If you are interested in acquiring a plaque for your loved one, contact the Temple office. Current TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$300. Non TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$600.



Musings on Speech and the Silent Ones

The development of speech is not only recognized as significant evolutionarily but is highly valued in many cultures. Speech runs deep

in our own Jewish tradition, going back to the creation narrative in which the world comes into being through divine utterance. Yet, the Torah has many characters who seldom speak, remain silent or are concerned about their verbal capability, e.g. Moses.

Serach, sister of the sons of Asher as identified in Gen. 46, is one of the silent ones. She appears twice in the *chumash*: in the list of the seventy progeny of Jacob who go down to Egypt (Gen. 46) and again, 250 years later, when a census of those about to enter the Land is taken (Num. 26).

Serach is a mysterious character who makes me wonder if she is muffled by Torah's generally male-focused point of view or does she exemplify another Jewish value, that of silence. "Rabbi Shimon ben Gamliel used to say, *All my days I grew up among the sages, and I have found nothing better for a person than silence.*" (Pirkei Avot 1:17)

I first encountered Serach in a midrash in which Joseph advises his brothers not to alarm their father with the news that he is alive and well for fear that the elderly Jacob might not survive the shock. The brothers summon Serach to sing the news to their father. "Serah played well and sang gently: Joseph my uncle did not die, he lives and rules all the land of Egypt. She played thus for Jacob two and three times, and he was pleased by what he heard. Joy filled his heart, the spirit of God rested on him, and he sensed the truth of her words. He bade her: Continue to play for me, for you have heartened me with all that you said."* Serach is also credited with identifying Moses as the redeemer of the Hebrew slaves. She helped Moses locate Joseph's remains and carry them out of Egypt. She is said to have settled a rabbinic dispute about whether the Reed Sea parted in the form of walls or a net: "I was there, and the water was not as a net, but as transparent windows".*** And the rabbis taught that her life was so prolonged that she entered the land of Israel and, similar to Abraham, successfully argued for the life of others. When King David's military commander, Joab, took the city Abel-Beth-Maacah, the Wise Woman of Abel-Beth-Maach** (Serach) said, "I am one of the Israelites who went down to Egypt with Jacob. I completed the count . . . the seventy souls that went down to Egypt. Do you want to kill the entire city, and also me . . . an important woman?" thereby saving the inhabitants of her town.***

The rabbis' commentaries and midrashim recognized the wisdom in the silent Serach of the Torah and gave it voice. Later exegeses present her as not only having lived hundreds of years, but having entered Gan Eden alive along with other righteous characters from Torah.

In today's world over flowing with noisy rhetoric perhaps refraining ourselves occasionally might bring us insight, wisdom and a chance to learn from the silent one, the contemporary Serach in our midst.

Temple Beth El Board of Directors Meeting December 21, 2023

- □ Bob Kimball addressed the board with ideas on how to improve our communications to members and the outside community by developing a dynamic Facebook page with pictures and narrative of all our activities. He suggested that our website may not be the best tool for this. The board will reach out to the congregation to find a tech savvy volunteer interested in doing this.

