My first meeting as President of the Temple Beth-El board was a marathon session! Even though it's beginning summer, and one would think that our temple activities would be slowing down,

we had a packed agenda - plans for Student Rabbi Sofia to be coming to Las Cruces; a report on our spirited discussion on membership outreach; our mini JFFF pastrami fundraiser; the upcoming discussion on ways and means; approving plans to open the temple for in-person services again; and setting up one ad hoc group to look at the religious school curriculum, and another to review the board self-assessment process outlined by the Union for Reform Judaism to provide help for small congregations like ours.

It was very gratifying to have the Board reach consensus on some of our challenging decisions, and it gives me confidence we are prepared for those looming ahead. (There is a more detailed summary in this issue of the Adelante, plus complete minutes of the meeting will be available.)

On a lighter note, there were two very happy events this month that moved me personally. I was honored to represent the board at the bar mitzvah of Max Bruder, and it was a really joyous occasion. About two dozen members of Max's family were in the sanctuary, with many others attending on Zoom. Rabbi Sofia led the service in LA, and Max led the service in Las Cruces with help from Leora Zeitlin and Stuart Kelter. Despite a little confusion on the tech, it was a wonderful service. We wish Max the very best in his new role as a Jewish adult, and look forward to more Bar and Bat Mitzvot between now and the end of the year.

The second thing which moved me deeply was the creation of Juneteenth as a national Holiday. Communities around the country have celebrated this holiday informally for many years including here in Las Cruces, but transforming it into national recognition for when the very last of the slaves were freed in Texas, is a significant milestone.

This past year has seen huge turmoil in our national effort to root out racial inequality in our civic and cultural institutions, and Emancipation Day represents a tremendous turning point in American history, one that wrenched the country around to a different path. The country is still walking that path, and there is a section laid out for us as Jews because we are commanded to pursue justice.

Juneteenth is a joyous celebration, and maybe next year we can offer not only Pastrami for Pops, but also Juicy Hot Dogs for Juneteenth!

Editor's Corner



By the time you read this, I will be back from Comic Con in Albuquerque. This seems to be an appropriate thing to report in the Temple's newsletter, considering the very Jewish history of the comic book industry. Indeed, in February 1934, "Famous Funnies #1, Series 1", the first American retail comic book, was published by Maxwell Charles "M.C." Gaines (née Max Ginzberg) and Harry L. Wildenberg, both Jewish . Here are just a few more facts.

Marvel Comics was started by Stan Lee (born Stanley Martin Lieber). DC Comics was published by Harry Donenfeld. One of DC's big hits, "Superman", by writer Jerry Siegel and artist Joe Shuster, featured an extra-terrestrial superhero (Clark Kent AKA Superman) whose birth name "Kal-El" has been loosely translated from the Hebrew as either "lightweight god" or "voice of God". Timely Comics (run by Jewish publisher Martin Goodman), featured superhero Captain America by Jewish creators Joe Simon and Jack Kirby and focused on fighting the Nazi, Red Skull. In 1947, Max Gaines's (Max Ginzberg's) son Bill Gaines assumed control of his late father's company Educational Comics (EC), renaming it Entertaining Comics. One of EC's titles, MAD magazine, created by Harvey Kurtzman, often used Yiddish words for comic effect.

The prevalence of Jews in the comic book industry is no mere coincidence. In the 1930's, anti-Semitic sentiment meant that Jewish writers and artists often found it hard to find employment in other facets. So, they created their own industry.

Much of my source information for this article came from "Superman: From Cleveland to Krypton" by Simcha Weinstein, on the website MyJewishLearning. I highly recommend the article and the website as a whole.

I attended Comic Con as Edna Mode from "The Incredibles." Much like me, she is a tiny but powerful woman who creates costumes (I sew costumes for both of my daughters with their increasing help). Edna's heritage is confirmed as German/Japanese so she may or may not be Jewish, but one can hope. Nu?



THE VISIT By Frances F. Williams

In 1953, six Jews decided we needed a Sunday School for our children in Las Cruces. One of those members's wife, Frieda Trafton, was the spark for this endeavor and she lit the flame that started the Sunday School. We had no building at that time, so the school was started at the Trafton home with twenty six children in attendance. Rabbi Floyd Fierman of Temple Mt. Sinai in El Paso, Texas consecrated our Sunday School students at his Temple and Bernard Gluck gave the first class a small Torah. We went from the Trafton Home to the Klein and Druxman homes, and after that to some churches and Corbett Center at New Mexico State University. We were indeed the wandering Jews.

I have remained in touch with some members who moved from Las Cruces, and then their children who attended the Sunday School. Two of those kids (now grandparents), Wendy (Modern) Gallagher, and Linda (Stern) House, came to visit me this past month. Wendy joined our Sunday School at the age of seven, and Linda, at the age of eight. Both had Bat-Mitzvahs, got married, had children and grandchildren, and now live in Albuquerque, New Mexico, and Prescott, Arizona respectively. Wendy's brother, Michael was in the first Sunday school class and Linda's brothers, David and Bobbie also attended Sunday School. I was the first Principal of the Sunday School. Wendy (Modern) Gallagher's parents were Bob and Jehnet Modern, who joined the Temple immediately after their arrival in Las Cruces. Jehnet was very active in Sisterhood and Bob was an active participant in the Temple. Linda (Stern) House's parents were also very active members of the Temple. Her father, Donald Stern, (who had been imprisoned in World War II in a German prison camp) was our faithful Shamos and caretaker for many years, relinquishing these duties only after he became ill. Her mother, Estelle, was an active participant in Sisterhood. Linda's grandparents were E. J. and Mabel Stern. E. J. paid off the mortgage on our first Temple and he and Mabel donated the lion statutes in front of the City Hall of Las Cruces. They also paid off the mortgage for the Masonic Lodge in Las Cruces. Each Christmas, the Sterns would buy 400 dresses to be distributed to girls from needy homes, and the Kleins distributed toys from their furniture store at Christmas time to these families as well.

