

- The Hebrew dates for each week's Yahrzeits are listed in each Adelante.
- Names are read on the Shabbat <u>following</u> the Yahrzeit, or on the day, if it falls on that Shabbat.
- Hebrew vs. conventional (Gregorian) calendar: The temple's tradition is to base the Yahrzeits list on the Hebrew calendar. Those who wish to have a name read on a Friday night close to the conventional (Gregorian) calendar date are asked to please email or call the Temple office a few days prior to the service.

*Asterisks indicate that a loved one has been permanently memorialized with a plaque in the Temple sanctuary. If you are interested in acquiring a plaque for your loved one, contact the Temple office. Current TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$300. Non TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$600.

Musings On The TBE Kitchen from Karen Shevet Dinah

The beit t'filah, the beit k'nesset, the beit midrash. In North American Jewish vernacular, the synagogue or temple, and specifically, in Las Cruces, Temple Beth-El. These are the some of the many names we Jews use to refer to and describe the hub that is our community. Whether it's our beit t'filah for shabbat services, our beit midrash on shabbat morning for Talmud study, or schmoozing in our beit knesset, i.e., social hall at the Mensch Club's Wednesday Breakfast, each is a significant support structure sustaining our sacred communal home.

As a relatively new TBE member, I have observed how valued our home is by each person with whom I am becoming acquainted. No matter when I am at the Temple, it buzzes with learning activity, the energy generated by Shabbat morning services, or socializing in the office and library. Indeed, each issue of this monthly newsletter bursts with a full calendar of events as the temple serves as beit t'filah, beit midrash, and beit k'nesset to us all.

One of my teachers, R. Rebecca Ben-Gideon, once reminded me that the work of volunteers in the synagogue's kitchen is as sacred as that of the prayer leader in the sanctuary, or congregants studying in the library. It is the participation in all three support pillars that makes for a sturdy whole.

An important room in our beit k'nesset is the Temple's kitchen and it is becoming central to more activities as we are able to leave most Covid restrictions behind. Similarly, more sub-groups of our larger temple community are utilizing the social hall and kitchen. Sharing comes with responsibility. Taking on responsibility whether in the beit t'filah, the beit midrash, or the beit k'nesset keeps TBE strong and healthy.

Next time you are in the kitchen, take a look at some newly re-done and brightly colored notices of guidelines for the space. To sum them up: Leave the kitchen and social hall cleaner and neater than it was when the event you are attending/coordinating started. Oh, and by the way, Debbie Levy would be happy to help you keep our beit k'nesset strong and vibrant by signing you up to sponsor an oneg after kabbalat shabbat and ma'ariv services! Shalom Chaverim!

As each month rolls around, I always seek to write something insightful, important of at least amusing. Sometimes I succeed, sometimes I don't and sometimes the universe is just too chaotic. So, today's article will be a mix of musings. The first thing that I would like to talk to you all about is the Temple library. This room has served mostly as a meeting space lately and while it is a great one, it has many resources that go largely under-utilized. To this effect, Morgan and I have spent a few days helping out Linda Kruger in the monumental task of helping to organize all the books. One of the tasks we have been undertaking is to edit down the number of books on the Holocaust. We have been able to reduce the numbers here because of a little known fact. Because an upper level class had been taught at the university, there are a great number of books on the subject. Any resident of Las Cruces can access the collection at the University by applying for a NMSU library card. So, if the NMSU library has it in its collection, we are removing it from ours, and donating it to Coas, thereby building a sizeable credit for future purchases. (Speaking of Coas, they have a sizable Judaica selection, not just from our holdings, but through other donations.) Another task will be to relocate the Children's books to religious school wing in the room that had previously housed the Training Wheels program. This way, they will be easily accessible for borrowing to religious school teachers and students as well as parents and anyone else who has children in their lives who enjoy books. We will keep you updated with this process. Meanwhile, feel free to come by the library any time there is staff in the front office to check books out of the library or to do research. In addition to research books we have novels, cookbooks and more!

Another underutilized space in our Temple is the Quiet Room. This is a small room in the hallway just off the sanctuary. It contains children's books, toys, comfy seating (including a rocking chair) and a large window into the sanctuary, It is a perfect place to go with your small children when they need a break from Temple events. Older children may use it by themselves but we do ask that you stop by before taking them home to ensure that it has been left in good condition. It is my plan to organize it a bit more and to relocate some toys and books into the space.

Finally, Pesach. I mostly want to brag here that I have finally this year remembered to buy my supplies from the grocery stores before they ran out. Now, I just need to plan some interesting menu items and hope that eggs continue to be available. Also, I am so glad that we are once again having our second night seder in our Temple. It seems so much more haimish that way. Thank you to Lynn Zeemont, Stepanie Singer, and other Sisterhood members for making this happen. I look forward to it.

Strangers In A Strange Land

At the beginning of April, Jews all over the world will celebrate Passover, our holiday of liberation from

slavery. A joyous occasion celebrated with food and wine, Passover is the most observed Jewish holiday among Jews, regardless of any synagogue affiliation or institutional ties. In many homes, particularly reflecting diverse families, non-Jewish family and friends are invited to participate in the Seder and share the Pesach meal. Wilma Chen, my best friend since I was 10 years old, was at our family Seder every year, and I have participated in many Seders where more than half the people attending were not Jewish.

There are many ways to tell this story, and I have always thought of Passover as the "all-purpose" holiday-almost any political issue fits in. Go to any Jewish bookstore, and the tables will be piled high with haggadot on every current issue, from LGBTQ+ rights and Black Lives Matter, to homelessness and climate change. There are some with beautiful illustrations, and there is also a tradition for people to write their own. One year, a group of us wrote a 5-minute Seder for the Committee in Solidarity with the People of El Salvador. This was easy because like Egypt, El Salvador is also "mitzryim", a narrow place, where people were seeking peace.

