Words of Torah March 27, 2020 Rabbi Larry Karol

If we were to put our life experiences together, and tell the stories about those experiences, we might find episodes that bear

some resemblance to what is happening now.

Our collective memories begin in the 1920s. Think about the major challenges which the people in our country and around the world have faced over the last century. And consider the recent history of the worldwide Jewish community, facing prejudice, discrimination, extermination, wars, and concerns about how we can survive and thrive.

The Torah portion for this week, VAYIKRA, begins the book of Leviticus, which outlines the particulars of sacrifices (of designated animals and grain) offered in the Tabernacle in the wilderness, and, later, in the Temple in Jerusalem.

The ancient Israelites knew that the word for sacrifice/ offering in Hebrew, KORBAN, meant "to draw close," that is, close to the Eternal One.

One of the major recurring triumphs of Jewish history is the ability to adapt to new circumstances. When the Romans destroyed the Second Temple in the year 70, the rabbis had already developed a way for Judaism to preserve continuity without a central place to bring sacrifices and to be in the presence in God.

The rabbis realized that the prayers they had been reciting in synagogues, even while the Temple stood, could be their salvation, and that those meditations also brought them close to their Creator, no matter where they lived.

When Jews moved to new communities over the last two millenia, or were forced to relocate, they took their customs, practices and melodies with them and created synagogues in their new towns of residence. In those places, they found ways to hold their communities together and to recognize God's presence with them.

We value being in each other's presence, hearing our voices united in song and prayer, study, sharing ideas, and creating a communal identity.


We are still doing that even now, amid our current challenges, because we, like the Jews before us, are finding ways to adapt. Telephone calls have been with us for a long time. Emails emerged more recently, as did texting. Now, services streamed on Facebook (which still enable us to draw close to God as a community) and meetings and study sessions on Zoom are the fruits of our willingness to learn and adapt.

We have inherited an incredible tradition of creating bridges to each other, even in difficult times, with God as our inspiration and as a source of strength and ingenuity.

In these unusual times, may we continue to stay together and inspire one another.

Temple Beth-El Board of Trustees Meeting Summary— March 19, 2020

- This was the Board's first virtual meeting, conducted using Zoom meeting software. Nine of us and the Rabbi were able to connect and communicate.
- Rabbi Karol has been attending virtual meetings on how we can continue to connect with one another and continue to support each other during these interesting times. He will be streaming Friday night services via Facebook Live, and emailing messages and prayers weekly.
- The treasurer's report shows that we are currently in good shape. We are receiving membership dues, and have been able to return the money that we borrowed from the Schwab account last year. We currently have \$36K in the bank.
- The census information event at the temple on March 10th did not have large attendance, possibly because of the developing pandemic. Other in person events are now on hold.
- The Temple Board is finalizing the policy on Abuse Prevention that is required by the insurance company. This should be completed by the next board meeting.
- The board discussed ways to maintain communication with the congregation and ensuring that you all are receiving the information and support that you need.
- A committee will begin meeting very soon to work out options and details for our congregational meeting that had been scheduled for May 7th. We will keep the congregation informed as we have more details.
- We should have the name of our student rabbi by April 12th. We have information about the student's and our own respective responsibilities for the coming year. The student rabbi would be working with us August 2020 through May 2021. More information to follow.

Temple Beth-El in Transition

When Temple Beth-El (TBE) affiliated with the Jewish Federation of El Paso in 2015, little did we know that in just four years, we would be expressing our deepest gratitude to the Federation for helping in our time of need.

Prior to 2015, Temple Beth-El was affiliated with the Jewish Federation of New Mexico, located in Albuquerque. The three hour drive made our temple's participation with the New Mexico Federation challenging, if not impossible. I was serving as temple president at the time, and along with Rabbi Larry Karol, requested to change our affiliation to the El Paso Federation. Both federations agreed. TBE became a member of the Jewish Federation of El Paso, and the federation became the Jewish Federation of *Greater* El Paso (JFGEP). In 2016, Dr. Bill Stein was appointed to serve as TBE's first representative to the Jewish Federation of Greater El Paso's Board, and has served faithfully as parliamentarian, and on the executive, finance, and grants committees. I joined the JFGEP board in 2018.

Over the past five years, Federation grants have enabled TBE to host programs featuring Jewish entertainers who have performed for the congregation and also engaged the greater Las Cruces community. This year, the Federation awarded TBE \$20,000 to help our congregation transition to the future

It is a crucial time in the temple's history. Several years of declining membership and subsequent loss of revenue compelled the TBE board to make significant changes last spring. Rabbi Karol's workload was reduced to half time beginning January 1, 2020 and he will retire on June 30, 2020.

The Federation's support will allow TBE to reformulate its present and reimagine its future. Temple operations are now being managed by nine lay-led transition teams and this will continue throughout the next fiscal year. Spiritual leadership will be provided by a student rabbi, visiting clergy, and the Religious Practices Transition Team which will recruit and train lay leaders to perform services.

The search for a permanent rabbi will begin July 1, 2020. During this search year, the congregation will explore, through a series of focus groups, what it wants to be and what is needed for future success. Congregants have come forward to serve on the transition teams. Dues are increasing. Active outreach will be made to members who left and to unaffiliated Jews in the community.

On behalf of the entire Temple Beth-El community, I want to express our utmost gratitude to the Jewish Federation of Greater El Paso, with special thanks to Janet Wechter, President; Robert French, Executive Director; and Dr. Ophra Leyser-Whalen, Grant Committee Chair. Your kindness and generosity will enable TBE to grow and thrive.


