### Focused on civil rights

**F**rances F. Williams represents the best that her community, state and the nation has to offer, dedicating her life to serving those who need a helping hand and crashing employment barriers impeding their abilities to be all that they can be.

She was one of the founding commissioners of the New Mexico State Ethics Commission, established to root out corruption in government; helped to build the Vietnam Memorial at Veterans Park, procuring the Huey Helicopter for the memorial; has advocated and worked tirelessly for equal of opportunity in employment establishing and implementing programs leading to an increase of women and minorities in positions never held before; serves as a consultant, adviser to business and government on management and employment issues; served as a housing commissioner for the city and state; a whistleblower who uncovered the corruption in these organizations, resulting in an overhaul of housing authorities in New Mexico; a whistleblower bill protecting them; founding member of Temple Beth El; president of the White Sands Missile Range Museum Historical Foundation raising \$1 million for its expansion; worked to stop a private company wanting to build an electric line across New Mexico which could take private ranchers' property by eminent domain, and impairing the mission of White Sands Missile Range.

# Shavuot Celebration

## Saturday, June 4.

Rabbi Barry Leff will lead a short service, Havdalah and a study session in observance of Erev Shavuot. The service will begin at 8 p.m.

During the study session there will be dairy dessert provided and the following will be discussed:

*Creation, Revelation, and Redemption:*

*Three Central Themes of Jewish Holidays and Prayers*

**Creation:** Rosh Hashanah is the holiday on which we celebrate creation, and the Friday night Amidah is a prayer focused on the same subject. What do the Jewish texts on Creation teach us that we don't learn from science and the Big Bang theory and evolution?

**Revelation:** On Shavuot we mark the giving of the Torah, the traditional source of revelation. The Saturday morning Amidah is about Moses and revelation. How do we know what God wants? Where do we encounter God's presence?

**Redemption:** Passover is the holiday celebrating redemption, when God took us out of Egypt. The Saturday afternoon Amidah praises God as the "crown of salvation." But redemption is not only in the past, it's in the future. Reform prayerbooks have replaced the prayers for the coming of the Messiah with prayers for a Messianic Age. What are Jewish views on Messianism?

Shavuot services will be held at 10:15 a.m. in person with Rabbi Barry Leff. Yizkor will also be observed.

## Editor's Corner

Please excuse the deviation from my lighthearted learning, temple events and general personal musings. We indeed do have much to celebrate and there is always something interesting to learn Jewishly and I promise to get back to that but several events have occurred over the last few weeks that have left me shaken and saddened to the core. The first was the unfortunate shooting of Palestinian-American reporter, Shireen Abu Akleh and, for me, even more troubling, the violence during her funeral procession. I will not get into blame here but this event illustrates just how far we are from peace between Jewish Israelis and Palestinian Arabs.

Closer to home, there was a massacre in Buffalo, New York where a gunman opened fire in a grocery store in a predominantly black neighborhood killing 10 people.

The last incident occurred even closer to home in Uvalde, TX where an 18 year old marked his official reckoning as an adult by first shooting his grandmother and then opening fire on a fourth grade classroom, killing both teachers and all 19 students. This occurred one day after the Sonoma Elementary 5th grade graduation ceremony and one day before the final day of classes. I had a great deal of trouble facing the students in the classroom where I am an Educational Assistant (EA) without crying. But at the end of the day, they all went home to their families safely.

There are no easy solutions to any of these horrible situations. Thoughts and prayers, while well intentioned, have failed to stop them. Anger and rage are equally ineffective. Nor is the solution simple legislation.

So, please excuse me while I mourn for our nation and the world. To those of you actively engaged in seeking and working for changes in policies, increasing effective security, engaging in protecting lives, and helping to heal us mentally and spiritually, I offer my greatest thanks and support. I know we can do better. We must. And we must not rest.

## Where Have All The Rabbis Gone?

As I'm writing this column at the end of May, we've just completed a long weekend hosting Rabbi Evette Lutman. Rabbi Evette is the primary candidate the Search Committee

interviewed as a potential rabbi for Temple Beth-El, and many of you took the opportunity to meet her in person or on zoom, participate in a service, or chat with her informally in the social hall or at a dinner.

Your interest and enthusiasm has been tremendous, and personally I've been encouraged that so many of you filled the synagogue to judge her presence on our bima. On her part, she "adored" the congregation and made it very clear she would like to be our rabbi. Thank you for sending comments or filling out the survey, which will provide guidance to the Search Committee in making a recommendation. It is the membership who must approve hiring a rabbi, so before the end of June you'll have the chance to vote if we want to offer her a contract.

Rabbi Evette was ordained by the Reconstructionist Seminary in Philadelphia, and one concern that was raised periodically was what would it mean if a Reform congregation hired a Reconstructionist Rabbi? Would there be repercussions about us at the URJ?

The answer is probably not. We struggled with looking for a rabbi since December 2021, and because working with the CCAR placement program did not yield any satisfactory candidates, we broadened our search to include a number of non-denominational programs. Rabbi Evette responded to our job posting on one of these other hiring networks. And don't forget that even though he was not a candidate for our pulpit, Rabbi Leff has also led many satisfactory services at Temple Beth-El, although he is Conservative.

The truth is, there is a dire of shortage of pulpit rabbis in North America. After we started our search here, I heard about the Rabbi shortage and looked into it. I found a dozen articles about this serious problem in Reform and Conservative synagogues across the country.

The Conservative movement reported more than 80 synagogues looking for pulpit rabbis, but fewer than 60 rabbis to fill these positions. Both Conservative and Reform rabbinic programs have experienced steady decline in students, and both seminaries have been shutting down academic programs and selling off property. HUC itself ordained fewer than 30 new rabbis this spring.

But the decline in pulpit rabbis is not due solely to the lack of students. There are many other factors, not the least of which is that many students are not looking for a pulpit position. For one, the pandemic made the job even more demanding than it was before, and many rabbis became disillusioned and burned out. Others postponed their retirement until now, when the pandemic seems to be retreating. Still others left the field entirely to work in culture, social services, advocacy, and Jewish education.

And it's not just the rabbis. Congregations are shrinking and merging, and small and rural communities are suffering the most from the lack of interest by pulpit rabbis. Also, because many Jewish holidays like Shabbat, Passover and Hanukkah are celebrated at home, many Jewish families and individuals are maintaining their Jewish identity through other forms of worship and celebration and feel no need for an organized synagogue.

Non-denominational rabbinical programs have been very successful attracting students who are not bound by the rigid lines that seem to delineate perceived differences between Reconstructionist, Conservative, and Reform institutions. At the same time, among many Jewish communities, there is a growing acceptance to cross these institutional boundaries out of sheer necessity.

So our willingness to consider hiring a Reconstructionist rabbi for the pulpit of a Reform synagogue is not a denial of our commitment to the Reform movement. Rather, it is a recognition that Reform Judaism continues to adapt to the conditions of our own times in order to sustain a relevant, vibrant Jewish faith.

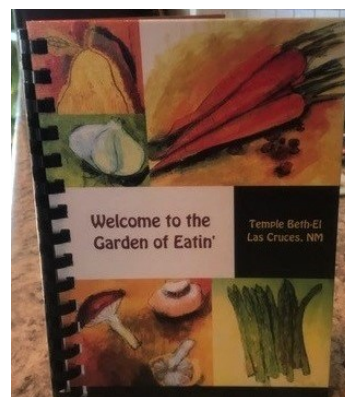
