Temple Beth-El COVID-19 Reentry Plan April 2021

In concert with the Union for Reform Judaism and the Central Conference of American Rabbis, we ground our re-opening policy in the following Jewish values:

- Minyan—Jews worship in community
- Pikuach Nefesh—Saving human life is Judaism's highest mitzvah
- Mipnei seivah takum—"You shall rise before the aged"-- We must not take actions within our respective communities that would either stigmatize or compromise the health and well-being of the elderly and individuals with preexisting conditions who are considered most vulnerable to Covid-19.
- Dina d'malchuta dina—"The law of the land is the law"





Preparation for Safe Return:

- New high-efficiency particulate air (HEPA) filter installed 2020
- Two sanitizing stations installed
- Foot pedals to open bathroom doors installed
- Sanctuary seating rearranged in a socially distant manner
- Entire building has been deep cleaned and sanitized
- Zoom and Facebook platforms remain in place for hybrid gatherings
- Plans in place for consistent deep cleaning and sanitizing
- Staff and volunteer training to be implemented prior to reopening

Considerations for re-opening are grounded in guidelines from the <u>CDC</u>,

guidelines mandated by the <u>Hebrew Union College</u>, and characteristics of our local congregation.

- The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) is continuing to discourage medium to large in-person gatherings, even for vaccinated individuals,
- Although many congregational members are vaccinated, not all congregational members have received their vaccines, including our children, who will not be eligible for vaccines until winter 2021/22.
- Our congregation membership includes many who are considered high-risk due to age or medical condition.
- Outdoor gatherings are much safer than indoor gatherings
- Our agreement with the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, which provides our student rabbi, prohibits congregational singing or reading aloud through May 2022 **indoors**, and also prohibits singing or reading aloud from a distance of less than 30 feet for the worship leader through May 2022

Tentative timeline for reopening

Spring 2021, Phase 1: Open for special outdoor gatherings or meetings, building largely closed Fall 2021, Phase 2: Begin regular worship and meetings outdoors, hybrid format, combination in person and remote, building used by volunteers and staff for necessities only, no food Winter 2021, Phase 3: Full programming with minor restrictions

An important way to ensure that Temple Beth-El is continually improving and strengthening itself is by gaining your perspective. RESILIENCE

Resiliency is the latest hot topic, the word highlighted in articles and books during this time of crisis.

There are many definitions of resiliency. Basically, resiliency is the capacity to recover quickly from difficulties. Some say it's the ability to 'bounce back.' Resiliency is obvious, dramatic and inspirational when someone 'bounces back from an illness,' or an accident, or after having suffered a loss. What is not as obvious are the common, everyday acts of resiliency we do over time. Resiliency is a skill we build. It is something we need to practice and repeat, just like learning to play the piano, riding a bike or running a marathon. We get better at something by practicing. What you practice grows stronger.

Resiliency has a lot in common with rituals. If repeated, they strengthen and sustain us.

Most of us probably don't think about resiliency in the context of our daily lives. We do things automatically without thinking too much about them. The extraordinary resides in the ordinary. Each time we do something we don't want to do like cleaning a toilet or making dinner, or attending a funeral, in some small undramatic way we are doing the thing that strengthens our capacity to grow through adversity. It's money in the bank for some future time when we're going to need to make a withdrawal.


We build our resiliency muscle when we listen deeply and talk honestly to each other about hard things, things that cause us pain. When we support others who have lost a job, are going through chemotherapy, or a divorce, we are building our resiliency muscle.

When we recall those who have gone before us and whose shoulders we are standing on, we build our resiliency muscle. Persevering through challenging circumstances may help us see ourselves and life with new eyes.
