Message from Rabbi Karol

Beginning with the last weekend of October, Temple Beth-El hosted two events that were well-attended by our own congregants and by members of the greater Las Cruces community. Both gatherings gave participants an opportunity to share personal insights about how we can deepen our rela-

tionships and strengthen our connections with one another.

On Sunday, October 28, I called together congregants and community members for a vigil and remembrance service for those who died in the shootings at Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh on Saturday, October 27. I felt that the service would not be complete without giving those present a chance to talk with each other in a meaningful way. During the service, we read Stacey Zisook Robinson's poem, "Where God Is," which included this poignant statement about how we can try to counter the violent acts that occur in our world. The congregation read this stanza of her poem together:

"Perhaps that is why God asks us -pleads for us to sing a new song for all the earth to hear,
to drown out the ugly and sibilant crackle of bullets,
whose only benediction is one of destruction and pain."
I asked the 180 people present what values and sentiments
they would include in such a "new song" to God. Here are
comments which were shared with the entire group:

- Someone thanked us for coming to share in your grief and pain, but you should know that it's our grief and pain as well.
- We need to show compassion.
- We often judge people by what we see on the outside. We should overcome our tendency to prejudge and sit down with people to talk with them. We will usually find out that what we initially thought about them was wrong.
- Sometimes it's easier to be afraid. We shouldn't let our fear overtake us. We should act out of love and not fear.
- Sometimes our old songs and texts can give us the greatest comfort and inspire us to do justice
- We should include other people in our dialogue and in our lives and be open-minded.
- We sometimes think of people as "the other," but we should treat them as they want to be treated.
- There is something that is good about everybody, and we have to look for it and then pass it along.
- Jewish theologian Martin Buber taught that our relationships can be based on the foundation of "I and Thou" where the part of God in you sees the part of God in me.
- The love of God will overcome all fear and all hatred.

On November 18, Temple Beth-El hosted an annual interfaith conversation, sponsored by the Social Action/Adult Education Committee. The title for the program was, "With Liberty and Justice for All—Leadership, Justice and Unity: What Can We Achieve Together?" I invited clergy and leaders in the faith community to share their perspectives on five different themes that emerged from the title. I opened with "prayers for our country" from the Jewish tradition. Father Ron Catherson of St. John's Catholic Church of Antioch (Independent), and Sureyya Husain, from the Muslim Outreach

Group of the Islamic Center of Las Cruces, both spoke about freedom. Pastor Donna Cavedon, interim minister at First Christian Church, shared beliefs about justice. The Rev. Carol Tuck, (United Methodist, retired), spoke about leadership. Gordon Butler (Baha'i community) and Rev Dr Harvey Daiho Hilbert (Order of Clear Mind Zen) shared perspectives on unity. Pastor Jared Carson of Peace Lutheran Church discussed collaboration. Each speaker led a small group discussion, as did retired Pastor Linda Mervine and I. Here are some of the insights that came from these conversations (among the 65 people in attendance):

- We touched on how religion overall, helps us handle change. It was interesting to have a discussion among people of all ages from different faiths and to learn how people have handled their struggles with faith throughout their lives.
- The idea that unity doesn't mean uniformity was important, as was the notion that a meeting like this is a seed-planting that we can nurture, water and grow as we build community.
- We discussed the process of self-sorting, when we place ourselves into groups based on our identities and shared interests. The question is, at what point does someone become the other and become hated? We noticed that our gathering is a self-sorted group because we are interested in diversity. We should find a way to include people in our conversations with whom we have little contact.
- We focused on unity and how we can collaborate based on the value of welcoming the stranger.
- Sometimes we fear that someone else is going to get more than we have. We spoke about how to remove that fear and to reassure everyone that they have freedom in equal measure. We spoke about showing God's love to other people in the way we look at them, talk to them, and smile at them.
- We go forth and act in the community based on scripture.
 While some people might say a particular position is political, if it's based on one's interpretation of his/her faith's sacred texts, it is definitely and mainly faith-based.
- Caring for others and being present with them can give us a
 different perspective about their realities. We feel that the
 golden rule, and values like liberty, justice and unity are not
 taught anymore. We wonder if we could expand our circle,
 by teaching about those values through discussion, art and
 music in ways that would make everyone feel included.
- Collaboration and cooperation are not about being in agreement, but, rather, about the desire to be together. We, as human beings, don't want to be alone.

As our celebration of Chanukah approaches in the coming week, we will again light our Chanukiot and consider the values of freedom, justice, leadership, unity, and collaboration, all of which are essential themes of this bright and joyous holiday. May the lights of Chanukah inspire us to appreciate our gifts and to contribute the best of ourselves to our community!







Israel Update

HOME TOWN NEWS by Phil Alkon

Hello all. Back to this column after a prolonged summer break. There's been no shortage of news concerning Israel - from either Israel itself, from the surrounding Middle East, or from much of the world at large. But keeping up with it all, and trying to distill seemingly myriad and complex happenings into reasonably coherent sentences and paragraphs can be a bit of a challenge – at least for this aging observer.