 □ Guest Elliot Katz addressed the board about activating a 3–5-year Strategic Planning Committee to build upon the
- 3–5-year Strategic Planning Committee to build upon the study that was done in 2018. The committee would look at demographics of our congregation vis a vis age spread, our current and future financial needs, as well as building maintenance needs now and long term. The board unanimously approved of this direction. He will serve on the committee and has ideas of others who could chair and serve.
- ☐ Treasurer Joel Siegal explained the setup of expanded use of our current software program Rakefet. He will be sending a hard mailing to members with detailed instructions on how to set up a member portal and validate all current profile information. Those who desire to use the same methods they have been using and are comfortable with that will still be able to do so.
- ☐ Treasurer's report indicated we are right on target with income and expenses. The Challenge Grant which ends December 31, 2023 has been extremely successful and has raised more than the target of \$20,000.
- □ Rabbi reported mostly about life cycle events especially the recent passing of beloved temple member Ruth Rubin. There are several conversions coming up and her classes continue and are well attended. There is a large span of ages in the religious school with some 10th graders and then 4th and 5th graders which presents its own set of teaching challenges. At a recent Shabbat service, she addressed the situation in Israel and provided a safe forum for members to explore their feelings on this situation.
- □ Elizabeth Lewis and Joel Siegal updated the board on where we are with the hiring of an administrative assistant. The job will be a shared position between the temple and Jewish Federation of El Paso Las Cruces. The particulars are being worked out and the job will be posted very soon.
- ☐ President Nan Rubin reported on her attendance at a zoom presentation coordinated by Chabad where Gabe Vasquez, our US Congressman, addressed the situation in Israel and his support. She also reported that the Rabbi performance evaluation committee has completed designing the survey which will be sent to the congregation shortly.
- ☐ Elizabeth Lewis was nominated and approved unanimously to fill the vacant Executive Board position of Vice President. As per the by laws she is to be the liaison

for security issues. She will be following up on arrangements for an Active Shooter Drill and other security needs for the congregation.

- □ Religious school report from Sherri Speigal and Rebecca Berkson indicated that they coordinated the Chanukkah service which was well attended. Families and students helped with the food and participated in a skit coordinated by Stefani Singer and songs with Linda Sweenie. Stefani coordinated a Chanukah party with games and treats after the service. Member Corry McKissack made a presentation including sharing Dutch cookie treats and artifacts and stories of growing up in the Netherlands during WWII. Students also made latkes from scratch. As part of a service project, students decorated signs to advertise the Camp Hope breakfast on Christmas Day. Student enrollment includes 3 middle schoolers, 2 elementary students and 5 in confirmation. Two students are leaving as their family is relocating out of state.
- □ Jeff Lewis, Mensch Club President reported that the during the car wash led by the youth group they raised \$900 from the bake sale. Part of the money raised was shared with Tutti Bambini, a children's thrift store supporting at risk children. The rest was donated directly to the temple in support of the Challenge Grant. A group of about 15-16 of the men also made a trip to the Holocaust Museum with a guided tour in El Paso followed by lunch. They continue their twice monthly breakfasts together. They will be painting several classrooms in the religious school. They will also be participating along with Social Action committee member Susan Fitzgerald in the annual Christmas Day breakfast at Camp Hope.
- ☐ Sisterhood is working on final plans for the tribute to Cheryl and Dave Decker at Shabbat Service on January 12. Food and drinks provided by Sisterhood and Mensch Club. A gift will be presented from the Board
- □ Ways and Means Report- Debbie Leyndyke and Donna Popky will coordinate a "Ginormous Yard Sale" on Sunday March 10. Their committee will be working on all the details. A flier asking for donations of goods will appear in the January Adelante. Wendee Lorbeer and Dee Cook reported that the annual Auction will take place on February 25. They are also exploring additional fundraising opportunities for later in the Spring.

ILLUMINATORS AND DIMINISHERS

I am currently reading David Brooks book *How to Know A Person: The Art of Seeing Others Deeply and Being Deeply Seen.*

What particularly captured my attention in his book is that he says there are people who are Diminishers and there are people who are Illuminators. Diminishers make others feel small and unseen. Illuminators make others feel bigger, deeper, respected, and lit up.

I would imagine we all know people in both groups. Diminishers are people who bring you down, are negative, blame others and don't take responsibility for their part in things. Illuminators are open, curious, take into account other people's feelings and thoughts and ideas and are willing to say: "I was wrong, I don't know, I am sorry.".

Even just writing about Diminishers puts me in a negative frame of mind. When I review the characteristics of an Illuminator, I feel uplifted and light.

Over the many years of working with people, I have found the best outcomes have been with people who choose to focus on what they can do rather than what they can't. There is power in focusing on the things we can control, even the smallest of things like bringing a food to someone recuperating from surgery, making a phone call telling someone you are thinking of them, or asking someone to go for a walk.

