- Names are read on the Shabbat <u>following</u> the Yahrzeit, or on the day, if it falls on that Shabbat.

• Hebrew vs. conventional (Gregorian) calendar: The temple's tradition is to base the Yahrzeits list on the Hebrew calendar. Those who wish to have a name read on a Friday night close to the conventional (Gregorian) calendar date are asked to please email or call the Temple office a few days prior to the service.

*Asterisks indicate that a loved one has been permanently memorialized with a plaque in the Temple sanctuary. If you are interested in acquiring a plaque for your loved one, contact the Temple office. Current TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$300. Non TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$600.



Updates from our President

Temple Beth-El has managed to get through the last full calendar year of ongoing covid conditions in relatively good shape, although it has been pretty

exhausting, especially for our hard-working and inspiring Religious Practices Committee, which has enabled us to keep having services on Shabbat and other holiday celebrations.

We owe a great deal of thanks to all of you who are keeping Temple Beth-El vibrant and relevant, even in the face of tremendous uncertainty as we enter the new year. "A Night at the Auction" is already scheduled for January 29, with a plan that it will be indoors but without food, and we hope we can keep that commitment.

We're also looking ahead a few months, in hopes that we can actually hold the Jewish Food and Folk Festival in the spring. But the planning must begin in January, and at the moment, there's a lot of reluctance to put in effort without knowing if this big event can actually occur. It won't happen if we can only make plans a month at a time.

On the other hand, I can report a happy development - an anonymous donor has made a gift to Temple Beth-El of \$10,000. The donor is a former member, and the money is unrestricted. However, they have indicated that they would like the money to be allocated towards the search and hiring of a full-time Rabbi if needed. We are tremendously grateful for this generosity, and especially pleased at the timing, because the money will certainly go to a good use in this effort!

The Rabbi Search Committee is in place, and members include: Frances Williams, a founding member of Temple Beth-El; Donna Popky, one of our newest members; both Rebecca and Arthur Berkson; immediate past President Cheryl Decker; Stuart Kelter, one of our mentors to Student Rabbi Sofia; Finance Committee member Allen Blum; Social Action/Adult Ed Chair Ned Rubin; Sue Brown; Diane Fleischman; and Wendee Lorbeer.

In addition, although they each declined serving full-time on the committee, Susan Michelson has volunteered to help read over and edit our materials; and Cynthia Herber, as a former wife of a rabbi, has offered to provide advice to help us understand "what things a congregation should NOT do!" We'll have our first meeting early in the year and will keep you apprised of our progress.

Changes Ahead in Worship?

Just when we thought we might be getting back to normal, a new variant has appeared. We might not have to make major changes in our worship, but then again if there are more mutations or if vaccinated people lose too much immunity, we may be back to Zoom only. We don't know at this writing. Uncertainty can be stressful.

Once again we're facing a glass half empty or glass full perspective.

From late March 2020 until the summer of 2021 there wasn't a choice. All our Friday night services and holidays were via Zoom. The past few months, we've been able to worship together in the sanctuary with more spacing of seats and fewer attendees. There was the capability of the vaccinated to celebrate the High Holy Days in the sanctuary or, for those being more cautious, to participate by Zoom. There was communal Tashlich and a sukkah, although modified to allow social distancing. Some of our temple children became adults holding the Torah in the temple.

I had imagined we would all be back in the temple social hall this December and eating latkes. Once again we've had to innovate. There were latkes but they were eaten outdoors with propane space heaters nearby. Some of us stayed at home and watched what we could on Zoom.

When it was time for reciting Kaddish for my dad's yahrzeit, I wanted to be in a room with other people. The service was lightly attended, but I saw a dear friend who I hadn't seen for months and, as usual, Leora and Stuart gave a beautiful service with music and thoughtfulness.

On the other hand, I saw the faces on Zoom on the tv screen in the sanctuary, and they were our congregation and friends, too.

When we were all Zoom, I heard from some people that they didn't like Zoom and they wouldn't go to services if they were on Zoom. I know people who are dealing with cancer and whose autoimmune systems are compromised so they can't attend services in person, but appreciate being able to connect with others on Zoom. There are people who don't drive at night, or have moved out of state, but they can connect on Zoom.

I think we need to appreciate what we can do rather than concentrate on what we can't. Our tech team has been amazing, but they're getting tired, and some things may need to be cut back. We might also be able to get some part-time help with tech.

One day this will all be over, but there may be some changes as a result of this experience. Until then, we have to watch out for each other, take care of ourselves and appreciate the moments we are given.

A Brief History of Jews in New Mexico and Las Cruces

When the City of Las Cruces invited the Cuarteto Latinoamericano to come to Las Cruces to provide a free concert of Jewish music, Temple Beth-El, through the Adult Ed committee, was able to co-sponsor a "meet and greet" event with these talented musicians. This was held on Friday, 12/10/2021 at the Branigan Library. In addition to been treated to an hour of wonderful string quartet music, TBE prepared some desserts to share along with this *Brief History of Jews in New Mexico and Las Cruces. Several congregants came to this noon concert, but it was suggested that we also share this with our larger congregation.*

Historians believe that Spanish and Portuguese Jews first came to New World in the early 16^a century after fleeing the Inquisition. To hide from the Holy Office of the Inquisition, they outwardly appeared Catholic while privately maintaining their Jewish identities and passing them on to their descendants. Many also migrated from Mexico City through El Paso del Norte and traveled north along the Rio Grande into what would later become the United States and New Mexico. These became the *Conversos, or "hidden Jews" or crypto-Jews. But that's for another time*...

