- *Asterisks indicate that a loved one has been permanently memorialized with a plaque in the Temple sanctuary. If you are interested in acquiring a plaque for your loved one, contact the Temple office. Current TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$300. Non TBE members may purchase a plaque for \$600.



Musings: Chochmah and Celebrating Wisdom by Karen Shevet Dinah

Recently while streaming a favorite media outlet a particular phrase caught my attention. "Wisdom is not learned. It is shared." Until the first shabbat morning in January, I incessantly pondered that view thinking to myself, "no, not so!" Then during our shabbat morning services on January 6th some thirty congregants and I experienced wisdom shared, first-

i.e. chochmah appears frequently in the Hebrew Bible, particularly, and not surprisingly, in Proverbs and Ecclesiastes, both part of the wisdom literature. For example, in Exodus 35:25, during the construction of the mishkan, women's spinning skills are הכמת לב wisdom of the heart. In Proverbs 18:13 "The ears of the wise seek out knowledge". The wise are the הכמים the chochmim. On Shabbat morning, January 6, 2024 TBE's own Jill Kerr and her friend Linda Steinhardt from Congregation Beth Sholom, Providence, Rhode Island, marked their transition from "age-ing to sage-ing" by sharing part of their simchat chochmah ritual with us. We heard them read from the *sefer torah* and share their personal, yet universally significant comments on parashat shemot, the first weekly reading from the book of Exodus which details the birth of Moses. Linda and Jill wisely led us to an understanding that miracles don't just happen. They are realized through human action, in the case of the birth of Moses, the actions of the midwives. Heroism that lies as much in the commitment and actions of the ordinary person as it does in the minds of those who make the headlines.

This modern ritual, *simchat chochmah* is thought to have originated in the mid-1980's when Jewish women, members of the baby boomer generation, began aging. We realized that just as we mark birth, death, marriage and moving into young adulthood, so too, marking the transition to elderhood and our aging would be meaningful and should be celebrated. There is no prescribed format for the ritual. It is a unique and deeply personal one.

Jewish mysticism teaches that *chochmah* is one of the divine emanations in this world and it is often associated with our "right brain" activity implying that each of us has wisdom to share. On Shabbat morning, Jan. 6th, we experienced a beautiful sharing of wisdom from two midwives and sages in our midst. I invite you, as one of TBE's sages, to share your chochmah with us as a congregation. Create your own simchat chochmah, read from the Torah as an adult bar or bat mitzvah or as a

second bar or bat mitzvah celebration, often done when one turns 83. Share your words from the bimah when we read a torah portion that feels particularly significant to you. You do not have to be a temple board member, a committee member or someone in a leadership role. Just someone willing to share. We are here to support you as a sage among us.

On Civil Rights and Equality

The holiday honoring Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was just observed in January, and February celebrates

Black History month. Taking to heart the lessons of Passover when we as a people were liberated from slavery, the prominent involvement of Jews in the Civil Rights movement was a high mark demonstrating an ongoing moral commitment supporting equal justice and civil rights.

Growing up outside Boston, I was reminded of this often by my mother Barbara. She herself was very active in the local NAACP, and she was especially proud of the Jewish role that helped found the organization. My mother was inspired by Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel, who carried a Torah while marching right next to Dr. King in Selma, and she urged our temple rabbi to join him (he declined).

It was the turbulent 60s, and Boston itself was embroiled in a bitter fight over school desegregation led by Louise Day Hicks, a Boston School board member and fervent segregationist. There were constant picket lines in front of the school board offices, and my mother drove us back and forth from demonstrations to "freedom schools" in the black churches downtown.

It was during this period, that college students from around the country flocked to help Black citizens register to vote during Mississippi Freedom Summer. Half of those students were Jewish, sadly reflected when the three "civil rights workers" - James Chaney, a local black student, along with Mickey Schwerner and Andy Goodman, two Jewish boys from up north - were murdered. This was a galvanizing moment that eventually supported passage of the Voting Rights Act signed by LBJ in 1965.

