#### A Message from our Re-Entry Committee

Based on how Covid-19 is transmitted, the emergence of Delta strain of Covid-19, and the survey results of our congregants, the TBE Re-Entry/Infectious Control Committee has made the following recommendations for re-opening:

• Indoors: Wear masks in the synagogue for indoor activities.

- Outdoors: Masks should be optional.
- Open the sanctuary to 70% capacity.
- Consume food and drinks for oneg and kiddish outside.

• Have a greeter for each service/event to communicate with guests about protocols and to make sure contract-tracing form is filled out.

Please note that these protocols may change as conditions change.

Those who wish to have a name read on a Friday night close to the conventional (Gregorian) calendar date are asked to please email or call the Temple office a few days prior to the service.

\*Asterisks indicate that a loved one has been permanently memorialized with a plaque in the Temple sanctuary. If you are interested in acquiring a plaque for your loved one, contact the Temple office.

#### **Digging Into The Data**



Back in April, you may remember filling out a survey from the Union of Reform Judaism to help us with planning. The survey had questions relating to our personal engagement with Temple Beth El, such as how satisfied we were with the activities of the congregation; did we support the mission of the synagogue; did we feel we got our money's worth from the dues; did the Temple help us with our spiritual or cultural growth in Judaism.

We are just now getting back our survey results. Thank you for your strong participation! We had a very high rate of response, and URJ recently returned a fat digital folder of charts and graphs reflecting your answers on these and the other opinions you shared. Joanne Turnbull, Lynn Zeemont and I will be conferring with the mentor from URJ (who happens to be at a Temple Bethel in Florida!) who will help us analyze the rich data you provided.

After we've identified the key priorities that are most important to you as members, we will give you a full report sometime after the holidays. We hope to use this information to improve the areas you've identified as weak, and strengthen those areas which you value the most.

At the same time that we are involved in assessing our own internal attitudes about Temple Beth El, I began looking at the newly released national study by the Pew Research Center on Jewish Americans in 2020. I have not had time to read through the entire 248 page document, but I did look at some of the summary findings to see if our membership might reflect some of these external trends.

The report sums up the content this way -"U.S. Jews are culturally engaged, increasingly diverse, politically polarized, and worried about anti-Semitism." I was especially interested in these findings:

- 3/4 of American Jews think there is more anti-Semitism in the US today than there was 5 years ago, and many feel less safe.
- Like the overall US population, Jews appear to be growing more racially and ethnically diverse. 29% of Jewish adults under the age of 30 live in households where at least one child or adult is Black, Hispanic, Asian or multiracial.
- About four in 10 married Jews have a non- Jewish spouse.
- Most American Jews engage in cultural activities like cooking Jewish food, sharing holidays with non-Jewish friends, visiting historical Jewish sites, and enjoying Jewish themed media, such as television, film, literature, and music.

As we learn more about our own relationship to Judaism through Temple Beth El, we might also keep these factors in mind if we want to be inclusive not only for our current membership, but also for those new Jewish residents looking for a place to support their Jewish culture and identity.

Hi there.

Due to COVID, our shul has seen little activity in over a year. Thankfully, Cheryl and David Decker are there almost daily, seeing over the administrative, building, and grounds needs. The lack of congregational heart / life in the building for so long doesn't stop time from marching on, however. Our Temple Beth El became dirty and cluttered.

For a moment this summer, COVID restrictions were lessened, and we were able to come into our temple home for things like pastrami sandwich fundraisers, bar mitzvah, and to assess how it was.

At the initiation of Frances Williams, and with her financial support, as a board member, I volunteered to coordinate a Temple clean up / out. With the muscles, sweat, and time of TBE youth, and a few community helpers, the closets and many of the temple rooms were emptied, swept, mopped, dusted, cleaned out, and organized.


The loyal cleaning company team scrubbed, dusted, shampooed floors and chairs, mopped, and wiped, leaving TBE clean and fresh. And, David coordinated the sanitizing team leaving the temple beautiful for the upcoming in-person services, high holidays, and bat mitzvahs.