Despite this array of themes, there are two overriding messages for us at the Seder. First, because we were "strangers in a strange land", we are commanded to open our doors and welcome the stranger. Second, we are ordered to understand the Exodus not just as ancient history, but as if we ourselves were personally liberated. The fear, trauma, uncertainty, and elation are ours to carry forward to the next generation.

Most of us are safely removed from the wrenching refugee experience, but I have been

thinking about the hundreds of thousands of refugees and migrants around the world who have been struggling for their own liberation today. Displaced by wars, violence, and grim economic reality, refugees occupy huge camps in places like Poland, Syria, Lebanon, and North Africa. And here in the Borderland, tens of thousands of migrants from Guatemala, Ecuador, Colombia, Venezuela, Honduras, Haiti and elsewhere are streaming to our borders and camped out in Juarez in makeshift shelters or on the streets.

Based on Jewish values, the Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society was founded in 1902 in New York City to support Jewish immigrants fleeing the progroms and forced expulsions of Eastern Europe. But as Jewish immigration tapered off, today HIAS has repositioned itself as a global relief organization serving primarily non-Jews in conflict areas on five continents- because of these same Jewish values.

HIAS is one Jewish organization meeting this mission of serving the stranger, but there are others that also provide services to refugees and immigrant groups in our region as well as nationally and internationally. Members of Temple Beth-El responded quickly and generously when asked to support Afghan families being relocated to our area. But in the spirit of Passover, perhaps we can do more to support refugees in an ongoing way. It is something to consider, and the opportunities are there.

Temple Beth-El Board of Trustees Meeting Summary-March 16, 2023

• The Board unanimously approved a motion to welcome a new member, Beth Waters. Plans are also in the works for our New Member Shabbat, date to be determined.

• Treasurer Joel Siegel reported that temple expenses are a bit over budget. We did bring in quite a bit of money from the Auction and funds are still being received. Joel is also working with the Board to make better use of our Microsoft 365 account.

• President Nan Rubin reported that our Annual Meeting is being planned by the committee. Members will be receiving reminder post cards in the mail. The meeting will take place on May 11th, at 7 PM. The work session at Temple Montefiore is coming up. It was suggested that TBE also make a monetary donation to the Las Vegas NM temple.

• Rabbi Evette requested that our temple library be reorganized as we need more space to ensure that members can easily access material. The Otero County Prison approached the Rabbi, looking for volunteers to teach and supply materials to Jewish inmates. The Rabbi thought this would be a worthwhile mitzvah and is willing to assist, along with several board members. The Board approved a motion to participate in this program.

• Board member Elliot Katz requested that a part time Administrative Assistant be hired, to assist the Rabbi and to cover the office. Cheryl Decker is also looking for volunteers.

• Sisterhood's Dee Cook reported that the Auction was well attended and money is still being collected.

• Lynn Zeemont said that the Passover Second Seder responses are coming in, with many new members attending.

• Jeff Lewis reported that the Mensch Club's breakfasts have been well attended. A new Wednesday Breakfast, with a speaker, has been planned. The Mensch Club Appreciation Dinner at Red Hawk was very successful with over 50 members attending. The Board recognized Elliot Katz and Art Lorbeer for planning this event. Not only was the food and music great, they also assigned seats for the dinner so that congregants could meet new people. Well done!

• The Nominating Committee for the Board reported that there will be one position open on the Board and several people are being considered at this time. We also welcome Elliot Katz as a new Board Member.

THIS TOO SHALL PASS

I would imagine most of us have heard the adage "This too shall pass." Because the phrase is so familiar, so mundane and ordinary, we tend to overlook the power of its eternal truth. The phrase reminds us of the impermanence of all things and the idea that nothing lasts forever, neither the good nor the bad things.

We know intellectually that things pass and that change is an ongoing process. When life sucks, we say, "This too shall pass" and hopefully it does - but here's the hitch: when life is good, it, too, inevitably will pass.

No problem lasts forever. Difficult situations often bring out qualities that otherwise might not have risen to the surface, such as courage, faith, and our need for one another. All of our experiences can help us grow.

Before things do pass, however, here are some ways of managing those inevitable and difficult times:

1. Relationship with Oneself - This is the pillar that influences every other relationship in our life and is central to our wellbeing. A good guide is to be as kind and respectful to ourselves as we would be to a good friend.

2. Relationship with Others - Having strong relationships with others is the central tenet to a good and happy life. Make sure we give and receive the love, help and support that makes life worth living.

3. Manage Emotions - We cannot control what we feel, but we can keep ourselves from letting those feelings take control of our lives. Be aware that when you are in HALT, hungry angry, lonely and tired, you are vulnerable.

4. Time - Be mindful of focusing your attention on the present moment rather than turning toward the past with regrets and "coulda, shoulda, woulda's" and projecting into the future with the "what ifs."

5. Limits - know your limits and learn to say "NO" where necessary with conviction.

6. Structure - Keep structure to your life. Participate in things that have sustained you in the past and new things that will sustain you in the present.

"This too shall pass" is a simple and powerful phrase that gives us hope and can soothe us when we are in the middle of a painful situation by remembering we have survived difficult situations before and we will adapt and survive now. Cherish the good times. Replay those joyful moments in your mind and enjoy them.

Reflection: I may not be able to control life circumstances, but I can learn to manage myself during these times.


