If you are interested in acquiring a plaque for your loved one, contact the Temple office. Current TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$300. Non TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$600.



Musings on Torah's First Creation Myth

Amidst the first days of the Hamas invasion of southern Israel, I am wondering if writing about

something other than the horror, sadness and grief is right. But honestly, I do not know how to write about, let alone comprehend, such a violation against Israelis and the Jewish people world-wide. So I distract myself with a long-time companion, the *parashat ha-shuva*, i.e. the weekly torah portion, specifically the first chapter of Genesis.

During those first days of invasion and attack, we were reading *parashat b'reisit*, our creation myth with all its beauty and contradictions. I have long contended that this section of *b'reshit*, the first version of creation, are foundational to Judaism; its theme being that of *badal*

(77) bet, dalet, lamed), to make separate, to divide, as in the ritual of *havdalah* at the end of *shabbat* and *yom tov*, marking the distinction between the holiness of *shabbat* or *yom tov* and ordinary times in our calendar.

The *shoresh* or three letter root of *havdalah* is repeated five times during the six days of creation, followed by "And God saw . . . that it was good". It is all good: light and dark, day and night, the heavens and the earth, the waters and the dry land, the beasts and the creeping crawling things! All differentiated in the creative process, yet all equally good. The story reads as if haShem were creating diversity and celebrating it in accordance with a modern-day bumper sticker.

On day six, when the humans are made the Creator sees all the work as one, without separation. None of the wording is extracted from the Hebrew root bet, dalet, lamed. "And God saw all that God had made and found it very good" The Creator sees all, as if harmoniously complete in preparation for the seventh day, *shabbat*. On the seventh day, "God finished the work . . . and ceased And blessed the seventh day and declared it holy . . . ;"kadesh (קדש kof, dalet, shin). The seventh day, then, is the culmination of the paradox between making distinctions, marking boundaries and not. All has been created and is a peacefully co-existing whole as haShem kicks back in haShem's recliner and looks it over. It has all come together to haShem's great satisfaction. And yet there is amajor demarcation made through the use of the Hebrew kadesh, meaning or at least implying apartness, distinctive. Unlike the first six days, the seventh day is separated out by being blessed and by being declared holy.

We know that coming together, allowing separations to fall away through kindness and compassion, is the essence of being a Jew. Maimonides taught that we are commanded to have mercy and compassion, to be charitable and kind as stated in Torah, "You shall love your fellow as yourself."; And the tradition has long encouraged appropriate intimate relations on *shabbat*.

So the first two chapters of *b'reishit* are possibly a lesson in boundaries and their fluidity. Separations, making distinctions are necessary and good, according to the text. And yet, the most significant of separation, i.e. *shabbat*, is the one time we are commanded to let boundaries fall away as part of partaking in the joy of shabbat, and it is the one day deemed *kadesh*, holy.

This first creation tale presents important questions regarding how we come together and how we make distinctions. How we set others apart. How we separate from others. And how we do not. It is a tale of paradox and enigma closing with a solution that is not easy to comprehend nor achieve. In completing whatever we do, whatever we say, however we act, we must ask, did my crossing a boundary contribute holiness to the world or did my creating a demarcation make for a more holy moment? For this situation to become sacred, should distinctions be more definite or less so? Is what I've done or said worthy of blessing? Does it have the innocence of those first days of creation when all the separations are declared good and then when they meld together as a whole they are declared holy?

The Sefat Emet's* commentary on *b'reishit* teaches that it is for this reason the humans were created immediately before *shabbat* -- so that they could easily witness the great care with which differentiations and wholeness were simultaneously accomplished as part of the seventh day. Food for thought when humankind is yet again torn apart, surrounded and confronted by extremely violent separations.

"Our Grief Is Not A Cry For War."

For weeks now, we have been watching the horrifying reports coming out of Israel, and along with Jews around the world, we have been stunned.

The unimaginable acts of terror, brutal massacres and violent hostage taking, have been excruciating to the

Israeli families and communities who have been experiencing it firsthand. We are hearing the sounds of their anguish and anger, and we, too, are heartbroken over the depths of their trauma and pain.

We grieve for the senseless loss of thousands of innocent lives on both sides of the border, and in this version of the conflict, we can only watch in horror at the displacements and devastation that is the start of a looming, protracted war.

This was the clear and heart-wrenching sentiment that I heard repeatedly at our Share-the-Grief Gathering, held at Temple Beth-El on the evening of October 12th.

More than 60 members of the Las Cruces community gathered at the synagogue to show support for Israel and share their feelings about the horrific events as they have been unfolding.

Many of the people who spoke were Israeli, or had lived in Israel. Members of other faiths were also present, most notably Pastor Chuck Wahlstrom and members of Sonoma Springs Covenant Church, the next door neighbor to Temple Beth-El.

Regardless of whether the speaker was Jewish or not, each spoke movingly of their strong ties to the country, and their deep sadness for and solidarity with the people of Israel.

At the same time, they all shared an urgent plea not for revenge or retribution, but for an immediate end to the violence, especially against innocent civilians.

They mentioned the long-standing efforts by many Israelis and Palestinians from both sides of the border who have worked together towards a peaceful solution to coexistence, and without exception, they displayed a

fervent desire to re-establish these personal and professional connections.

The conflict between Palestinians and Israelis has been in existence long before the state of Israel was established in 1948. For decades before and since, open battle has broken out periodically between the two groups over possession of the land.

