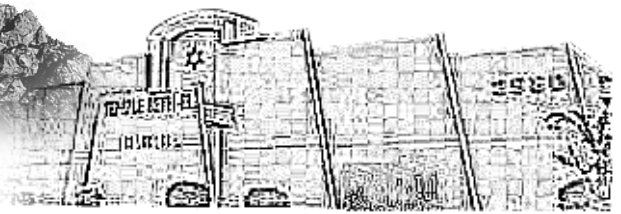

- The Hebrew dates for each week’s Yahrzeits are listed in each Adelante.
- Names are read on the Shabbat **following** the Yahrzeit, or on the day, if it falls on that Shabbat.
- Hebrew vs. conventional (Gregorian) calendar: The temple’s tradition is to base the Yahrzeits list on the Hebrew calendar. Those who wish to have a name read on a Friday night close to the conventional (Gregorian) calendar date are asked to please email or call the Temple office a few days prior to the service.

*Asterisks indicate that a loved one has been permanently memorialized with a plaque in the Temple sanctuary. If you are interested in acquiring a plaque for your loved one, contact the Temple office. Current TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$300.

Non TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$600.

Editor's Corner



Greetings Fellow Congregants. This month finds me once again wondering what to write in my message to you. I feel a strong obligation as the editor of this Temple's newsletter not to write anything too opinionated for fear of it being interpreted as the opinion of the congregation as a whole. Still, in light of current events (I am writing this on June 26th, after reflecting for a couple of days), I believe that we are living under the effects of the ancient curse "May you live in interesting times." As an aside, I have always believed this to have been a Jewish curse but its origins are mostly attributed to the Chinese. However, this was not the original Chinese phrase. The nearest related Chinese expression translates as "Better to be a dog in times of tranquility than a human in times of chaos." A further discussion of the etymology of this curse can be found on Wikipedia. Suffice it to say that I have often envied the life of my dogs.

This country was founded at least in part on the idea of religious freedom. This is an idea which has great merit. In truth, the founding Fathers at the broadest possible intent, meant this to be the freedom to observe the monotheistic religion of one's choice. I believe that the definition should be expanded to mean freedom to follow any religion at all or none so long as the expression of such religion does not contradict the golden rule which I believe is best stated by Hillel "That which is hateful to you, do not do to your fellow."

However, in saying this, there is great value in living one's life with basic Jewish ideals. Namely, that we were created in God's image and that we were given dominion over the world, given free will and entrusted with the work of Tikkun Olam, rebuilding the world. Everything else truly is commentary and we as a race and more specifically as a country have lost sight of this. My life is no more or less important than yours or anyone else's on the planet. Moreover, we are our brothers' (and sisters') keeper entrusted with the responsibility of fighting for the rights of all and for life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. That last one is a doozy. Will we always achieve happiness? No, and it is unreasonable to expect it. But if we work to help ensure that as many people around us as possible achieve happiness, we may find that our own moments of unhappiness are lessened and that they are less significant.

While we should all strive to live our lives in the manner that we think would be most pleasing to our God or Creator, it is obligatory that in doing so, we must not prevent others from living according to their own ideals of good and righteousness. And that means that occasionally we will disagree. That's ok. We have been doing so since that beginning of time, especially as Jews. We argue with ourselves and even with God in the pursuit of good. And in my personal opinion, that means that love always wins, no matter a person's creed, gender, sexuality or skin color. It also means that while the choice to bring new life into the world is a sacred act, we must value the lives of the living over any unborn, either potential or in the womb.

Tikkun Olam Opportunities: *Giving to and volunteering at Casa de Peregrinos & El Caldito*

Casa de Peregrinos provides staple foods to the needy, and El Caldito provides a meal 365 days a year to the hungry in our community. Both organizations are part of the Community of Hope located on the same campus at 999 W. Amador. There are common interests and goals and the food received is often shared between the two organizations in order to best utilize both perishable and non-perishable foods. There is also a need for wide-mouth glass bottles and containers, tents, sleeping bags, and new or gently used clothing.

On Mondays, currently and as for the last 20 years, you will find TBE member Corry McKissack cooking and serving food at the El Caldito Soup Kitchen. She used to be one of several TBE members who made Monday their mitzvah day at El Caldito, and Corry would like to see our Temple revive our participation. You can come any day of the week that is convenient for you, with Monday hours from 7am-1pm, but other days start later.

The Soup Kitchen has served millions of meals over its 30 year history where it began at St. Andrews Church and then moved to its current location at 999 W. Amador, Tel: 575 525-3831. For many, the meal they receive at El Caldito is the only meal they will have in a day.

It's pretty simple to volunteer. Come through the volunteer door at the back of the building and a crew chief will tell you where you are needed and what to do. Corry will be happy to answer any questions you have about volunteering there because as she says, "It is enormously rewarding serving your fellow man and it's a great mitzvah."

People's stories have always fascinated me, including my own family stories.

As a young girl I read books by strong and courageous women: Margaret Mead, Pearl Buck, Helen Keller, and Anne Frank. I wanted to know what they were like, how they got to be who they were, and who helped them along the way.

I consider myself to be a Story Catcher. A Story Catcher is a person who values people's stories. Who is intrigued by the variations and similarities of the human experience. Who practices the art of listening.