Sometimes we have to separate ourselves from folks who continue to diminish our spirits. I had an acquaintance many years ago who would only call when she wanted to complain about her husband. When I told her I would like to have a friendship with her, but would not be willing to listen to her complaints over and over again, she never called me again.

I would never want to hurt someone, or minimize their pain, but there is a tipping point for all of us when our need for expressing strong negative emotions and sadness can tumble into self-pity. Doing the same thing over and over again with no result. Listening to that can be damaging.

Everyone has times when they are feeling down and negative and hopeless and need someone to share those feelings with. But there is also a time when we need to move on.

It takes work, practice and patience to be an Illuminator, especially people we find to be difficult.

I have to regularly refresh and renew my listening skills, to hone my ability to empathize, to see people in a positive light, and also be direct without being unkind.

Reflection: It takes perseverance and willingness to train ourselves to look for the positive in other people and be their Illuminators.

Today's Practice: Who can I make feel bigger, respected and lit up?

Following is the text of the Proclamation DENOUNCING ANTISEMITISM DAY. It was read in the chambers at City Hall, in the council chambers, at 1 o'clock pm on Monday, December 4, 2023. What a Hanukkah gift for our communities! Although TBELC did not create the proclamation, we fully support it. -Rabbi Evette Lutman

Proclamation

WHEREAS, Las Cruces celebrates our Jewish friends and neighbors, and immense contributions they make to our community, city, and state; and

WHEREAS, Jewish values, culture, and contributions have helped shape the character of our nation, our state, our city, and our community; and

WHEREAS, antisemitism including harassment on the basis of actual or perceived Jewish origin, ancestry, ethnicity, identity, affiliation, or faith, remains a persistent, pervasive, and disturbing problem in contemporary American society; and

WHEREAS, the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance has promulgated the following working definition of antisemitism, which has been adopted or endorsed by 43 countries and various agencies of the United States federal government: "Antisemitism is a certain perception of Jews, which may be expressed as hatred toward Jews. Rhetorical and physical manifestations of antisemitism are directed toward Jewish and non-Jewish individuals and/or their property, toward Jewish community institutions and religious facilities"; and

WHEREAS, while antisemitic incidents mostly directly and intensely affect the Jewish community, antisemitism, like all forms of hate, threatens all new Mexicans and Las Cruces; and

WHEREAS, calls for violence against Jews in the United States and across the world,

exacerbated by recent terrorist attacks targeting Jews in Israel by Hamas, continue to undermine safety and security of Jewish New Mexicans and Las Crucens who have deep ties through friends, family, and community with the people of Israel; and

WHEREAS, in a time of increasing antisemitism, we should be vigilant in ensuring people understand and speak out against antisemitism when they hear it or see it, and that the city of Las Cruces shows support for the Las Cruces Jewish community; and

WHEREAS, as we work to create a City of Las Cruces for All, our city will continue to be a place that welcomes the Jewish people, and honors their meaningful contributions to our community, city, state and country.

NOW, THEREFORE, WE, the mayor and City Council of Las Cruces, New Mexico, do hereby proclaim Monday, December 4, 2023 as: "**DENOUNCING ANTISEMITISM DAY**"

On Monday December 4, many members of Temple Beth-El filled City Council chambers to hear a proclamation declaring December 4th to be "Denouncing Antisemitism Day in Las Cruces". The proclamation was prepared by Alevy Chabad congregants Tony and Elena Chavez and was intended to be presented at the public Hanukkah celebration on the Plaza de La Cruces on Sunday December 11th. Through no fault of our own, the city erroneously identified both Marla Cohen with the Jewish Federation of El Paso and Las Cruces, and Rabbi Evette Lutman of Temple Beth-El, as being with Chabad. We deeply regret this confusion and greatly appreciate the effort of Chabad to take this initiative on behalf of the whole Jewish community.



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