In the 1967 War, Israel seized the Gaza strip from Egypt and the West Bank from Jordan, and the country has controlled these Palestinian- based territories continuously since then.

Despite many political obstacles from both sides, there have been many longstanding and genuine peace-

building relationships dedicated to equity and justice that have been nurtured over the years between private

citizens and nonprofit organizations across borders. Even recently, before the current conflict, pairs of Israeli and Palestinian parents were traveling together to speak about the grief they've each shared in losing their own children.

There have also been scores of voluntary Israeli-Palestinian working groups that have modeled how peaceful coexistence could work. These have looked at everything from summer camp programs and dual language classes in schools, to logistics for watersharing projects and joint economic development activities- each one planned to directly benefit both Israelis and Palestinians.

I heard our speakers also sharing the sense of mourning they feel for these lost opportunities and for their

counterparts on the other side of the border, friends, relatives, children and families who also are victims of

circumstance but have no other desire than to live in security and peace.

At the gathering, members of the community expressed their deepest fears, and in this dark and perilous moment, with so much anger and uncertainty, it has been difficult to not feel despair.

Yet I also heard the other message- not only to support the end of needless bloodshed and suffering, but to

not extinguish the hope for peace.

Today, it will certainly be much more difficult. But I believe we must double our efforts to support creating a viable and equitable environment that can provide safety and peace to both populations. To me, this is the only true solution to bring greater security to the Israeli people.

DECLUTTERING: RELEASING EXCESS BAGGAGE

Clutter is the excess stuff we tend to accumulate over the years in our homes, heads, hearts and our schedules.

The obvious clutter is **physical clutter** and being burdened by the sheer presence of too many things - too much furniture, too many dishes, too many plastic containers without lids. Then there is the not-so-obvious **mental** or **head clutter**. The brain is overloaded with the number of decisions we have to make in a day, the different roles we play, and the burden of responsibilities that come with all of those roles. **Emotional clutter** is about holding onto things that represent unresolved issues. Schedule clutter is when we find day after day we only get two or three of the things on our list or on our calendar done.

Here are some ideas when dealing with clutter:

Physical clutter can be too many dishes, magazines, clothes, or too many projects you meant to do but never started. It is also can be piles and piles of papers! You can start with the simplest. Throw away that extra sock with no mate, the half knitted sweater, or give to charity some of the piles of books you had every good intention of reading.

What **mental clutter** is draining your energy? What are you holding on to because you want to be right, or validated or because you are waiting for someone to say they're sorry? I have heard it said: "resentment is like taking poison and expecting 'them' to die!" Is there a resentment that you can let go of in order to free yourself from negativity, rumination and obsessional thoughts which serve no purpose other than to bring you down.

Confronting emotional clutter requires a lot of letting go. Letting go of old feelings of anger, fear, and the guilt in order to find peace of mind.

Schedule clutter. Time can be your friend or your enemy. Time can be your friend if you learn to do one thing at a time, fully and with presence. Use your time and energy well. Slowing down can bring integrity to each moment. It is like practicing Yoga. When the pace increases, chaos enters the scene. When you slow down practicing Yoga, playing tennis, or walking you will feel yourself being a little stronger, more graceful, bringing more definition to each moment. That is the best recipe I know for successfully confronting your schedule clutter.

Today's Practice: Remember decluttering is a process so do your best to be kind and encouraging to yourself every step of the way.

Temple Beth El Board of Directors Meeting October 19, 2023

* Rabbi Evette Lutman reported that the three adult education classes have been well received; Beginning Mussar, Intermediate Mussar, and Jewish Literacy. Hebrew School is also going well, and the Rabbi is working with Lilah Berkson to prepare for her upcoming Bat Mitzvah.

★ Rabbi Evette was asked to speak at an Interfaith Service for Peace, to be held at Young Park on October 24. Information was sent to the congregation about this service. She also reported that we have had ongoing support from the Las Cruces Community regarding the situation in Israel. TBE hosted over 100 guests on Thursday, October 12th, for our "Share the Grief" service. Members and nonmembers of TBE shared their words of love and support.

* Treasurer, Joel Siegel reported that we are doing well with income for the year. The High Holiday General Appeal has brought in much of this and we will continue to ask for donations in the next several weeks. We are very close to raising the amount needed to receive our match grant.

* Membership Report- Martha Roditti will be stepping down as chair of this committee. Diane Fleishman and Deb Leyndyke will take over the responsibilities. We are also recruiting new members- please contact Diane or Deb if interested in joining.

* Sheri Spiegal asked that the item of Temple Publicity be a regular item on the Board's agenda. At present, we are planning to update our website and place articles/ advertisements in local papers and on social media in order to gain new members and to keep the general community informed of events at TBE. President Nan Rubin suggested that we allocate a budget to implement these needs.

★ The Technology Committee has several choices in mind for upgrading software. Demos will be provided by the tech vendors and the committee will make their decision, depending on efficiency and cost.

★ The Security Committee is planning an Active Shooter Drill/meeting for our entire community. Congregants will also receive an email with TBE safety protocol. The Board unanimously approved a motion to hire a security company to be present at all Friday and Saturday services. Jeff Lewis said that the Mensch Club could provide extra security for the students during religious school. (EDIT: security provided for Friday night and Sunday during religious school. Greeters will serve as security Saturday morning)

We plan to have all of this in place within a few weeks.

* Sunday School reported that they are taking 15 minutes each session to discuss the events in Israel with the older students.


