In order to ensure that the name of your loved one will be recited during services, we have instituted the following practices:

- The Hebrew dates for each week's Yahrzeits are listed in each Adelante.
- Names are read on the Shabbat **following** the Yahrzeit, or on the day, if it falls on that Shabbat.
- Hebrew vs. conventional (Gregorian) calendar: The temple's tradition is to base the Yahrzeits list on the Hebrew calendar. Those who wish to have a name read on a Friday night close to the conventional (Gregorian) calendar date are asked to please email or call the Temple office a few days prior to the service.
- *Asterisks indicate that a loved one has been permanently memorialized with a plaque in the Temple sanctuary. If you are interested in acquiring a plaque for your loved one, contact the Temple office. Current TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$300. Non TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$600.

URJ Survey and Rabbi Search

Last month at the High Holidays, I said that launching the search for a Rabbi is a decision we should make together. The Board has been doing homework to prepare for this issue, and the time has come. Please join us at a special membership meeting on November 11, to hear our report. The meeting will be on Zoom, and we hope you will all share your thoughts to provide the guidance we need on how to proceed. Meanwhile, Joanne Turnbull, Lynn Zeemont, and I met with Robin Eisenberg who walked us through the many charts and graphs generated by our responses to the U.R.J. self-assessment



survey. Robin was very surprised at the high number of responses you sent in for a synagogue our sizeit was a genuine indication of the strong engagement you have with Temple Beth-El.

Some of the facts in the survey were ones we already knew, but were clearly documented. For example, she did not have to tell us our membership was largely older. But the answers indicated that actually more than 80% of our members are over 65, and 30% are over 75. Barely 10% are under 54, which is especially disconcerting for the future of our religious school and potential Bar and Bat Mitzvah students.

Even so, you expressed high satisfaction with the synagogue overall. More than 60% of you said that over the last three years, "the mission, vision and values of the synagogue strongly resonate with me" and that "I have grown spiritually or intellectually as a Jew." And 75% of you also said that "the synagogue has helped me develop a deeper sense of belonging to a community, something bigger than myself."

More telling is the chart showing why you joined the Temple. While nearly 30% of you joined "because it was a family tradition", you have stayed a member because of "the prayer services" and "the members of the community."


The final chart I want to mention is your top choices for roles of a new Rabbi. You want someone who will be highly engaged with the congregation, but also one who will be a spiritual leader, a worship leader, and a provider of pastoral care and life cycle events. These criteria will definitely be given strong consideration as our Rabbi search takes shape.


We have a lot more charts that mostly reinforce this same positive picture of your sentiments about Temple Beth-El. Because a priority for our activities this year is building our membership, this is an especially important message for us to share.



Editor's Corner



Shalom Chaverim!

As I write this article, we are fast approaching November, a month in which there are often no Jewish holidays. This year that is not the case as we light our first candle for Chanukah on the 28th of November. However, it is not Chanukah that I would like to write about. Instead, I would like to write a little about that most American of holidays, Thanksgiving. As some of you may know, historians have theorized that Thanksgiving was modeled on Sukkot. This makes sense for many reasons. First, let's start with the obvious. On Thanksgiving, we get together with our extended families and eat far too much food. Really, what could be more Jewish than that? But the similarities go farther than that. Both Sukkot and Thanksgiving are holidays that take place after harvest time and center around giving thanks to God for the bounty. The original Thanksgiving in 1621 was likely to have taken place outdoors, much like our festival meals that we eat in the Sukkah. It lasted for several days like the seven day Feast of Tabernacles. While these may have been coincidences, there are reasons to believe that they are not. According to Gloria Kaufer Greene, author of the "New Jewish Holiday Cookbook" (Times Books, 1999), The Pilgrims based their customs on the Bible. They would also have spent time with another group of exiles. I found this bit of information on a website called "One for Israel." In 1492 as Columbus was sailing, the Jews were exiled from Spain. Many of them made their way to Holland. In the early 17th century, the Puritans who would become Pilgrims also found themselves in Holland due to religious persecution. It is likely that the two groups would have encountered each other and that the Pilgrims would have remembered the festival of Sukkot when they settled in the New World. The same website also mentions that the word Hodu is Hebrew for "thanks". Tarnegol hodu, translates to "Indian chicken" and is the term used for turkey (because it was thought that turkeys came from India). This of course proves nothing but is an interesting fact nonetheless.