Although I was too young to attend the 1963 March on Washington or go to Freedom Summer, I did become passionate about fighting racism and building racial justice. After college, I worked with Carolyn Goodman on the Foundation she set up in honor of her son Andy, and Steve Schwerner, Mickey's brother, became a good friend.

In 1990, I was a founding member of Jews for Racial and Economic Justice (JFREJ) created in part to welcome Nelson Mandela to New York City when he was released from prison. Over 1,000 people attended our welcoming Shabbat, and it was thrilling. The organization is still very active today.

But this relationship is ancient history. Much has happened over the past 60 years, and the political climate has changed radically. Despite eight years of President Obama, institutionalized racism persists in such overt

efforts as voter suppression and police brutality against black people which ignited the Black Lives Matter movement. And in a stunning development, in places like Florida and Arkansas, teaching about slavery in schools has all but become criminalized. At the same time, we are facing a rising wave of anti-Semitism threatening our own community. Last month, Rabbi Evette gave the invocation at the annual Martin Luther King Jr. breakfast here in Las Cruces. Sponsored by the Dona Ana county chapter of the NAACP, the breakfast has become an annual gathering of city officials, University administrators, county staff, and several hundred other attendees from various local business and non-profit organizations. Many members of Temple Beth-El were there, some of us sitting at the table that the rabbi had generously sponsored, and many others scattered around the room sitting at tables with their colleagues from work or friends from other groups. Throughout the morning, clusters of people were chatting, and the comradery and positive spirit supporting this event were evident throughout the room.

The African American population of Dona Ana county is statistically very small, around 2%. The Jewish population of the county is also estimated to be around 2%. Here in New Mexico, the civil rights movement that roiled the deep South and many urban areas around the country was superimposed by the Chicano Movement, reflecting local aspirations for racial equality and cultural identity.

Even so, it was very clear that the room was filled with people who were there to honor the memory of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and recognize his legacy against hatred and bigotry of all kinds. Dr. King said "we may have come a long way, but there is still an uphill climb and a far way to go." The battle against racism continues, and the battle against anti Semitism has never ended. As much as Jews stood with Dr. King, he would certainly be standing with us now.

Temple Beth El Board of Directors Meeting, January 18, 2024

In lieu of an Invocation, comments were shared about the well planned and executed celebration of the work of Cheryl and David Decker which took place the previous Shabbat.

The board unanimously welcomed new members Aaron and Rebecca Goldfarb as new members.

Treasurer Joel Siegel's report indicated that expenses are tracking well. Since an anticipated hire has not yet taken place, with the special appeal, and two large unexpected donations, we are doing well. New janitorial staff has been hired. An additional cost saving measure involves the Mensch Club offering to paint classrooms and shampoo carpeting.

Vice president Elizabeth Lewis-Olson reported there will be a security assessment and training conducted by NSIC and Homeland Security. This vital information will help us determine our needs. There will also be a choice of two Active Shooter presentations for congregants to attend coming at the end of February.

Applications for the Administrative position continue to be expected.

Sheri Spiegal and Martha Roditti will take on the responsibility of purchasing gifts for those celebrating B'nai Mitzvah and Confirmation.

The Rabbi reported she is working with Bob Kimball on updating her part of the website. Tu b'Shvat will be celebrated Sunday, January 21 with a Seder led by Linda Sweenie and Rabbi Evette along with breakout sessions with Gerie Muchnikoff doing crafts, Linda doing a song session, and the Rabbi leading a study session.

A new class on Jewish Prayer and Liturgy will begin on Wednesday evenings at 6 PM. Hebrew in a Day Marathon, otherwise known as Hebrew Boot Camp, will be held on Sunday, January 28. Registration is required. The Rabbi gave the Invocation at the MLK Breakfast at the Convention Center and was well received.

