

In order to ensure that the name of your loved one will be recited during services, we have instituted the following practices:

- The Hebrew dates for each week's Yahrzeits are listed in each Adelante.
- Names are read on the Shabbat <u>following</u> the Yahrzeit, or on the day, if it falls on that Shabbat.
- Hebrew vs. conventional (Gregorian) calendar: The temple's tradition is to base the Yahrzeits list on the Hebrew calendar. Those who wish to have a name read on a Friday night close to the conventional (Gregorian) calendar date are asked to please email or call the Temple office a few days prior to the service.
- \*Asterisks indicate that a loved one has been permanently memorialized with a plaque in the Temple sanctuary. If you are interested in acquiring a plaque for your loved one, contact the Temple office. Current TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$300. Non TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$600.



## Reform Movement, Past and Present

Although I was brought up in a Reform congregation, I didn't learn very much about the actual history of the Reform

movement. I knew it was started in Germany in the mid -1800s in an effort to 'modernize' many Jewish practices, but I did not know this was a response in part to the Enlightenment, which opened up the ghettos of Europe and allowed the Jews to function freely in the economic and social culture of the times.

I was also unaware how the movement has struggled with the conflicting dynamics of the universal tendency to blend in with our neighbors, at the same time needing to maintain the religious and moral identity that has kept us apart.

So I was very surprised when I attended the General Assembly of the URJ [Union for Reform Judaism] at the beginning of January. This special membership meeting was called for the exclusive purpose of approving bylaw amendments that would diversify the governance of the organization, and I expected a really wonky affair, with a lot of legal exposition and discussion of organizational structure.

Instead, I was greeted by a dynamic mini-history lesson of the accomplishments and impact the Reform movement has had, not solely in adopting a broad range of egalitarian and contemporary religious practices, but also our commitment to social justice and Tikkun Olam, the moral imperative to repair the world.

In particular in this era of Black Lives Matter, we were reminded of our long-standing engagement with civil rights. It was Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel who, when asked why he marched with Dr. King, answered by saying he was "praying with his feet." Instead of a boring meeting with nearly a thousand people on the Zoom, this was moving and inspiring. The voting seemed an afterthought.

I know the events that occurred at Temple Beth Israel in Colleyville, Texas -a congregation very similar to ours -have turned our thoughts yet again to anti-Semitism and physical security in our synagogues. Sadly, this is an issue we must continue to address.

The GA began with a reading of Amanda Gorman's most recent poem. Written at the end of December clearly with the past year in mind, it still urges us forward with hope. We can embrace this uplifting message as the URJ prepares to celebrate its 150th anniversary.

We have to keep in mind there have been other people in history who have been targeted, and we along with their descendants are here to be witnesses to the worst of human history, but we're also here to point out the best in humankind.

So experiment with hamantaschen recipes, work more on a costume this year, make a three-cornered hat if you feel like it. We've got more than a month to prepare. We're still here.

## COMMUNITY CORNER TAMING FEAR

Life has always been uncertain. But somehow these days the volume of uncertainty has been turned up. Yes, I am referring to the pandemic, its continuing variants, but also to climate change, political polarization, poverty, racism, and inadequate public health care. Any one of those things are scary by themselves let alone happening all at the same time.

Our bodies are built in a way to respond to danger called the "fight, flight, or freeze response." You may experience any of these symptoms: rapid breathing, accelerated heart rate, increased muscle tension, sweating, goose bumps, sleep disturbances, jumpiness, shakiness, difficulty concentrating, trouble swallowing, and dizziness. Fear is a universal emotion experienced by everyone around the world.

Fear is an evolutionary development. It developed to protect us from harm and from being eaten by a predator. The brain, however, doesn't know the difference between being chased by a lion, and an intense conversation. It feels threatened and behaves in the very same way producing chemicals to ensure our survival. It can be hard to calm our body down once it gets going. That's why trying to have an important discussion with someone when you are in the "fight, flight, or freeze response" is pretty pointless.

Even without being in crisis mode, our everyday fears and our fears about the future can debilitate us, keeping us from taking that next step.

Ultimately, action is the best way to tame fear. Even small steps can give us the confidence to take more small steps and then larger ones.

Here are some ideas to help tame fear:

- Take a few deep breaths.
- Reach out to others.
- Remember thoughts are not facts.
- Develop the skill of watching your thoughts, feelings and behavior from a larger perspective.
- Substitute negative thoughts for positive ones.
- Practice being compassionate to yourself.
- Create a mantra A mantra is a word or a phrase that has meaning to you and is repeated silently over and over again. When carefully chosen mantras are said to have the ability to alter your subconscious and mood. It can be as simple as "I am calm, Shalom, peace, or let go and let God."
- Pray for what you need.

