

Message from Rabbi Karol

"God was in this place, and I, I did not know." So said Jacob in Genesis Chapter 28.

I stood on the bimah of our sanctuary, looking at the Ner Tamid, which depicts the ladder in Jacob's dream (at Beth El) with angels going up and down upon it.

I sat in one of the bimah chairs, and closed my eyes for a moment.

When I open my eyes, scenes of the past were laid out before me.

Bar Mitzvah and Bat Mitzvah students were leading the congregation in prayer on their special days.

Groups of congregants ascended the bimah for aliyot on High Holy Days.

Oneg Shabbat sponsors lit candles on Friday night.

Religious school students listened to one of their peers presenting a lesson on Jewish values.

Members of the Las Cruces community gathered to hear a recorded speech by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and to express their sadness and resolve in the face of a tragic and senseless attack on a Pittsburgh synagogue.

Adults and children lit their chanukiot on tables in the back of the sanctuary, creating a warm glow for the Festival of Light.

Members of all ages marched with the Torah scrolls around the sanctuary, and then unrolled each of the two scrolls to end and begin the reading of the Torah.

People joined their voices in song and prayer, fashioning a sound of unity.

Members of the congregation and our neighbors formed long lines to enjoy their favorite Jewish foods, to listen to musical performances, and to watch and even join in Israeli folk dancing.

Films, forums, discussions elicited public interest and thoughtful comment.

Guest speakers and entertainers shared their expertise and talents.

My feet took me to the Social Hall, where visions of meals, brunches, breakfasts, Oneg Shabbat receptions, Purim carnivals, study, and board and committee meetings passed before my eyes.

The kitchen space revealed scenes of congregants kitchen making hamentaschen, kugel, and knishes, and slicing our signature pastrami.

The books in the Library beckoned me, as if they were all speaking their words at once.

The Religious School classrooms brimmed with learning and laughter.

The playground echoed not only the joy of children at play, but also the building of the Sukkah and the intergenerational gathering for our holiday that celebrates nature. The trees planted during past Tu Bish'vat celebrations sang their song of growth and ever-changing life.

Bricks on a walkway were intoning prayers of tribute for those honored and remembered there, and trees in a garden were chanting biblical verses that recalled their presence in the land of our ancestors. A fountain shared its water with birds passing by.

And there was much, much more in these visions that defied description.

It was then that I opened my eyes. I was sitting in the chair on the bimah. What had I seen? Angels? Very possibly. A vibrant past and present? Most definitely.

All that has happened before will happen again if we make it so...and if we can say, from the depths of our hearts, "God was in this place, and I, I did not know."

From Rabbi Karol's email message to the congregation and community on April 27, 2019

Dear Congregants and Community Members,

Our hearts go out to the Jewish community in and around Poway, California, and to the Chabad Center where the violent attack took one life and injured several other members.

The fact that this is the six-month anniversary of the Tree of Life Synagogue shooting is not lost on us. It compounds our sadness and our outrage that such hatred persists in someone's heart that can lead to this tragic result.

We send condolences to the family of the victims of the shooting and to those who were at the worship service. We wish for them continued resolve and the awareness that, in all corners of the American Jewish community, there are many, many people standing with them. We extend our care and concern to our neighbors in the Chabad centers in Las Cruces and El Paso.

On Wednesday, May 1, at 7:00 pm, our planned interfaith prayers of Holocaust Remembrance, followed by the screening of the film "No Asylum: The Untold Chapter of Anne Frank's Story," will include prayers of healing and remembrance for this latest attack on a Jewish holy space, and for other needless violations of holy spaces in the last several weeks.

Rest assured that we continue to be vigilant in the security of the Temple building.

As Passover comes to an end, may we all know true freedom in our community that will cause the hearts of people of different backgrounds to come together in support and in hope.

May the One who makes peace in highest heavens truly make peace for us, for all Israel, and for all the world.

The purpose will be to consider important decisions that need to be made in the administration of Temple Beth-El.




Batkin Scholarship Funds for 2019

Temple Beth-El Committees Reports from Diane Fleishman, Chairperson Cemetery Committee

Burial plots for Temple Beth El are located in Section B of the Masonic Cemetery on Compress Street. There are currently 72 casket plots available as well as cremain burial sites in a separate section.

Costs involve include \$1500.00 for a single casket plot for Temple members. Non-Temple members will pay the Temple an additional \$1500.00. There are costs for opening/closing the site, which depend on the day and time of burial. These prices are subject to change. Detailed pricing is available in the Temple office or at the Masonic Cemetery, 575-526-9474.

The staff at the Masonic Cemetery is more than happy to work with you to select and reserve sites for you and/or your family. It is best to call for an appointment to view the Temple's section.

Membership Committee

The goals of the Membership Committee are to introduce potential members to Temple Beth El, its programs and congregants. Once a membership application is approved by the Board of Trustees, the Committee member(s) will welcome our new congregant(s). Additionally, Committee members will offer to accompany them to services and/or other events. Essentially, the goal is to make newcomers feel a part of the TBE community.

If budget allows, the Committee will host an Oneg at the New Members Service and/or a social event highlighting new members.

Members of the Committee should represent various constituencies of TBE. It should include a parent of a religious school or preschool student, a person who works in the community, and a retired person. The Committee members will become familiar with the history and programs of TBE in order to meet the above goals.