President Nan Rubin reported the progress with the Rabbi Evaluation process. Surveys are still coming in and limited interviews will take place soon. The New Mexico Jewish Community Relations Coalition for the Support of Israel has requested our endorsement. Nan will send their mission statement to the board members for review.

The Religious Practices Committee will be requesting funds to cover dry cleaning expenses for tallitot, reading

table cover, torah mantles and the repairing of sterling silver torah crowns. In addition, they recommended that torah scrolls be insured for a minimum of \$200,000. Steve Haydu and Linda Sweenie are working on a request to purchase the technology necessary to improve our accessibility for those congregants streaming or Zooming from home.

The Ways and Means Committee report indicated that many donations for An Afternoon at the Auction have been received but more are needed. The date is February 25. The Ginormous Rummage Sale will be March 10 and everyone should look for something to donate. A future event will be held December 7, 2024 when comedienne Marci Goldshlack (sister of Shari Abramowitz) will be headlining a fun event.

The Religious School Committee held a Parent Teacher meeting and among other things discussed The "Israel Corner" held by Rabbi Evette to facilitate student sharing about the impact of the current events in Israel on them. A brick for the garden will be purchased in memory of Ruth Rubin. Upcoming Family Shabbat services include Shabbat and Game Night on February 9 and Shabbat Under the Stars at White Sands on May 17. The Religious School students will also be assisting at the Ginormous Yard Sale on March 10. Discussions regarding possible connections to NIFTY, the youth group arm of the URJ, are being looked into.

The Sisterhood report included that a lovely Shabbat evening coordinated by Lynn Zeemont to honor Dave and Cheryl Decker with dinner provided by Sisterhood and beverages provided by the Mensch Club took place the previous Shabbat. The next major event will be the Second Night Seder catered by Cravings.

The Mensch Club assisted with the Camp Hope Breakfast on Christmas day as well as the get together at The Asian Buffet. They continue to hold biweekly breakfasts at area restaurants which draw about 24 people. As co-sponsors of the Shabbat to honor the Deckers, the club provided beverages as well as helped with the set up and tear down.

Being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

MLK, Jr. Breakfast

We want to thank Rabbi Lutman for an outstanding public invocation at the recent MLK, Jr. breakfast.

On Monday, January 15, 2024, about a dozen members of Temple Beth-El attended the Martin Luther King, Jr. Day breakfast at the Las Cruces Convention Center. Rabbi Lutman was invited to give the invocation to a room of more than 200 people. Echoing King's theme of justice, she used Psalm 118 for her inspiration in what seemed to me to be an interracial, interfaith and intergenerational d'var Torah.

The Rabbi spoke about opening the gates of justice for us. She went on to talk about the builders referred to in this psalm. In selecting stones to construct a solid foundation, they rejected a stone they perceived as cracked or imperfect. Yet, the psalm continues, this very stone becomes the chief cornerstone, foundation, and support upon which the entire building rests. The rabbi concluded that each of us can and must depend on the support of each other with acceptance of each other as neither flawed nor cracked.

Along with many attendees who came up to Rabbi Lutman after the program, the Social Action committee also wants to add an expression of our pride and our sincere thanks for being a wonderful public expression and representative of Temple Beth-El in our community.

Treasurer's Update

Many have asked to see the current year budget. As of December 31 we are halfway through our fiscal year and this article provides a progress update.

There was a \$8,759 deficit budget entering this year even after accounting for a then yet-to-be-determined \$25,000 "Special Assessment or Appeal" as projected income, meaning that it was up to the Board of Directors to determine how to implement the Assessment or Appeal. Without it, the Temple's budgeted deficit would have been \$33,759.

Fortunately, due to generous General Fund donations from all of you, an October 2023 donation of \$10,000 by Jean Pritchard of Mesilla NM, a December 2023 anonymous donation of \$8,000, and \$41,000 of funds (\$21,000 donated plus \$20,000 match) from what became the Special Appeal, the Temple's end-of year projection is now in the black by about \$30,000. The full budget report is attached with this month's Adelante.




