Russia, Ukraine and Refugees

It has been more than three weeks since the Russian invasion of Ukraine, and the warfare is dominating our news. It is horrifying to watch buildings going up in flames, hundreds trying to seek safety in makeshift bomb shelters, and thanks to the

magic of technology, we are watching it all in real time, as it is happening.

Thousands are fleeing the war, crowding the trains and buses heading for the western borders. I am certain that most of us are rooting for the Ukrainians, to push back the Russian invaders and find safety within their own borders.

But the story is more complicated for us as Jews. My Facebook page is flooded with old photographs of people's families, grandparents, aunts and uncles, who immigrated from Ukraine. As Jews we have deep roots there in the Pale of Settlement - that Western section of the Russian Empire that included Lithuania, much of Poland, Latvia, and Belarus. But it was Ukraine that was at the heart. The Pale was that part of Europe where Jews were forced to live for more than 200 years. Forbidden from living in towns, the Jews eked out a living in rural villages or shtetls. Periodic pogroms and attacks by Cossacks were also commonplace. During WWII, the Nazis did everything they could to exterminate the Jews in Ukraine, including the infamous massacre of more than 30,000 Jews at Babi Yar, a ravine outside Kiev.

The fictional town of Anatevka, where Tevye the milkman lived in Fiddler on the Roof, was located in Ukraine. And it was from here that our ancestors immigrated in droves to the United States, where they were not exactly welcome.

Millions are now crossing the borders into Romania, Poland, Hungary and are being met with food, housing, clothing for children, and work visas. A humanity crisis not seen since World War II. But what about those other refugees who have been fleeing to Europe, from northern Africa, places like Yemen, Somalia, Libya, Syria? And the refugees on our own border, from Mexico, Guatemala, Colombia, but Honduras, Haiti? They are also fleeing war but of a different kind, gang violence and economic despair.

Shouldn't we treat them equally? Passover is coming up soon, and we'll be celebrating our liberation from slavery, and where we are commanded to open our doors to those who are hungry. What can we do to provide support not only to the fleeing Ukrainians and the displaced Afghans, but all these others and our borders? It is not an easy question, but those pictures of our relatives should remind us they are not the only ones who have struggled to reach America.

In order to ensure that the name of your loved one will be recited during services, we have instituted the following practices:

- The Hebrew dates for each week's Yahrzeits are listed in each Adelante.
 - Names are read on the Shabbat **following** the Yahrzeit, or on the day, if it falls on that Shabbat.
 - Hebrew vs. conventional (Gregorian) calendar: The temple's tradition is to base the Yahrzeits list on the Hebrew calendar. Those who wish to have a name read on a Friday night close to the conventional (Gregorian) calendar date are asked to please email or call the Temple office a few days prior to the service.
- *Asterisks indicate that a loved one has been permanently memorialized with a plaque in the Temple sanctuary. If you are interested in acquiring a plaque for your loved one, contact the Temple office. Current TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$300. Non TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$600.

Temple Policy Updates

Mi Sheberach list

Adopted by Temple Beth-El Board of Trustees on March 17, 2022, and to go into effect May 1, 2022—Temple Beth-El maintains a list of the names of congregants or friends, loved ones or persons of concern to congregants for whom the traditional prayer for healing, the Mi Sheberach, is offered weekly during Shabbat services.

- The list is read aloud by the Rabbi or service leader weekly during Shabbat services.
- Congregants may request the addition of names to the list by contacting the temple office which will then contact whoever is handling the list (currently that's Jeff Brown).
- Names will remain on the list for up to four weeks (if possible the beginning and end dates will be added as well as the person requesting the name).
- Exceptions will be made for those with long term concerns, and those will be conveyed to the person doing the list. Examples in this case are people undergoing cancer treatments. The person maintaining the list should be notified if the person on the list should be taken off the list.
- For general listing, example, someone recovering from surgery, if the congregant wants to be listed longer than four weeks they will need to contact the temple office to make another request.
- The Rabbi has the discretion to add or to maintain names on the list for any period of time.

Indoor Eating

The Temple board of trustees voted unanimously March 17, 2022 to approve the Infection Control Committee almost unanimous decision to allow eating indoors with appropriate table spacing, but with preference for outdoor eating when weather permits. One board member was absent. In case of great changes in the Covid-19 situation, the indoor eating policy could be reversed.

“I think masks while not eating is wise to protect the higher risk elderly patrons or at least make them feel more comfortable.

If it is any reassurance that this is reasonable, our medical school elected to continue mask wearing for patient care and closer contact while teaching in small intimate groups.


Our [Infection Control Committee] includes a former member of the CDC, microbiologist, several physicians with Infectious disease experience and frequent discussions with the governors team.”

Board Meeting Summary
March 17, 2022**

- An Invocation was given by Steve Haydu.
- The board heard a presentation by Stuart Shiloff, the president of the Jewish Community Foundation of El Paso, inviting our involvement in the NextGen Teen Philanthropy Program.
- The board passed a motion to empower the Search Committee to explore all options in finding a rabbi.
- Treasurer Michael Mandel presented financials that show there are back-up funds.
- The Annual Congregational Meeting will take place Thursday, May 19, 2022 by Zoom only. Bryan McCuller gave a report from the nominating committee. The candidates include Pearie Bruder, Debbie Leyndyke, Donna Popky, and Joel Siegel. President Nan Rubin thanked the committee for their work.
- The board passed a motion to allow eating indoors with appropriate spacing with a preference for outdoor eating as per the recommendations of the Reentry and Infection Control Committee. This will be reevaluated if conditions change.
- The board adopted a policy for the Mi Sheberach list to take effect May 1, 2022.
- The Ways and Means Committee thanked all who have donated to the “Afternoon at the Auction”. They are looking forward to a successful event Sunday, April 10, 2022.
- Sisterhood Council met recently. Plans for a Second Seder are underway. They donated \$500 to the World Union for Progressive Judaism and \$500 from the Gift Shop funds to support orphans in Ukraine.
- It was confirmed that the Sisterhood is responsible for making awards when requested from the Campership Fund.