They will ask new members what activities may interest them and what they would like to do; then the Committee member will contact the appropriate committees.

The Chair of the Membership Committee will make sure that new members' contact information is included in the Adelante if not included in the directory. Generally potential members contact the Rabbi or Membership Chair by phone, internet, or by filling out a card at Services. Follow-up generally includes an informal meeting with members of similar interests. During the 2018-2019 year, we gained four new family units.



Active Shooter Training at Temple Beth-El

On Tuesday, April 16, Las Cruce Police Department Sergeants Pat Doyle and Alejandro Rodriguez presented an excellent session on Active Shooter Training to about 35 congregants. They outlined, in some detail, the history of active shooter events in the United States and what was learned from each tragedy. They noted that a change in the approach to security in religious congregations in Las Cruces came after small explosive devices were placed in three churches in town.

The most important aspects of their presentation were the introduction of the "Run, Hide, Fight" strategies in the face of an active shooter. This involves

• Being aware of your surroundings and noticing anything suspicious or just out of place

• Knowing our building (exits and how to get there), and noting which exit you are closest to if there were an incident.

• Identifying safe rooms that can be locked and barricaded, and noting the ways in which people can be prepared to offer significant resistance.

The instruction did not include physical drills of any type, but presenters and participants did discuss all aspects of active shooter response.

We reiterated the need to keep the doors locked when people are inside as much as possible. If they are not locked at certain events, the presence of paid security or of congregants keeping an eye on the door and on those who are entering can be extremely helpful in maintaining security. Religious School, Friday night services (thanks to the Mensch Club for providing someone to watch/lock the door), and day-to-day presence in the office are times when the door is locked and someone can gain entry by using our doorbell.

A diagram of the Temple and some safety protocol can be found in the TBE library, and more information will follow.

First the Jews: Combating the World's Longest Running Hate Campaign (Book by Rabbi Evan Moffic)


On Tuesday, April 23, 2019, Rabbi Karol offered commentary and a review of some of the material in Rabbi Evan Moffic's new book on antisemitism. Here are some of the passages that were shared and discussed at the session. (This discussion took on added significance after the attack in Poway, California on April 27).

- "Antisemitism is hostility toward Jews. It appears in behavior, words, political policies, economic transactions, and religious practice. Antisemitism can even appear when Jews are not present, as was the case in Japan during the early twentieth century, when people expressed hostile views of Jews even though they had never met one. In addition, certain actions can be anti-Semitic in effect but not intent. For example, someone can say,
 "The Jews killed Jesus" without thinking he or she is saying something hostile toward Jews. But as we will see, this belief has had destructive and deadly consequences."
- While certainly a prejudice, antisemitism is not synonymous with bigotry or racism. Judaism is not a race, because a person can convert into Judaism, but Judaism is, in part, an ethnicity, because a person is automatically Jewish if his or her mother is Jewish. Thus, antisemitism is not simply a traditional form of racism or religious bigotry. It is both and more. Even more importantly, history suggests that when antisemitism grows, so does racism, bigotry, sexism, and the other kinds of divisions we see spreading around the world today. As antisemitism grows, so does the erosion of our faith, culture, and core values."
- "Why is antisemitism the world's longest-lasting and most persistent hatred? My (Rabbi Moffic's) answer is the "Big Five"—the five rationales used throughout history for antisemitism:
 - *Jews are different.
 - *Jews killed Jesus.
 - *Jews are greedy.
 - *Jews are an inferior race holding back scientific and human advancement.
 - *Jews are Western imperialists
- Jews believe that God has chosen the Jews to be a messenger to humanity. God gave the Jews a special mission. It was not about superiority - it was a Jewish selfperception and not a statement of absolute truth about the

universe. Jews were chosen to keep up a set of obligations that requires affirmation and continual selfexamination. The claim that Jews see themselves as superior has persisted from ancient times What makes Jews susceptible to ongoing hatred is that they have...remained different from the surrounding culture.

- Lord Rabbi Jonathan Sacks has said: "God chooses Israel to show that, for God, difference matters. They were strangers to teach that God loves the stranger. They were different, yet God set on them Divine love, to teach the dignity of difference. When we believe God values differences, we refuse to condone persecution in the name of a higher power.
- [This passage, upsetting as it may be, represents Rabbi Moffic's reading of Hitler's ideology and other roots of antisemitism] For Hitler, abstract thought, whether normative or scientific, was inherently Jewish. There is no way of thinking about the world, according to Hitler, which allows us to see human beings as human beings. In that view, all ideas which allow us to see each other as human beings comes from the Jews. Basic empathy and respect for others is unnatural, and the "Golden Rule" has no place in the real world, because it allows unfit and weak peoples to stay alive and challenge the dominance of the strongest. Augustine and Martin Luther believed Jews lost God's favor by murdering Jesus. Hitler believed Jews introduced human dignity into the world, and upset natural hierarchies. Christians hated Jews because Jews took God (Jesus) from the world, and Hitler hated Jews because they brought God (through the teaching that all are created in God's image) into the world.

• Robert Putnam noted in his book, *Bowling Alone*, that fewer people are joining community groups. Civil and religious organizations bring together people of different backgrounds. Nonpolitical institutions used to bring people together of different stripes. They have lost much of their influence. Our humanity depends on forming relationships with others.
