship services, and counting people who took part in group aliyot, the number was closer to 100. He reported about the Shabbos Project sponsored by the Jewish Federation of El Paso on November 11-12, and about the second annual panel discussion featuring local religious leaders, organized with the Adult Education Committee, on November 20. Rabbi Karol continues to be involved in many other community and religious activities.

President Ellen Torres reported that the Rabbi Review Committee has finished its interviewing and collecting of information, and will be providing a summary report at the congregational meeting on November 10. New members have been welcomed to Temple Beth-El, and more are anticipated. She mentioned that the Membership Committee has expanded under the leadership of Diane Fleishman, and plans for welcoming activities for our new members.

Treasurer Allen Blum reported that 1st Quarter Statements have gone out, and reminded everyone 25% of dues must be paid by the 1st quarter in order for members to be in good standing, according to the TBE constitution.

Jim Rosenthal, Nominating Committee Chair, led a discussion on Leadership Development for TBE, based on very thoughtful materials developed by the URJ. The Board agreed that this is an important issue, and asked Jim to lead an ad hoc committee to develop ideas and recommendations.

The Jewish Federation Grant Proposal continues to move forward - more information will be forthcoming. The board discussed the process for providing documentation for expenditures in the interest of being good stewards of TBE resources. The board also began the planning process for the Annual Dinner (or second Annual FestivUS) for the end of January. This is an event sponsored by the Board for the entire congregation.

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
