Musings for Rosh HaShanah 5784--The Priestly Blessing and Mr. Spock

The Eternal One spoke to Moses: Speak to Aaron and his sons:

Thus shall you bless the people of Israel. Say to them: The Eternal bless you and protect you!

The Eternal deal kindly and graciously with you!

The Eternal bestow divine favor upon you and grant you peace!

Thus they shall link My name with the people of Israel, and I will bless them.

(Numbers 6:22-27 as rendered by Ira S. Youdovin, ReformJudaism.org)

In Classical Reform Judaism, congregational rabbis often finished the Shabbat morning service with the Birkat Kohanim, i.e. the priestly blessing. It continues to be included in the weekday and Shabbat Amidah in the more traditional congregations, chanted by the service leader no differently than any other part of the liturgy, quite differently than the high drama of the High Holy Days and Festival Musaf in the Orthodox world. Known as duchenen, the Birkat Kohanim is performed in a highly ritualized manner as an re-enactment of Aaron and his sons blessing the Israelites. I have experienced this ritual, in Yiddish known as duchenen, in Conservative settings. It is a dramatic section of the Musaf Amidah when members who are descendants of a Kohen ascend the bimah and re-enact the ancient benediction. Based on archaeological finds, it is believed to be one of the oldest biblical texts.

The specific way the Kohanim must hold up their hands while chanting the Birkat Kohanim was borrowed by Leonard Nimoy for the Vulcan salute when he was cast as Spock in the Star Trek series. Nimoy detailed the origin of the Vulcan greeting in an 2013 interview he gave to the Yiddish Book Center. During the interview he reminisces about his bar mitzvah and attending High Holy Days services. Here's Nimoy's boyhood memory of the experience from beneath his father's tallit, in a tiny shul in Boston:

Five or six guys get up on the bimah and they're facing the congregation . . .their tallits over their heads and they start this chanting . . . and my father said to me, 'Don't look!' So everyone has their hands over their faces or . . . they turned away . . .

and I hear this strange sound coming from them . . . dissonant, discordant kind of wailing, all discordant and not together. And then the leader would shout out,

'yvarechaha' and the rest of them would respond, 'yvarechaha adonai v'yishm'reha'.

It was chilling . . . I thought, 'something major is happening here'. So I peeked and I saw them with their hands out . . . towards the congregation. Wow!

Something really got hold of me. I had no idea what was going on, but the sound of it and the look of it was magical. (Showing his hand)

This is the shape of a shin, a letter from the Hebrew alphabet . . . very interesting letter . . .

it's the first letter of the word Shaddai, first letter in the word shalom, first letter in the word Shechina which is the name of the feminine aspect of God, who was supposedly created to live amongst humans . . . why you're not suppose to look . . . the legend is that during that benediction . . . the Shechina comes into the sanctuary to bless the congregation and you don't want to see that because it's so powerful you could be seriously injured . . . or it could be fatal. That's why you protect yourself by hiding your eyes . . . I never dreamed I would do that one day, but sure enough . . . we were making this Star Trek series . . .

Nimoy then continues to describe the plot and why he suggested the hand salute he'd first seen during the duchenen ritual many years prior.

So what's the take-away from juxtaposing a Jewish ritual which probably pre-dates Biblical Judaism with a simple greeting exchanged between futuristic creatures from a television series? Perhaps that one can find blessing or comfort or joy or love or forgiveness in the oddest, most unexpected places or with the most unlikely of people. The High Holy Days liturgy is full of imagery of sternness and reminders of how we humans so often miss the mark. And yet the rabbis chose to include a beautifully reassuring ritual, a reminder that we are the recipients of divine blessings, no matter what.

Y'varechecha Adonai viyishmerecha Ya'erAdonai panav eilecha vichuneka Yisa Adonai panav eilecha v'yasem lecha shalom

I always liked that expression describing the period between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. To me it gives a real spiritual framework for entering the new year season and elevates the importance of these

holidays above the other celebrations we observe during the year.

Helped in part by the addition of Rabbi Evette, Temple Beth-El has had a dynamic year. We have had new adult study classes, large participation at many events, several successful fundraisers, an active religious school with three students being confirmed, plus a steady influx of one or two new member family units each month.

The Rabbi has been actively involved with a number of community issues, and she is bringing more visibility to the synagogue and growing recognition of the Jewish presence in Las Cruces.

All this activity has reinforced the clear need for the synagogue to have much stronger administrative systems to manage our routine office tasks as well as support our outreach and programming efforts. By the time you read this, our new Administrative Assistant, Beryl Sierra, should be on the job helping us improve our operations by helping to keep us organized.

Another very fortunate recent development to help support our operations is the announcement of the High Holidays Challenge grant. Members Elizabeth Lewis and Joel Siegel have generously made a challenge of \$20,000, and they will match it dollar for dollar for every contribution made by the end of the calendar year.

We are looking at a budget shortfall this fiscal year, and meeting this challenge will improve our fiscal bottom line tremendously. We are very grateful to them for providing this opportunity, and encourage everyone to donate what you can so we can make this match!

Don't forget, we are also participating in the annual Tents to Rents fundraising effort by the Community of Hope to support housing needs in our community.