In the 19th century, with a great amount of political unrest in Europe and the opening of the Santa Fe trail in 1821, two waves of immigration brought Jews, among others, to the New Mexico Territory. The first wave was largely from Germany in the 1840's and 1850's. The second wave was of Eastern European Jews influenced by the coming of the railroad to New Mexico in the 1880's. Most of these Jewish immigrants were merchants and tradesmen, opening mercantile stores and trading posts, and becoming some of New Mexico's more prominent citizens. They first settled in northern New Mexico, including Las Vegas, Santa Fe and Albuquerque and made a name for themselves there as business and civic leaders.

Here, in Las Cruces, several Jewish families settled, notably the Freudenthals, Lesinkys and Solomons. In the mid-20^a century, the Jewish community here became stronger after World War II when some Holocaust survivors and university faculty came to the region. The growth of White Sands Proving Grounds [now Missile Range] also brought both military and civilian Jewish families to the area. This growth continued during and after the 1970s. The Jewish community has been a vital part of Las Cruces over the years. It is my understanding that there have been three Jewish mayors of the city of Las Cruces.

Also, you may recognize the two lion sculptures at the driveway between city hall and the library, off Main St. They are "E. J." and "Mabel". The male lion is named for Eugene J. Stern. He was born in Hungary in 1885 and immigrated to the US in 1903. He and his wife, Mabel, moved to Las Cruces from Las Vegas, NM in 1917. He established several businesses here...Popular Dry Goods, Mutual Building and Loan, and another retail store called "The White House." He became a major philanthropist, funding scholarships at NMSU and providing funding to build the Temple Beth-El synagogue. He paid Mexican sculptor Barios Caballero to design and create the two bronze lions now on display outside of our city hall.

Temple Beth-El was established in Las Cruces in 1953. The name of the synagogue means ''House of God'' and the congregation dedicated its first building in 1962. Prior to that, meetings, celebrations, and services were held in members' homes. As membership grew, the congregation needed a larger building and after several years of fund raising, a new building was completed in January 2007 with seating for 400 people. Temple Beth-El now has almost 125 member families coming from a wide range of Jewish backgrounds and many parts of the United States as well as the world.

Let me tell you a bit about our practice. There are three main streams of Jewish practice commonly identified as Orthodox, Conservative, and Reform. These are not political affiliations but describe differing aspects of religious practice. Temple Beth-El is a member of the Reform Jewish movement, which is the largest denomination in the United States. It had its beginning in Germany during the 1800s and is considered the most religiously 'liberal' among Jewish denominations. It views the Torah, our holy scripture (the first five books of the Old Testament) as divinely inspired but written in the language of the time in which it was given. The text revolves around laws to live by, and although they reflect their times, the words of the Torah remain relevant and continue to guide us today.

The Reform movement stresses following the key principles of Judaism, but with less stress on traditional ritual and allowing the religion to respond to contemporary conditions, individual expression, and progressive values. An underlying principle upon which the Reform movement is built is, in Hebrew, *tikkun olam*. This translates to "repairing the world" ...do something that will not only fix any damage but **improve** upon it. So much of our actions and energy is directed to "doing good works", big or little. So, we have a very active Social Action and Adult Education committee. We also stress equality of the sexes, so all roles of religious practice and synagogue leadership are equally open to men and women.

The Reform Movement and our synagogue is very welcoming and diverse, with membership open to interfaith families, LGBTQ members and same sex parents, and families of all makeup. All congregants are welcome to participate in all synagogue activities, rituals and ceremonies.

Most of the refugees resettled so far have been single men, many of whom are sharing housing together. This will probably be scheduled after the new year and we will keep you informed.

Temple Beth-El Board of Trustees Board Meeting Summary December 16, 2012

- Martha Roditti provided an invocation on wisdom.
- Finance Report included the announcement of a donation of \$10,000 made by a former member. While the donation funds are not restricted, the donor would be pleased if the monies would be used towards the hiring of a rabbi. The donor wishes to remain anonymous.
- Conversations continue with those involved with the funeral of Tanah Hemingway.
- The formation of a Rabbinic Search Committee is underway and it should be completed soon.
- Discussion items to be on future agendas include a Bylaws and Constitution Review and Board Nominations procedures for next year,
- After much discussion, it was decided to hold a meeting early in January with those who were past JFFF team leaders as well as anyone else interested in discussing how we could modify the event so it could be a safe and successful fundraiser in this time of Covid.
- The Finance Committee will look into the possibility of a change to our cell tower lease.
- Religious Practices Committee reported that the December 4th Chanukah Celebration went well. The use of outdoor space heaters loaned to us for the evening allowed congregants to enjoy latkes outside. In an effort to help the congregation during Covid, Sisterhood will look into purchasing several heaters for the temple.
