Message from Rabbi Karol Part I

As I pondered the theme for my invocation for TBE Board meeting on October 19, 2017, I remembered that I had not yet shared the list of "what makes a mensch" that emerged at our Selichot discussion on September 16. I developed this "Mensch

Meditation" that would bring our list to life: Eternal God, You have shown us what is good and what it is to do good.

Be our strength when we commit ourselves to honesty in a world that may not always appreciate the truth.

Be our beacon when we try to pursue an ethical standard of behavior that is based on integrity and decency when some people in our world may have lost their way.

Be our inspiration when we seek to be considerate and kind towards others and may our kindness spread throughout our community and beyond.

Be our guide when we apply all that we have learned about living with people to approach everyone in a spirit of fairness and justice.

Be our support when we seek forgiveness and when we forgive others so that all may know inner peace and wholeness.

Be our mentor when we seek to share what we have, so that we will give unselfishly, with consistency, and without hesitation, no matter where we may be or what we are doing.

Be our teacher when we discover that there are rewards that will come our way when we act with humility and when our words and actions are the result of thoughtful deliberation.

Be our hope, encouraging us to always live up to our own aspirations for the many ways in which we can improve ourselves and the world.

Part II

There was a reason that our "what makes a mensch" list came back into my mind. Casey Rosenberg has been meeting with me on Sunday mornings as part of her post Bat Mitzvah/Confirmation program. In our discussion on October 15, I shared the proclamation from the White House that declared October 15-22 as "National Character Counts" Casey was immediately able to find online the list week. of the elements of the Character Counts program, which has been adopted and utilized in many elementary schools. In this program, the "Six Pillars of Character" are trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring and citizenship. We discussed each one of these principles and linked them to important and familiar statements of Jewish values. When we got to "citizenship," I told Casey that Temple was holding a forum later that day for candidates running for one judicial position and seats on the Las Cruces City Council. Casey listened as I explained how the forum fits into the pillar of citizenship. She then said that she wanted to campaign to be "Temple Judge," a position that would apply to Religious School. She made a campaign sign, spoke to each class, and then shared thoughts and answered questions during our Religious School assembly. One of her classmates created makeshift ballots. Casey did win our impromptu election...and has begun to develop her own place in Religious School as a peer judge/counselor/mentor, under the watchful eye of her rabbi and others. In our last study session, we began to look at passages from the Torah about judicial ethics. It appears that this newly-created position will have an ongoing impact on our Religious School community.

Part III

My clergy colleague, Rev. Carol Tuck, and I attended an event in El Paso on Sunday, October 22 that was part of a national "Poor People's Campaign" spearheaded by Rev. William Barber II and others. This effort seeks to continue the unfinished work of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. in the last year of his life. During his talk in El Paso, Rev. Barber spoke about the meaning of the different parts of the American flag, focusing on the blue under the array of 50 stars. The blue, he explained (as confirmed in other sources), signifies justice, noting that it is up to us to be sure that all of our citizens feel that they can continue to have faith in the United States as a country based on justice and fairness.

Part IV

On Sunday, November 19, at 1:30 pm, clergy and interfaith leaders will again join me in our Pre-Thanksgiving Interreligious Dialogue panel at Temple Beth-El. Our theme is "People of Character – What does it take to be a mensch (a decent human being)?" We will discuss aspects of character that echo the two sets of standards mentioned above. Please join us as we consider the values that we can apply to strengthen our communal relationships.

Part V

Liturgical poet and author Alden Solovy has created a Facebook Page entitled "Six-Word Prayers," encouraging people to post a short meditation, whether from another source or of their own creation. Here are some of my submissions to the page that, when put together, might offer us all guidance on how to enhance our sacred partnerships with each other:

- Seeking moments of joy every day.
- Enable my dreaming soul to soar.
- Show me where I should go.
- Help me anticipate other people's needs.
- Grant strength to ease their pain.
- Eternal God, lead us to truth.
- Your words, our melody, One song.



PERSONAL THOUGHTS ON LEADERSHIP— FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES Ned Rubin

"What a long, strange trip it's been." Jerome J. Garcia, Robert Hall Weir, Philip Lesh, Robert C. Hunter (the Grateful Dead).

There are two last names in my father's family – two of his older brothers came over to the US from Vilnius before the rest of the family, and were given the last name Ellis by the immigration folks at, where else, Ellis Island. The family's last name was really *Alexnitzya*, probably unpronounceable to the customs officials. When the rest of the family came over, including the youngest child, my dad, not knowing that there were other family members already here, they were given the last name Rubin because of the married last name of the person who met them in New York.