Even so, the Ways and Means committee is looking to develop some new and creative ideas to bring in additional income. Your thoughts and involvement in this committee would be most welcome.

You might be interested in something else- working with the Social Action committee on political issues, or helping to bring a new program to the synagogue through the Adult Ed committee. Maybe you're more interested in working with Religious Practices on planning holiday services or Torah lessons. Or even volunteering with the religious school. Both the Sisterhood and the Mensch Club are always looking for new members.

We have a lot to look forward to this coming year, and we know the Temple will be busy. Supporting the synagogue with a financial donation will mean a lot. But contributing your time would be just as valuable. Thank you!

The Fountain Theater is screening "Cuba's Forgotten Jewels", a documentary on Jews who fled Nazi Germany. The story contains personal accounts of refugees who recall their escape to Havana and the challenges they faced in an exotic and unfamiliar land.

Marion Finkels was fourteen when she and her family fled Nazi-occupied Europe and sailed across the Atlantic Ocean, finding safe haven in Cuba. Refugees who made it to Havana, including young Marion, found work to support themselves and their family members in a newly transported trade: diamond polishing. Firsthand survivor accounts take us back to 1940's Havana - an era at once tumultuous, heartbreaking, and intoxicating - to reveal an immigration success story.

- Rabbi Evette reported that there has been a call out to our members for a congregational choir. This is a particularly opportune time to get involved and share your love of singing with the approach of the High Holidays. New choir member Jeanne Brown will be involved in leading members in song. The Rabbi also reported that we will be participating in Shofars Across Borders again this year.
- The Religious school Open House went well with some new families joining us.
- Three new member families were approved for membership and will be officially welcomed into our temple family.
- The draft of the letter that will be sent to the congregation this coming week regarding the new Challenge Grant opportunity was discussed with suggested revisions.
- There is still an empty board position. Suggested individuals will be contacted to gauge their interest.
- An Ad Hoc committee is forming with two board members with possible participation from the Religious Practices Commitee to explore creative solutions to enhance participation in Shabbat Services.
- There will be a scheduled Active Shooter Drill before the High Holidays.

COMMUNITY CORNER- HOPE

Hope, in Hebrew is tikvah. It is part of our narrative as human beings. What is it, how do we find it, and how do we use it?

Strangely enough, hope often comes into play only when our circumstances are difficult or at least uncertain. Hope is not just a feeling of longing for something. It involves taking action to change things. Hope can be activated and cultivated.

Hope is what happens when we assess what we can do with a situation. Hope doesn't deny that a situation is happening, it asks the question: "Is there something I can do to make a change?" Hope is assessing the future and influencing it.

Hopefulness has several features that can be developed. No matter what has happened, we can resolve at any time to make tomorrow better.

Dan Tomasulo, Ph.D. in his book <u>Learned Hopefulness:</u> <u>The Power of Positivity to Overcome Depression</u> says hopefulness is a decision. According to Dr. Tomasulo, there are seven decisions that promote hopefulness. They give us direction and agency, something we can do that acts to produce a particular result.

These decisions are:

1. Seeing possibilities - Having a growth mindset leads to possibilities. Be open, curious, and willing to see other perspectives than your own.

2. Noticing beauty, benefits, and blessings - Look for the good, the positive, and see challenges as opportunities. Sometimes negative events in our lives have been the catalyst for something better to happen.

3. Cultivating positive feelings - The core difference between optimists and pessimists is how they think good and bad events will impact their future. People with high hope have been shown to have better psychological adjustment, physical health and wellness, coping skills for illness and loss, interpersonal relationships.

4. Focusing on Strengths - Your strengths are your superpower. Identify your strengths and put them into action.

5. Creating Challenging Goals - Start with small goals. Setting goals keeps us on track and moves us forward.

6. Finding Purpose - What are the three most important things to you?

Find a way to bring them into the world to be of service. 7. Cherishing Relationships - Invest in your relationships -Expand your connection to others and strangers. A "good morning," or complimenting someone on what they are wearing can open up connection and conversation.

Hope is happening.

WILDFIRES IN HAWAII

Temple Beth-El's Social Action Committee will be donating 20 x chai, or \$360 to the Jewish Federations of North America's (JFNA) newly launched Hawaii Wildfire Fund.

The tragic fire in Maui has touched many of us, including our Social Action Committee and Board of Trustees. In fact, one of our congregants is currently in Hawaii. She is on the big island visiting her family and is in no danger. She has sent us information about the devastating impact of the fire and a special request for a monetary donation from the Social Action Committee.

In addition to the request from our congregant in Hawaii, there have been several requests from other members of TBE to make a monetary donation to one of the relief agencies for those affected by the fires in Maui. The Social Action Committee has a fund set aside to donate money directly to causes and agencies falling within the guidelines of tikkun olam. This request clearly does that. The donation to the JFNA Hawaii Wildfire Fund will be used to provide evacuees toiletries, first-aid kits, non-perishable foods, baby supplies and other supplies. Incidentally, while doing our review of this issue we also learned that there are between 2,000 - 3,000 Jews that live on Maui. 