Let's start right at home, here at Temple Beth-El, with the latest news from your very own Israel Committee. That august body (which I chair) has decided to make some local news itself by organizing a public forum to address the topic: "What We All Need to Know About Anti-Semitism and Israel." The issue concerns the anti-Israel bias that has dominated the media and international discourse for decades, and is increasingly impacting Jews and institutions in the U.S. as well. Israel supporters find themselves besieged on many fronts, including challenges to Israel's very legitimacy as a nation state. All this supposedly owing to the myriad crimes that the only Jewish state on Earth is committing against others. Jews again, it seems, are desecrating the cherished norms of acceptable behavior that would otherwise predominate in relationships among people and nations. According to the U.N. body assigned to protect human rights, 80 percent of the world's crimes against humanity in recent decades were committed by one state alone: Israel! At least that's what China, Afghanistan, Pakistan, Iraq, UAR, Saudi Arabia, Egypt, Senegal, Mongolia, Tunisia – all member states of the Commission, and staunch defenders of human rights, as we all know – have decreed.

Unfortunately, grotesque characterizations of Israel, and the campaign to delegitimize one of the most vibrant democracies and progressive, civil societies on Earth has gained considerable traction; and has increasingly affected political discourse here in the U.S. as well. How does one tiny nation-state, less than 0.5 percent of the Middle East's area and population arouse such scrutiny and enmity? You guessed it – it happens to be Jewish. No one has offered a more penetrating explanation of the phenomenon than Rabbi Lord Jonathan Sacks, former Chief Rabbi of Britain. The world has accepted if not embraced Jew-hatred for centuries, first on the basis of religion (ghettos, pogroms), and then on the of basis racial inferiority (Holocaust). Now, according to Sacks, it is the supposed moral transgressions committed by Jews in expressing their nationhood that serves as the convenient justification for keeping Jew-hatred alive and well. Thank you, Israel, for helping to an old and honored tradition; and for letting "progressives" join the club. Can any other people besides Jews claim simultaneous hatred of both the extreme Right and the extreme Left? We must be doing something right!

An exemplar practitioner of the new anti-Semitism is the United Nations itself, a body that owes many of its principles and its very existence to the crimes committed against the Jewish people by Nazi Germany in the name of creating a purer and more wholesome world. But the UN today includes some 56 Muslim majority nations of which some 24 are Arab states. This entire bloc has always opposed the creation of a "Zionist entity" anywhere on holy Muslim soil (i.e., North Africa and Arabian Peninsula). It has expressed that displeasure by means of war, terrorism, economic boycotts, political pressure, and any other available means. In the case of the Palestinian national movement (which, ironically, owes its very birth and existence to Zionism and Israel), anti-Semitism has involved the re-writing of history and political geography in unimaginable terms. In any event, owing to the numbers game, and to political and economic expediency, the U.N. has tirelessly generated a cornucopia of anti-Israel opinions, resolutions and actions that have transformed it into a bastion of the new anti-Semitism. Other international groups, covering a wide range of disciplines and interests have followed the U.N.'s example.

But into this grim and grotesque charade entered a unique source of light and retribution. Her name is Nikki Haley, and she has served as the new U.S. Ambassador to the U.N. (her recent resignation takes effect at the end of 2018). Widely admired as a forthright and fair Governor of South Carolina, Haley has spoken eloquently and acted to demand that Israel be treated fairly at the U.N. Her speeches are a clarion call for the end of an insidious bigotry that has infected the highest levels of international discourse.

Back to our proposed forum. We intend to highlight key speeches of both Rabbi Sacks and Ambassador Haley that deal with the origin, essence and impact of the new anti-Semitism. We also may show an incredible choral performance by Israeli Holocaust survivors and their families that testifies to strength and nobility of the human spirit. In pursuing this effort, we welcome your advice and support. We also look forward to seeing you and many fellow southern New Mexicans at this community event. We'll make sure the word gets out when we're ready. Shalom and keep the faith!

Temple Beth-El Board of Trustees Meeting Summary—November 15, 2018

The Rabbi distributed a report about his activities. He discussed our very moving October 28 memorial/ vigil after the attack in Pittsburgh. President Ellen Torres thanked all Matzo Ball Open participants. Our net profit may be between \$6,000 and \$7,000, of which we will donate \$1,000 to Mesilla Valley Hospice. She thanked all Renaissance Faire Deli participants. Our profits may be about \$2,000, with a 20% share going to our Center for Spiritual Living partners. Ellen discussed the December 16 leadership workshop and noted that our website has largely been restored. Dee Cook and Cheryl Decker gave a report about the January 26, 2019 event A Night at the Auction. Sixteen events or services have been pledged so far, and an E-Blast will remind congregants about the auction.

Mark Saltman provided an extensive report about security considerations. We have security cameras on the periphery, and a portable device that amplifies the doorbell ringing when the doors are locked. We have many deadbolted rooms. LCPD can place a temporary camera trailer at TBE for two weeks, and is prepared for fast responses when we send alerts from alert buttons. LCPD can do security training at TBE in early 2019. The Board will review dates.

Renee Frank gave a presentation about a Strategic Planning Committee report. The committee suggested a new mission statement focusing on connectedness, and the report included a number of potential new activities or steps. She asked that the Board send the report to committees to ask whether they wish to implement activities. President Ellen noted that the Board would review the document and get back to the committee. A subsequent motion was approved to add a Board member to the Strategic Planning Committee.

The Board concurred that we should add a taller recycle basket to the social hall. Committee reports included a discussion about a potential History Day at TBE; a discussion about how Las Cruces has proven to be an outstandingly welcoming community for Jews in general; and BETY/BEMY plans for a joint Hanukkah party with youth groups from Temple Mt. Sinai in El Paso.

- Items not sold are given to other charities and nothing goes to a landfill.