Because my father's father was a shochet (kosher slaughterer), the family was sponsored by the Jewish community in this small town in Maine where they settled. My grandfather, being the most learned Jew in town, was also the de facto rabbi. This was a VERY strict Orthodox upbringing for my dad. Moving away from that small town (and that strict religious practice), and after marrying my mom while he was in the Army, I was born in Haverhill, MA. Soon after, my parents, moved to Newton, MA where they joined a (very) Reform Synagogue, Temple Shalom. Although we observed some at home, my mom, especially, became very active in the synagogue and came onto the temple board. Social activism was the most important, underlying Jewish value in our home, which was obvious not only in her involvement in the Temple, but also in the secular part of their lives. They were both involved in civil rights, and established the first mental health clinic in Newton. They were also involved in progressive local and state politics. My father, as an attorney in Boston also lived his Jewish values through his practice in the kind of cases that he accepted and the way he chose to defend those people for whom he worked.

I'm sure this is how I "got it." My career has been in the helping professions, with what many consider a "difficult" patient population - drug addicts. Although not actively involved in our synagogue in Milwaukee, where we lived for almost 40 years and raised our daughter, since retiring and moving here along with my sister, my sense of Jewish activism has been expressed in different ways and my ability to activate it has taken several paths. I have leadership positions in a number of community groups with whom I volunteer. Before that, however, and almost since moving here and joining Temple Beth-El, I have been involved with our spiritual community in some way. As the chair of the Social Action/Adult Education committee, we have been able to stretch the awareness of the community to our presence and Jewish perspective on the world through a number of events, which will continue in the future. Part of my commitment to the synagogue was becoming a member of the Board of Trustees. This is a unique form of

leadership that is new to me – leadership in a *spiritual* community. Everyone on the Board has the best interests of the synagogue in their mind and heart. We don't always agree on issues brought before the Board, some mundane and others of significant import for the future of the Temple, but I work at keeping the spiritual part of our process in mind as we work toward helping the Temple contribute to acts of kindness to our own spiritual community, the larger Las Cruces community and our own little corner of the world.

Temple Beth-El Candidate Forum update

On Sunday, October 15, Temple Beth-El held the latest and most successful in what has become a series of community candidate forums. The seven candidates for the three city council seats, District 3, 5 and 6 and the three candidates for the municipal judgeship were all invited. All the candidates except one accepted our invitation. Approximately 65-70 community residents were in attendance, the largest audience that we have had for this type of event. In addition, we were very pleased that, for the first time, the entire forum was recorded by KTAL-LP (101.5) to be rebroadcast prior to the election on November 7.



There was a lively exchange of ideas and questions, generated both by the Social Action/Adult Education committee and by audience participants (who submitted questions

during the program). All of the candidates stayed after the formal presentation for the social time after the event, and several commented about how much they appreciated these forums sponsored by our synagogue. Not only do they appreciate the setting and format (and the food during the informal conversations after the forum), but also the thoughtfulness of the questions that are asked. Particularly, the candidates for the municipal judgeship appreciated having been invited as they are rarely included in these types of events.





Board of Trustees Meeting Summary October 19, 2017

The Rabbi reported that 67 people participated in High Holy Day worship and many persons joined group aliyots and readings. He is organizing an Interfaith Dialogue to be held at the Temple on Sunday, November 19. He has 4 students in his Introduction to Judaism course and 2 more students interested in conversion. He will take part in interviews for the new Las Cruces chief of police. He attended a meeting of the El Paso Sector Border Community Liaison Program that brings together Border Patrol agents with local organizations that deal with border and immigration issues. The Rabbi will attend the Shabbat Shira workshop in Wisconsin in November, and he, Rhonda Karol and Ellen Torres will attend the URJ Biennial in Boston in December. Arrangements have been or are being made for services on those weekends.

Ellen Torres began a discussion about the Rabbi's rabbinical and administrative duties. The Rabbi had developed extensive lists of these duties. The Board will discuss this in November. Ellen discussed the Board's commitment to make calls for the Jewish Federation of Greater El Paso's Annual Campaign on November 19 to encourage contributions to the Federation.

Treasurer Allen Blum distributed a first-quarter budget report. The budget is healthy. Jeff Lewis reported that the storage shed has arrived. It cost \$1,532 and needs to be painted. The Board will explore ways to honor David Brandhorst for his bequest to the Temple. Ellen will personally pay for a Temple banner that could be displayed at the Renaissance Faire and other venues. Ellen asked members to provide additional ideas for future fundraising projects to her. These will be discussed at the November Board meeting.

The Board approved funds to purchase railings to be installed on north side of the bimah area. Susan Michelson noted that CDs of the Challah Rising film may be purchased for \$35.


