# Message from Rabbi Karol

# To my grandchildren and their peers:

How can I save the world for you? I know I can't save it by myself. I wonder, sometimes, if the values I have taught and tried to put into practice are still guiding my brothers

and sisters in the human family.

I have seen bullying, but never thought it would be admired and supported.

I have witnessed, and been the target of, ridicule, but I never imagined that people would so readily join in demeaning and denigrating others.

I have seen the environment exploited without limits, without a concern for the future, and I thought that decades-long efforts to diminish that lack of care for the world would succeed. They have, but only up to a point.

I have seen people harbor hatred for others and participate in dehumanization and discrimination. I thought that more members of the communities in which I have lived were opening their hearts to others in a way that would end. And they were, but it seems that others are not ready to do the same.

So how can I save the world for you?

There are answers in prayers of the tradition which you are inheriting from your family and which, I know, you will willingly share.

If God creates and re-creates the universe every day, we can find ways in which we can be God's partners in preserving the earth to ensure its future.

When we praise God, we are expressing wonder at the world and also showing that we are humble, acknowledging we are but a part of creation but always beloved in God's eyes.

When we voice our love for God through our words and actions, divine love will guide our hands, eyes, and hearts so that we will all be closer to one another.

When we give thanks, we admit that we don't expect to receive anything. Simple appreciation for all that is ours in our lives can inspire us to be generous and giving to others.

When we praise God who makes peace, we commit ourselves to suffusing the world with God's bless-

ings: goodness, kindness, grace, compassion, mercy, light, righteousness, and a zest for life.

When we offer our support and assistance to people in need, we demonstrate that the teachings of our heritage are not just words. They chart a course for our personal journey.

So what can I do to save the world for you?

I will do my best to treat people with decency and respect, and to hold up every person as valued and precious. I will perform the small acts that can preserve the world in which we live. I will speak in ways that will enable people to hear and consider my words and the values I espouse. I will answer hatred with consideration and with understanding, within and between faith communities and among people of all backgrounds.

And I will pass these tasks to you when your time comes, for I know that you will stand for love, generosity, compassion and hope!


To all members of the TBE community:



# Welcome! An Interfaith Conversation at Temple Beth-El

About 30 people from the Las Cruces community gathered to discuss the value of hospitality on Sunday, November 24, 2019. This interreligious gathering, sponsored by the Social Action/Adult Education Committee

for the fifth straight year, was coordinated by Rabbi Larry Karol and Daisy Maldonado, outreach director for the Southern New Mexico Islamic Center, who offered presentations that characterized their faith tradition's approach to offering welcome. The Reverend Carol Tuck, a retired United Methodist minister, shared insights from Christian tradition. Gordon Butler, from the local Baha'i community, made a brief statement about hospitality from his faith perspective just before the end of the program.

Small group discussions were led by the presenters and by Pastor Ron Brooker (retired clergy and a member of Peace Lutheran Church) and Pastor Donna Cavedon (of First Christian Church). Participants shared stories of when they were welcomed well, and times when the welcome could have been better. Each conversation led to the creation of a "hospitality primer." Here are some of the sugges-

tions to emerge from these discussions:

- A smile is the very first and easiest welcome.
- Look guests in the face and let them know you are glad to see them.
- Engage them and respectfully ask them question, and become familiar with their stories and their needs.
- Introduce the new person to other people.
- Feed people and have extra food available, and be sensitive to food and dietary needs.
- Show empathy and compassion (see yourself in the shoes of the guest).
- Invite the guest to participate and lead.
- Be respectful, and treat the guest as special and of high status.
- In hospitality, you feel warm, happy and safe.
- Pay it forward: generosity makes you feel good, when you have more than you need, share it with people who are in need.
- Be open, but be careful with people who show signs of hostility or aggression. Offer them safe words. Use your instincts.
- Don't be afraid to reach out. The risk is worth taking...or what kind of world would we have?
- A little gesture of kindness can change a life.
- When you welcome others, you get a gift.





# Temple Beth-El Board of Trustees Meeting Summary— November 21, 2019

- Four adult students are preparing for bar/bat mitzvah at the May 2<sup>nd</sup> service. Three other Bar/Bat Mitzvah celebrations are planned before the Rabbi retires on June 30, 2020.
- Dates are set for Lay Leadership of services January June 2020: Feb. 14-15, Mar 20-21, May 29-30
- Neomi Summers will speak about Yemenite Jewry on December 5<sup>th</sup> at the Temple.
- TBE's annual Chanukah Shabbat celebration will be held on December 27<sup>th</sup>.
- Our financial situation is improving, and money borrowed last year from our money market account (reserves) has been replaced.
- Options for a part-time or student rabbi for 2020-2021 depend on funding of the proposal submitted from the Jewish Federation of El Paso. Updates to follow.
- Building and Grounds: Outside lights have been replaced, a filter added to the kitchen water supply, a timer added to the water heater, and motion sensitive lights placed in the bathrooms. A landscaping company will do this fall's grounds clean-up.
- TBE is looking into renting gas grills/ burners in order to provide a more successful Camp Hope Christmas Breakfast this year.
- In response to the survey results, the regular Friday night service time has been changed to 6:30 with a small Oneg to follow; Family Shabbat will continue as is. The board thanks everyone for patience with the varied times as we explore alternatives to try to make services accessible for as many congregants as possible.



# Mayoral Candidate Discussion on October 29...and more!

On Tuesday, October 29, the Social Action committee of Temple Beth-El sponsored a Mayoral "Discussion" with eight of the 10 City of Las Cruces mayoral candidates in attendance. In an hour and a half, candidates responded to five or six questions on topics developed by the committee ahead of time. This format for the program was quite different than we've ever had before in that we encouraged candidates to speak with and to each other and not just to the audience.

Also, because of this experimental format, there was no time for questions from the audience. More than 55 congregants and community members attended. The response of the candidates to this new format was generally positive. They seemed to appreciate that they were not each asked the same question with only a very limited time for each to respond. Most candidates also stayed after the formal part of the program for informal conversation and socializing with constituents.

Senator Bill Soules commented that he thought the program went very well. He was curious about how this would proceed. He observed that the program was interesting and different and well worth our doing this sort of thing again.

There are several upcoming programs supported by the Social Action/Adult Education committee and several in discussion for after the new year. Please keep an eye on the Temple calendar for events. 