What a wonderful surprise it was to have these two students visit me at my home recently. Wendy is so much like her mother Jehnet, who was always feisty, and Linda so much like her mother Estelle. They grew up, got married, had children and now have grandchildren. This was such a mitzvah for me and I wanted to share my joy at seeing them again. We can be very proud of the students who were in our Sunday school classes. Those that I taught have gone on to successful lives and careers, raised good kids, with some bumps in the road, Some have passed, and so the ebb and flow of life goes on.

URJ Congregational Assessment

There are three parts to the congregational assessment:

- 1) The member survey (which was completed on May 25th).
- 2) Operations and financial data (due to URJ on June 30th)
- 3) A board self-assessment (also due to URJ on June 30th).

TBE will receive results from all three components in August and information will be shared with the congregation after the high holidays.

Sixty-two percent (62%) of TBE households responded to the survey. This is a very high response rate; typical survey response rates are around 30%. Good for us! Thanks to Barbara Berger for suggesting a drawing to incentivize our members to complete the survey (and double thanks for making it happen). Focus Groups

Jeff Brown is taking the lead in organizing four focus groups that will be held over the summer and facilitated by Nancy Barnes-Smith. The Membership focus group, chaired by Martha Roditti, was held in June. A focus group for Ways & Means and a combined focus group for Sisterhood & Mensch Club will be held in July. A focus group for the Religious School will be held when Rabbi Sofia returns in August. Information from the focus groups will be shared with the congregation after the holidays.

<u>My Personal Transition to the Jewish Federation of</u> <u>Greater El Paso Board</u>

My service on the TBE board ended with the May annual meeting, and I have been elected to a two-year board term for the Jewish Federation of Greater El Paso (JFED). I will retain my role as Chair of the TBE Transition, working with board member Wendee Lorbeer.

The Jewish Federation of Greater El Paso represents the larger local Jewish community— in Las Cruces, non-affiliated Jews, Chabad, and Temple Beth-El, and in

El Paso, non-affiliated Jews, Chabad, Temple Mt. Sinai, and Congregation B'nai Zion.

Individual temples do not appoint representatives to the JFED board; nor does any individual temple have a dedicated representative on the JFED board. Rather, leaders from each synagogue attend monthly meetings and serve as a liaison between the Federation and their synagogue. Alison Mann, who is TBE's liaison to JFED, does a great job keeping our membership informed about the Federation's programs and services.

What We Can Expect During the High Holy Days

At this writing, Rabbi Sofia plans to be here for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur and there will be in person services. There may also be outdoor services, for example for the family services, and an organized Tashlich this year. This year Rosh Hashanah comes early. Erev Rosh Hashanah is Monday night, Sept. 6, Labor Day weekend.

The HUC rules on re-entry have changed so that we mainly will be going by CDC, state, and federal rules. However, we will require everyone school age and older, vaccinated or unvaccinated, to wear a mask, unless you have a serious medical condition such as emphysema in which wearing a mask would be harmful.

Those who are showing signs of being ill should stay home. Anyone unvaccinated should maintain distance from the bima and other people. At this point, the vaccinated are largely protected and the unvaccinated can mainly infect themselves, but we don't want anyone, vaccinated or not, to be sick or die. Also, just because someone is vaccinated doesn't mean they're totally protected if they have an autoimmune disease.

Zoom or streaming will be provided to watch from home. We may also have a Zoom only service at some point where people can participate.

If you do come to an in-person service, you'll need to sign in, or have someone sign in for you. HUC (and the CDC) requires contact tracing just in case someone tests positive for Covid-19. That way, we can let our student Rabbi and others know they've been exposed. We ask for your cooperation not only for the safety of all, but to avoid the risk of losing Rabbi Sofia by failing to honor the agreement with HUC.

We will try to make our time together spiritual, but what we gain in one area (such as being in person), we main lose in another (group singing), or with Zoom, participating in readings and singing, but not seeing congregants in person.

We may have to do what the original concept of the High Holy Days requires: self reflection, asking forgiveness of others and accepting apologies, deciding what behaviors we need to change, donating money and/or time to good causes, and praying (which can be done at home as well as in a temple).

Just in case, if you do have High Holy Day prayer books at home, hang on to them. There should be enough in the temple for High Holy Day services and if we must switch to Zoom or you personally need to switch to Zoom, it would be good to have a siddur to refer to. If we need to do a book distribution, we'll do so.

Things could change in a month, but this is what looks possible at this time. Stay safe, look out for each other, and may it be G-d's will we see each other soon.

- Another ad hoc group will begin reviewing the religious school curriculum.