All youth supplies, Purim carnival supplies, and JFFFF family fun area (JF5) items merged neatly into the religious school closet and wing of the temple. Jewish Food and Folk Festival,(JF3), supplies, tables, and chairs are organized in the social hall 'main' closet. The smaller closet in the social hall now houses sale and/or auction items inventory, as well as decorations, for whatever event they've needed for. The book room is organized in preparation for a future burial event. (Date and time TBD.) The workroom is uncluttered, clean, and organized.

Under my supervision, 12 youth worked a cumulative 75 hours, over the course of four days cleaning sessions, on this endeavor. They signed in, reporting their time worked, and they were paid minimum wage, \$10.50 per hour, by Frances Williams. They had to balance personal and work time, staying off of their phones, and continuing working while they socialized. They offered input providing their ideas for organizing. Unfortunately, due to the kids' and parents' busy schedules, a group presentation of pay, certificates, and thanks by Frances was not possible.

It was a great experience to get to spend some time with the youth, parents, and Temple family, including Frances. Thank you, Frances for the generous financial support making this possible.

## NOTED ALBUM FEATURES TBE CONNECTIONS

Over the last 13 years, our small Las Cruces/El Paso community has had Jewish music albums released by surprisingly many artists, including: Rabbi Larry Karol, Alison Westermann, Ellen Wilson, Rabbi Larry Bach, Josh Meyers, and Larry Lesser.

Lesser's 2020 album *Sparks (<u>https://larrylesser.com/sparks</u>)* features Rabbi Karol's warm harmony vocals on the closing track "Give Thanks" and Amalia Kelter Zeitlin's masterfully expressive violin on six songs, five of which are among the songs that have been heard so far on radio stations in several states.

At the 2021 New Mexico Music Awards, the album was a Finalist in four categories (including Best Album of the Year), a winner in one category (Best Humorous Song, for "The Bark Mitzvah Song"), and was one of only 5 acts picked to <u>perform</u> at the awards night for a capacity crowd of 200 in Albuquerque in July.

The album was recorded in Brainville Studios (Sunland Park, NM) and almost all songs were written in our region, with regional influence particularly salient in the Spanish-inflected Crypto-Jewish ballad "Lights Lead Home". TBE members may recall hearing many of the songs at community concerts over the years such as 2018's Yom HaShir or the "Los Tres Larrys y Alison" concerts at TBE in 2014 and TMS in 2012 that raised over \$500 for the soup kitchen El Caldito and the

food pantries Kelly Memorial Food Bank and Casa de Peregrinos.



The album is unusual in its number (24!) and diversity of songs, its emotional range (from humor to Holocaust), and its being intentionally non-denominational and non-liturgical. The material is also distinctive for being able to work as stand-alone entertainment or as a vehicle for adult education text study, as shown by a combination event at Temple Mount Sinai last year (see photo showing Lesser and Rabbi Larry Karol) and an <u>article</u> in the fall 2020 NewCAJE periodical *The Jewish Educator*.

# Books (and Music) for Teshuvah


As we prepare ourselves for the Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, our thoughts turn inward. We begin to take stock of the past year, how we can do better, and how we can forgive. At the suggestion of our Religious Practices chair, Cherri Hudson-Brown, I have compiled a list of your favorite books (and an album) that have a theme of forgiveness and redemption. Thanks to all of you who shared your suggestions. I hope that this list brings enjoyment and is thought provoking.

Jeanne Brown recommends *The Sandwich Swap*, a children's book on forgiveness. Written by Queen Rania Al Abdullah of Jordan, the book features two best friends who do everything together--until lunch time. At lunch time, each day Lily gets out her peanut butter



sandwich and Salma gets out her pennar outer sandwich and Salma gets out her hummus sandwich. Each girl privately thinks that the other's lunch seems meager and smelly, and feels sorry for her best friend. One day, those private thoughts come out, and each girl throws insults at the other's lunch! Sides are taken. Fights begin. And that's when the girls work together to change things--for themselves and their whole school. First step--to try each other's favorite food! (Turns out that both are delicious!) They seal their forgiveness with a beautifully illustrated hug. Next step--to get the whole school involved in exchanging foods--and broadening everyone's horizons.