Because this is an article about Thanksgiving and food is central to both Thanksgiving and Jewishness, I would like to leave you with a recipe I encountered while doing research. It comes from the aforementioned cookbook author, Gloria Kaufer Greene.

Double Corn Bread

- 1 cup yellow cornmeal
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 large eggs
- 1/3 cup canola oil
- 1 (about 15-ounce) can cream-style corn, including liquid. (Note: Because cream-style corn does not contain dairy products, it is pareve.)
- 1. Preheat oven to 400 F. Coat an 8-inch square baking pan with no-stick spray.
- 2. In a medium bowl, combine cornmeal, flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Make a well in the center, and add eggs, oil and canned corn. Beat wet ingredients with a fork to combine them, then incorporate dry ingredients. Stir only until all ingredients are completely moistened and combined.
- 3. Spoon mixture into prepared pan. Bake for 20-25 minutes, or until knife inserted in center comes out clean. Cut into 16 squares and serve directly from the pan.

Let me know if you try it. Happy Thanksgiving!

COMMUNITY CORNER THE PATH TO DEEPER LISTENING

Listening isn't just about not saying anything when someone else is talking. You have to open your mind to what someone is saying and open your heart to what they are feeling.

How many times have you been listening to someone talk and just waiting for them to take a breath so you could jump in and say something that you had been thinking the whole time they were talking?

Deep listening requires work. It requires us to get out of the way and stop the chatter that goes on in our heads long enough to focus on what another person is saying.

We don't have to be clever, or brilliant or give people solutions. We just need to take a breath and listen. We need to cultivate curiosity, openness, and awareness. Someone's body language or voice may be telling you more than their words. Although we aren't able to see everyone in person right now, you can pick up clues as to how someone is feeling by the tone, loudness or softness, or rhythm of their voice. Our voices convey our emotions. Some of us use Zoom or FaceTime which show us body language quite vividly.

Part of the human condition is the desire to be heard and understood. Listening to others is a response to those needs.

Being heard is so close to being loved that for the average person, they are almost indistinguishable. ~ David Augsburger

Ask questions and encourage people to talk with statements like: "I would like to hear more, I am listening, I may not understand but it looks like this is really important to you. Could you explain that further. Can you tell me what you are feeling about this?" You may learn something about someone you might not have learned any other way.

Listening without interruption gives another person the chance to hear themselves and gain clarity from the quiet space you have opened up for them.

Listening is an art. We thrive when we feel heard and when we are seen. Presence is powerful. Our listening presence is reassuring to others.

When someone listens deeply to you, it's like coming home.

Reflection: Think about the last time someone listened to you and what that was like.

Today's Practice: Listen deeply to the next person you have a conversation with.

How it Can Keep YOU & YOUR Family Healthy

Whether you're planning a family or looking to be proactive about your health, hear from JSreen's genetic counselor about the importance of genetic testing.

- Determine your risk for having a child with a genetic disease, like Tay-Sachs or cystic fibrosis.
- Test for genetic changes that increase a person's risk for many types of cancer, including breast, prostate, colon and others.

There are brochures in the vestibule of the Temple about JScreen, a genetic testing program devised in the Human Genetics Department of Emory University, for young people doing family planning (ages 18-45), and people 21 and older, concerned about cancer. The process involves an at-home saliva test, state of the art sequencing technology, a tele-health genetic counseling session and some options for disease prevention.