I hold the stories in my heart that my friends, clients, and family members have told me. Their stories are of heartache, joys, losses, successes, excesses, and failures. I find aspects of myself in their stories.

I safeguard and protect those stories in a confidential silence that will bind us together like the braids of a rope.

Most of us understand that a story is not the gospel truth. Story is life seen through the eyes of the story teller and is slightly distorted by personal experience, perception, memory and imagination. Nevertheless, stories can make us powerful or hold us prisoner.

In recounting our stories the fish we catch are bigger, our bravery more exaggerated, and the

ogre we slay is just a little taller.

Being a Story Catcher inspires me. I get goosebumps when I realize "Once upon a time" also happens now. Ancient stories of myth, fairy tales, legends and the Bible are woven into our own stories. There's a bit of Wonder Woman, Rocky Balboa, Queen Esther, Jacob, Katniss Everdeen, ET, and Erin Brockovich in all of us.

I will always be a Story Catcher. It is my passion, purpose and place in this world. Stories are passed on from generation to generation, for I do, and make us feel a sense of belonging to something bigger than ourselves. The mystery and magic of stories still call me.

Reflection: What character in a movie, literature, or TV show do you identify with? Why?

Today's Practice: I will be a Story Catcher today and listen deeply to someone's story.

Board of Trustees: June 6, 2022

An invocation was given by Martha Roditti.

A motion was filed to accept the findings of the Rabbi Search Committee and to share the report with the congregation. The report was accepted unanimously and the task of approving Rabbi Evette Lutman will go to the congregation at the Membership meeting on June 16th.

June 16, 2022 General Membership

Rabbi Evette Lutman was approved as the incoming Rabbi of Temple Beth-El by an overwhelming majority of the congregation. Sixty families participated in the Zoom meeting and seven ballots were received absentee.

Board of Trustees: June 21, 2022

An invocation was given by Martha Roditti.

The new Board Members were introduced and other members gave brief introductions as well, sharing their experiences as board members of TBE.

The minutes from May and June meetings were approved.

The Financial Report from 2021-2022 was discussed, along with ways to simplify the report. The proposed Budget for 2022-2023 was discussed and will be voted on at the July meeting

Rabbi Evette Lutman is expected to join our community, with her family, in mid-July. President Nan Rubin will select three people to negotiate Rabbi Lutman's contract. Several other members will work as advisors to this committee. Diane Fleishman suggested that we form a welcoming committee to help Rabbi Evette familiarize herself with Las Cruces and the community.

Lynn Zeemont reported that the Sisterhood dinner at the Amador went well and was well attended. The Mensch Club will be sending an application to the city, to reserve a space at the Renaissance Faire this fall.

New Rabbi Report

We did it! With more than 60 families participating, we chose Rabbi Evette Lutman as the new Rabbi for Temple Beth-El with an overwhelming vote of support! This is a very exciting moment for the synagogue!

For a while, I was not certain we would be successful. The lack of rabbi candidates for our pulpit was frankly discouraging, and CCAR the placement service for Reform Rabbis did not provide much guidance or encouragement. So I felt that we might be facing another full year without a rabbi. Even with our student rabbi, the Religious Practices Committee was stretched thin maintaining our holidays and services. It was a scary thought.

Looking outside the denominational institutions clearly paid off for us. We received resumes from several viable candidates, and Rabbi Evette stood out as someone with the qualities and experience we hoped to find.

It was clear how much she impressed you when she was here. I received many positive comments about her visit, and even more were included in the survey distributed by the Search Committee. Even so, it was a surprise that she actually received 90% favorable vote to hire her as our Rabbi, an overwhelming vote of confidence.

As I'm writing this, we have the outline for the Rabbi's budget, and a committee in place to begin contract negotiations. If all goes well, our negotiations should move fairly quickly, and Rabbi Evette will be with us by mid-July.

For her part, she is ready to jump right in. When I called her after the membership meeting to give her the news, she and her wife were both extremely excited about moving here. Thanks to the generosity of our bookkeeper Stacey Hyman, they will have a short-term rental house available as soon as they arrive. And even without the contract in place, Rabbi Evette reached out to ask about getting started with lessons for the Bar and Bat Mitzvah students for this coming year.

Now we have the enjoyable task of introducing Rabbi Evette to Las Cruces and welcoming her into the Temple Beth-El community. Please let me know if you would like to help provide hospitality, show her around, and introduce her to the various resources and entertainment of our fair city. At the same time, we want her to meet

the many political leaders, service providers, cultural workers, university personnel and clergy who comprise the rich social environment of Las Cruces.

Foremost she will be meeting with our temple committees -Religious Practices, Religious School, and the Board. Plus Membership, Ways and Means, Sisterhood and Mensch Club. We are eager to support her and use the great opportunity we have to bring new leadership, experience, and energy to the congregation.

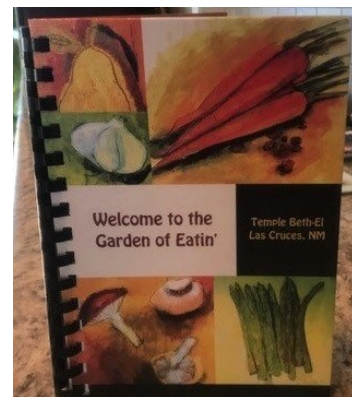