## Editor's Corner



Shalom Chaverim! When I first started editing the Adelante, I had no idea how much my knowledge of all things Jewish would grow as a result. Some of these learning opportunities occurred as I was putting together the calendar for this month. As you may or may not know, 5782 is a leap year. Unlike the secular leap year, we do not add just one day every 4 years to balance out the cycle. Rather, we add an extra month, a second Adar. I learned that these leap years occur 7 times in a 19 year cycle and that in Hebrew, a leap year is referred to as Shanah Me'uberet, or pregnant year. To me, this is so much more poetic. It invokes not just a correction, but rather a year that offers more.

I found all this out because I noticed a holiday on the calendar that I had never noticed before, Purim Katan. This translates literally to "minor Purim" We celebrate it on the 14th day of Adar I because the cycle of days is the same in Adar I as Adar II. However, Purim is celebrated only in Adar II. The Talmud says there is "no difference between the fourteenth of the first Adar and the fourteenth of the second Adar "However, our observances are different. On Purim Katan we do not read the megillah, or send Mishloach Manot. The most common way to celebrate is to have a somewhat larger or more festive lunch. But in general, the most important thing to do is to increase our joy on this day just as is commanded for Purim.

So, while Purim Katan is a minor holiday, it is still a mitzvah or commandment to celebrate it. I think that having an extra day to focus on increasing our joy is something that we cam all get behind.

Which brings us to Purim, the 14th of Adar II. We do not yet know what our Temple celebration will look like, but we will celebrate together. And if you are looking for a costume, Halloweencostumes.com may be able to help you out. I don't know if they have mentioned Purim on their website in the past, but this year they even have Purim specific costumes. True, it is only Esther and Haman (boo!), and Haman's (boo!) hat does not have 3 corners, but I appreciate the acknowledgement.

## Temple Beth-El Board of Trustees Board Meeting Summary January 20, 2022

- Vice-President Lynn Zeemont conducted the meeting in President Nan Rubin's absence.
- Lynn presented the invocation, an insightful prayer for the pandemic.
- Finance Report indicated the dues collection through the middle of January is on target to reach our normal level. The Tower Point Cell Tower lease is continuing to be studied.
- The written report from president Nan Rubin included information on:
  - -the ongoing Rabbinic Search. The application has been submitted and the committee is going to have a session on implicit bias training.
  - -a grant which was submitted to the El Paso Federation to support a major outreach and promotion effort, assuming we have a new rabbi to introduce to the community.
  - -attending the URJ General Assembly meeting with Steve Haydu.
  - -Bob Kimball helping with updating information on our website.
  - -Beth Tierney taking over managing the members mailing lists.
  - -Mark Saltman contacting LCPD to increase surveillance on the temple.
  - -Cheryl Decker being in touch with our local FBI liaison to provide more training for the congregation. She will let us know when training will be scheduled.
  - -the Federation in El Paso has scheduled a conference call/Zoom on Monday 1/24. The link will be provided to those interested.
- Another grant has also been requested in coordination with Temple Mt. Sinai in El Paso for a family retreat.
- After having consulted with the Executor of Tanah Hemingway's estate, payment of \$2000 has been sent from the Rabbi's Discretionary fund to her daughter Riva who made the payment for the funeral, \$1700 of which had been donated by congregants for the benefit of Tanah's family.
- Steve Haydu will write a job description for Technology Assistant for help to include the website and delivering hybrid services.

Board Meeting Minutes, continued from previous column

- Religious Practices Committee reported that with HUC holding only online classes until February and only essential travel being allowed it is unclear when Rabbi Sofia will next be in person in Las Cruces. We will all have to be flexible.
- Nominating Committee, chaired by Bryan McCuller, has begun meeting with a goal of being ready with candidates by April 1, 2022.
- Dee Cook reported that the Ways and Means Committee is looking for more donations for the temporarily postponed A Night at the Auction. The committee wants to be ready to go as soon as it is deemed safe to hold the event. This can only happen if the donations are in.
- Social Action report was submitted by Ned Rubin on the Afghan Refugee Project.
- Religious School Committee report was given by Marieka Brown. Students are currently meeting both inside and outside the building.
- The Board approved membership for Barbara and John Busby.
- Sisterhood service on March 18 will be led by Debbie Levy as Cynthia Herber has relocated out of the area.



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
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