Deana Kessin recommends *A Memory of Violets* by Hazel Gaynor. "1876. Among the filth and depravity of Covent Garden's flower markets, orphaned Irish sisters Flora and Rosie Flynn sell posies of violets and watercress to survive. It is a pitiful existence, made bearable only by each other's presence. When they become separated, the decision of a desperate



woman sets their lives on very different paths. 1912. Twenty-one-year-old Tilly Harper leaves the peace and beauty of her native Lake District for London to become assistant housemother at one of Mr. Shaw's Training Homes for Watercress and Flower Girls. For Tilly, the appointment is a fresh start, a chance to leave her troubled past behind. Soon after she arrives at the home, Tilly finds a notebook belonging to Flora Flynn. Hidden between the pages she finds dried flowers and a heartbreaking tale of loss and separation as Flora's entries reveal how she never stopped looking for her lost sister. Tilly sets out to discover what happened to Rosie--but the search will not be easy." (from Amazon summary) Karen Currier recommends *Small Great Things* by Jodi Picoult. "Ruth Jefferson is a labor and delivery nurse at a Connecticut hospital with more than twenty years' experience. During her shift, Ruth begins a routine checkup on a newborn, only to be told a few minutes later that she's been reassigned to another patient. The parents are white




supremacists and don't want Ruth, who is African American, to touch their child. The hospital complies with their request, but the next day, the baby goes into cardiac distress while Ruth is alone in the nursery. Does she obey orders or does she intervene? (from the author's website)"

Rabbi Barry Leff writes "It's only partly on forgiveness and redemption, but far and away the best book on the High Holidays - and in fact, the

only book other than the Torah that I read every year - is Rabbi Alan Lew's (z"l) This is Real and You are Completely Unprepared

"Lew's exploration of the Days of Awe begins not with Rosh Hashanah-which is not featured until chapter six-but with Tisha B'Ay and the month of Elul. These





observances, Lew feels, set a tone of rigorous introspection in the Jewish calendar. He follows the story through Yom Kippur and Sukkot, drawing on Jewish tradition, his own experiences and a few Buddhist stories (Lew is a selfdescribed "Zen rabbi") to take the reader on a journey of spiritual transformation-"from birth to death and back to renewal again."(From Publishers Weekly)

Soon to be member, Michele Cowan (welcome!), recommends two books:

1. *The World That We Knew* by Alice Hoffman-It's historical fiction set during World War II and tells the story of two Jewish girls and a Golem created to protect one of the girls. It's really engrossing and a completely different take on this subject.

2. *Thirteen Ways of Looking* by Colum McCann - There are three stories in this book and two have Jewish themes. The question of forgiveness and redemption isn't always clear cut and maybe open to interpretation. I love McCann's writing and the fact that he makes you think out of the box."




Luke Duddridge writes "I don't have a book that fully meets that description. However, here is a book that has given me a lot to think about, *Jewish with Feeling, a guide to Meaningful Jewish Practice*, by Rabbi Zalman Schachter-Shalomi with Joel Segel. It's interesting, thought provoking, and for me, a challenging read.



From Patrick Quinn "This is not an exact response to your query, but close, I think. Many times during the pandemic I have gained spiritual strength by listening to original music written and performed by a

young, Conservative Rabbi, Josh Warshawsky and his friends. He has just released a beautiful Hineni -- sort of a prayer to be able to pray -- in preparation for the high holidays. It can be accessed at the following YouTube link: <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=jUAGskvnD5k</u>. He offers the following translation for the beginning of the prayer:

Here I am, lacking in merit, Trembling and frightened who, who am I? I have come to plead before you even though I am unfit and unworthy to do so. Therefore I request of you, Master of Forgiveness, Heart-Searcher, Prayer-Listener, Revealer of Deep Secrets, Awesome and Wondrous, Sha'Da'i: May the path I embark on be successful. Accept my prayer like it is the prayer of the righteous and innocent. Accept it as though it is sung out in a sweet voice. Accept it as though it is prayed by someone whose life has been well spent, by someone who is deeply interconnected with the people and the world around them."

- Focus Group on Sisterhood and Mensch Club had 20 participants. It was a good open discussion on how to broaden the members' participation in the future.
- URJ Survey Nan Rubin, Lynn Zeemont, and Joanne Turnbull are working with a mentor in the URJ to talk about the data portrait of our congregation and how it can help us plan for our future.
- The board approved membership for Honey Devins.




