- Hebrew vs. conventional (Gregorian) calendar: The temple's tradition is to base the Yahrzeits list on the Hebrew calendar. Those who wish to have a name read on a Friday night close to the conventional (Gregorian) calendar date are asked to please email or call the Temple office a few days prior to the service.

*Asterisks indicate that a loved one has been permanently memorialized with a plaque in the Temple sanctuary. If you are interested in acquiring a plaque for your loved one, contact the Temple office. Current TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$300. Non TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$600.

Musings from Higher Elevations by Karen Shevet Dinah



Tikkun Olam, or repairing the world, as it is often translated, is a concept which is highly valued by a broad spectrum of Jews. Most congregations translate tikkun olam through the work of its social action committee or an equivalent. B'nei Mitzvah young people often have a tikkun olam project as part of their learning. Given its importance in Jewish identity, one might ask, "What's the origin of this important concept?"

One possible place of origin is in the obscure mystical texts of kabbalah where tikkun olam is married with the concept known as tzimtzum, the contraction of the G-dself in order that creation of the world, including human beings, could emerge. This process of contraction and the entrance of divine light into the world shattered the vessels which were the "tohu va-vohu", the chaos and void named in Genesis 1:2. Together, the shattered vessels and the dispersed divine sparks scattered throughout all of creation and resulted in the brokenness of our world, a brokenness we are commanded to rectify, make right, repair. As Reb Nachman of Breslov, taught: "Now, each person must say: 'The entire world was created only for my sake' (Sanhedrin 37a). Consequently, because the world was created for my sake, I must constantly look into and consider ways of making the world better; to provide what is missing in the world and pray on its behalf."

And tikkun or making things right, literally repairing some walls of Temple Montefiore in Las Vegas, NM is what members of TBE-LC did one weekend in early April. Art Lorbeer crafted doors for the aron hakodesh (ark) including a beautiful, yet functional locking system which ensures the security of the congregation's torah scroll. Wendee and Art provided another essential--again, beautiful, the ner tamid (eternal flame). Henri Brown, an experienced painter, climbed up the outside of the building to paint over identifying lettering specific to when the Catholic church owned the building. One group of TBE members filled cracks in the plaster, painted interior walls, cleaned in the temple building while others worked on replacing exterior steps leading into the house next door, also part of the property. Still others photographically documented the property's condition and many assisted where an extra hand was needed.

Rabbi Evette led a lovely erev shabbat service and an informative, meaningful study session shabbat morning.

Jamar Cotton

The Adult Education/Social Action committee is pleased to sponsor a family congregational and community talk by Sgt. Jamar Cotton. He was the recent keynote speaker at the MLK, Jr. breakfast attended by several members of our congregation as well as the Rabbi, who had a chance to meet him. We all were most impressed with his thoughtfulness, commitment, energy, and passion. Jamar grew up in poverty, raised by a single mother in Irvington, New Jersey. Living in the inner city, he lived with the dangers of gangs and drugs every day. Several times during his early life, the family found themselves homeless. In 2005, Jamar enrolled at New Mexico State University and moved here, to Las Cruces. From 2006 to 2010, he was an outside linebacker and defensive end for the Aggie football team.

While pursuing his education, he became immersed in the community as a mentor with Big Brothers Big Sisters. He continues to serve as an ambassador to NMSU Black Programs and has contributed thousands of hours of community service, helping wherever he could, including the Gospel Rescue Mission and Mesilla Valley Community of Hope. He is also the Youth President of the NM MLK, Jr. State Commission Ambassador Program. For his day job, Jamar is a sergeant with the Doña Ana County Sheriff's Department.

The informal program is scheduled for Thursday evening, June 1, from 7 - 9 pm. This will be an opportunity to experience Jamar's enthusiasm and appreciate Sgt. Cotton's perspective on life.

Members will be welcome to bring their pets to this service and the Rabbi will give offer a blessing. This will take place in an area outside of the temple. Date will be announced at a later time.


*It was unanimously approved to hire a part time Administrative Assistant for the temple. We will post a job description on the job site, Indeed. An interview process will take place and we plan to have a qualified candidate in place by June of this year.