Why now? Synagogue B'Nai Zion in El Paso received a grant from the Jewish Community Foundation of El Paso, and have invited Temple Mt. Sinai and TBE to share in the information and a 50% discount on the cost of the tests. Unfortunately, this discount is only for people with El Paso and Las Cruces zip codes (so while you may have family or friends in other places who could benefit from these tests, they will be paying full price). So with an insurance card, and the special code EPLC50, the cost of the family planning (after the discount) will be \$74.50 for family planning, and \$100 for screening of 40 types of cancer. If you choose to get both tests, the discounted price is \$150. Robin Krasne from B'Nai Zion who is the coordinator of this effort, assured me that should someone not be able to pay for the test wholly or in part, the grant can help out.

Temple Beth-El Board of Trustees October 21, 2021 Board Meeting Summary

After a beautiful invocation by Bryan McCuller, status reports were shared.

- The Political Forum sponsored by the Social Action/Adult Ed Committee was attended by between 25 and 35 people either in person or on Zoom. The questions were thoughtful and the format was conducive to more conversation than debate. There were compliments from both candidates and attendees.
- The Afghan Refugee project has been successful in supplying two of the three kitchens it committed to as well as collecting over \$1300. Any monies left after the completion of the commitment will be donated to Lutheran Family Services, the local coordinator of the project, and the Muslim Student Association to use as they see fit in the resettlement project.
- The Matzo Ball Open was very successful. Our thanks to Lynn Zeemont for her efforts on this.
- The Religious School is off to a good start with Rebecca Berkson and Sheri Spiegel volunteering their time to assume administrative duties. Due to the small number of students, we no longer have a paid administrator. Diane Fleishman will be hosting a parent meeting Sunday, October 31.
- The Religious Practices Committee has scheduled upcoming Shabbat services with some lay led, some with Rabbi Sofia. Some will be on Zoom only and others will be both in person and on Zoom. Cherri Hudson-Brown said they are already starting to discuss possible Chanukah celebrations.
- The Renaissance Faire will be held November 6 and 7. We will again be participating with a partner on the 6th. Dave Zeemont is leading the effort.
- The Finance report was given by Michael Mandel. We are doing well and are happy that we have welcomed some new members.
- Nan Rubin will contact the family of Tanah Hemingway regarding the donation of funds in Tanah's memory.
- The board discussed the realities of and the process for a rabbinic search. There will be a Congregational Meeting on Thursday November 11 to discuss our efforts as we prepare to enter rabbinic placement.
- Steve Haydu reported that there was a training session to enlarge the pool of those who can assist with the technology required to have virtual and hybrid services. There will be a Sign Up Genius program put in place to help with the scheduling of

- that help. We will be looking into other technology needs and cost estimates for a better sound system and better cameras. What we have in place now is not sustainable.
- The Membership Committee, under the leadership of Martha Roditti, will be developing a process for us to welcome our new members which will include a check list to help with communication.
- Pearie Bruder will look into cleaning options for our building now that it is once again in use.
- Nan Rubin shared some of the information from the Bench Marking Survey conduced by the URJ. Our congregants had a high participation rate. When compared with other congregations of our size, our responses about the relationships of our congregants with the temple were very positive. We will continue to analyze the data which will be helpful as we enter rabbinic placement and as we look to recruit new members.

City Council Candidate Forum Update

On Sunday, October 17, the Social Action/Adult Ed committee of the Temple sponsored another successful political forum. This was our first after previous COVIDrelated cancellations. It was a hybrid, community-wide, forum for the candidates up for election for the three City Council seats (districts 3, 5 and 6) on November 9, 2021. Eight of the nine candidates attended the forum with about 20 people attending in person at the synagogue. There were another dozen or so people attending via Zoom and on Facebook. The format of the forum was complemented by a number of the candidates afterwards. One candidate observed that this was the first opportunity she had to interact with all the candidates at one time. Additionally, one of the campaign managers observed that, over the years, ours has consistently been the best forum that is sponsored during election season. This is a result of the thoughtful questions developed by the committee and the respectful tone set for the forum.

The forum was also attended by a reporter from the Sun-News. He was impressed by a number of the questions asked of the candidates and as a result, wrote a very complimentary article about our event which was recently published in our daily paper. Also, a number of candidates and participants expressed the hope that we would again sponsor a similar event next year, when state-wide and national elections will be up for contest.