*President Nan Rubin reported on the upcoming Annual Meeting. This will take place on Thursday, May 11 th at 7PM. Packets with the agenda and voting ballots will be emailed to each member. All active temple members will be given the opportunity to vote on the Board of Directors slate for the upcoming year. For those unable to attend the meeting in person, there will be a Zoom link for this meeting, with an opportunity to vote for the Board on the Zoom site.

*Rabbi Evette expressed her satisfaction with the social justice work being done in our TBE Community. The Mensch Club's "Bagel Breakfast" was successful and the club will continue with this event in the fall. The Rabbi also reported that Confirmation is approaching and there is one additional bat mitzvah scheduled this year. The Rabbi and the Board would like to find ways to "recruit" more families with children into the TBE community. Finally, the Rabbi spoke about an event to take place in El Paso on April 30, "A Celebration for Israel". We hope to have several Board Members (and congregants) in attendance. The Rabbi thanked everyone in the community for the support she received following the loss of her mother.

*Norm Mazer addressed the Board about security concerns. In light of recent Anti-Semitic events in our country (and world), Norm suggested that we hire an armed Security Guard to attend all major TBE events. The Board discussed this, along with alternative measures to improve safety. All members should have received an on-line survey in regard to security. The TBE Safety Committee will meet to consider the responses and will present us with an action plan that addresses our needs. We will have an active shooter training for all congregants and Religious School students in the very near future.

I was fortunate to spend Sunday afternoon with Honey Girl, a Holocaust survivor and students in the Confirmation Class that I had been teaching. Rabbi Evette and Heather have taken over for me and started the unit on the Holocaust. This was my first time back and I was so happy to see "my kids".

After the moving presentation we went to eat so the students could process and share their impressions of what they heard. I was impressed with their thoughts and feelings. Many parents were there also so they will have time to talk to family as well.

The thing that was the most relevant to me is that she has a good mindset. She is a strong person to say all the things she said. I think that the "big take away" is that when things get bad you can get out and be happy. You can't dwell on all of the bad things in life.

I loved her quote about how she was done crying and just wanted to laugh. The fact that she was still able to smile shows how brave she is. While most wouldn't, Esther decided that she would forgive the Nazis. It takes a lot to take all that they did and still find it in her heart to forgive them. I am glad that I was at least able to see her and hear her talk, especially with the number of Holocaust decreasing. I really hope people took what she said to heart and that they are reminded of the events of the Holocaust so that history does not repeat itself. It's sad that more and more people are believing it is fake. I believe that everyone should at least meet a survivor once in their life before it's too late.



Frances F. Williams represents the best that her community, state and the nation has to offer. She has dedicated her life to serving those who need a helping hand and crashing employment barriers. In 1974 she was appointed by the Governor of New Mexico to the New Mexico State Commission for the Status of Women. In 1976 she was appointed to a task force for affirmative action for the State. For 12 years she served as a chairperson for the Las Cruces Review Board for Grievance and Discrimination. She has served as a United Nations delegate for the International Women's Year Conference; has been selected as an Outstanding Woman of the Year for New Mexico; helped build the Vietnam Memorial at Veterans Park, procuring the Huey Helicopter for the memorial; has advocated and worked tirelessly for equal opportunity in employment, establishing and implementing programs leading to an increase of women and minorities in positions never held before; served as a consultant and advisor to businesses and government on management and employment issues; served as a housing commissioner for the city and state; a whistleblower who uncovered the corruption in these organizations, resulting in an overhaul of housing authorities in New Mexico; founding member of Temple Beth El; president of the White Sands Missile Range Museum Historical Foundation raising \$1 million for its expansion; worked to stop a private company wanting to build an electric line across New Mexico which could take private ranchers' property by eminent domain, and impaired the mission of White Sands Missile Range. She worked for 35 years here at White Sands Missile Range, from 1952-1987. The last 17 years of which she served as the director of equal opportunity. In 1995 Mrs. Williams was inducted into the White Sands Missile Range Hall of Fame.




