When my daughter, Morgan became Bat Mitzvah she wore a tallit that we had designed and created together, as I had done with my mother for my Bat Mitzvah. In fact, her tallit used the Atarah from that tallit. In the years that

followed, I thought about making myself a new one, rather than wearing the store bought one that I had bought in Jerusalem during college. While that one is beautiful, it no longer felt as personally significant to me. This year, I finally got around to making the one pictured above. The fabric I found blooms boldly with multicolored flowers and is decorated with an Atarah that I embroidered using a design I found on the website "Sew Jewish". It reads in Hebrew "Olam Kesed Yiboneh", and in English, a translation "We will build this world with Love." The tzitzit have the strand of blue and are tied, as is the tradition, with a series of wrappings that signify the name of G-d. Everything about it expresses who I strive to be and brings me the joy that I want to feel when I pray. As we prepare to enter the new year, consider who you are, who you want to be. Do you have a tallit that expresses that? Would you like to? I would be honored to help you create one that is as unique and special as you. I offer this free of charge (excepting the cost of any materials) as a personal mitzvah.

I would like to close this article with some somewhat related thoughts. Recently, I was behind a man who wore a shirt that read "Fear G-d, not man". While I understand the message conveyed, it was rather in opposition to my own thoughts. I reject the notion that our actions should be guided by fear of the Almighty but rather should be guided by gratitude for the world that G-d has created for us and the desire to continue the work of positive creation. Build this world with love so that we may not fear mankind. It is not an easy ask and I struggle daily.

#### Farewell, Rabbi Larry Karol

It was the summer of 2011. I didn't know you yet, but you had recently joined Temple Beth-El Las Cruces as the new Rabbi. I had arrived in Las Cruces from the San Francisco Bay Area to be with my father and brother and to meet with you because my mother had just passed away on August 8. You helped us plan the funeral. During that same week, I also met Alfred (Fred)Torres. Little did I know where that meeting would lead me. As I got to know Fred during 2011-2012, he asked me to marry him, and I accepted. We had decided that I would move to Las Cruces at the end of the 2012 school year, and we planned for an August wedding. On another one of my frequent visits, we attended a Friday night service and talked with you afterwards about marrying us. You agreed, and we met with you to plan the wedding ceremony. I told you that I wanted to walk down the aisle to the song "Marry Me" by the band Train, and you said that you would learn it and play it live. I didn't realize what a talented musician and singer you were and was so pleased with your performance at the wedding. It was beautiful. In the summer of 2013, we moved into our new home and asked you to give a blessing at our open house. You also blessed the mezuzah. A few months later, in December 2013, my father passed away. Again, you were there for us, helping us plan his funeral, burial, and Shiva minyan. After Fred and I joined the temple, my involvement led me to the Adult Education Committee, the Jewish Food & Folk Festival team, Nominating Committee, Temple Board, Board Secretary, and President. You helped guide me along the way, providing support and friendship. We also worked on grants together with a team of dedicated temple members, bringing in great Jewish speakers, performers, musicians, scholars, and a chef. Our grant team also collaborated with the drama department at NMSU to write a play that portrayed the history of the Las Cruces Jewish community and the beginnings of Temple Beth-El. The production was performed live in the NMSU theater to a full house. You were extremely instrumental in the success of this production and even participated musically on stage. Overall, you helped to hone my leadership skills as my Rabbi and as my friend.

You also showed a lot of empathy and support for Fred during his various surgeries and times of recovery. You took your role as Rabbi seriously and cared about everyone with whom you came in contact.

You will be remembered for your talents, scholarship, musicianship, social activism, humanitarianism, and friendship, leaving a void in the heart of this community. You left this earth too soon and will be sincerely missed.

#### **Security**

During the past few months we have noticed the front door being left open prior to Temple events.

With the daily violence in our nation, this cannot happen. On all Temple events, we ask the front door and ALL doors remain closed. We also ask that somebody from that event be appointed to guard the door and allow entrance into the Temple.

That person should be at the door for 10 minutes after the event has started and lock the door. The person should wear the panic button device during the event.

The cost of providing security for the Temple is mounting. For those times we don't provide security, we ask our congregation to take security very seriously.

We are thankful to live in an accepting and empathetic area. Yet to assume a tragic situation cannot occur here is incorrect. Let's all take security seriously and to continue to enjoy our lives, family, and friends.

### Board of Trustees's Meeting August 21, 2025

The August Board of Trustees meeting was called to order at 6:14 pm on August 21, 2025. A quorum was in attendance for voting.

Javier Diaz of Las Cruces Investigations and Security, and Brad, the new Director of Operations, provided a report and a new contract for 2025-2026. Cost is similar to 2024-2025. They offered a self-defense and security best practices class for the congregation (warrior mindset and stop the bleed). The board voted to approve and fund the class, and will alert the congregation about dates/times and suggested donation.

In her President's Report, Diane Fleishman relayed that she will move to Pennsylvania to be closer to family, likely in November 2025. Nominations for her replacement will take place in executive session at a future meeting. Jeff Lewis, VP, will remain chair of the Mensch Club to continue leading their critical work for the temple.

Linda Sweenie reported on good attendance at Shabbat services, forthcoming plans for High Holy Days, progress on updating all pages of the website, and streamlining administrative operations.

Mark Singer, Treasurer, reported progress on outstanding dues from 2024-2025. A discussion ensued on whether major gifts can or should be anticipated and integrated into earning projections. The Ways and Means Committee has volunteers to run events. New business included pursuing a grant from FEMA for security, the future of the TBE website, and updates on buildings and grounds. After an executive session, the board voted affirmatively on membership applications for 2 applicants.

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#### A Temple Beth-El Sisterhood Miracle

The Temple Beth-El Sisterhood was started in about 1954. The first President was Ethel Krepps who was a porcelain painter and artist, and a member of the Klein family. Our first meeting was probably at someone's house since there was no Temple. There was a lot of interest in the sisterhood and if I can remember we were very active starting projects to assist the Temple and also doing work in the community. If you have any records of the Sisterhood, I would like to have them to archive them at the New Mexico State University Library where I have starting archiving Temple Beth-El's history.

This is a story of one of the projects that the Temple Beth-El Sisterhood undertook, that has probably long been forgotten. I worked for White Sands Missile Range for 37 years and had several different jobs there during that time. At one point I became a Logistician (this is someone that takes care of equipment and supplies and ensures that they get to the right place). I had a very non traditional job for a woman. I managed aircraft and automotive supplies and that included inventories of major items (i.e., commercial, tactical vehicles and Army Aircraft). At that time, women were not doing this so I came under a lot of examination by higher level Army and Navy officers concerning my performance. I received many awards including the Secretary of the Army's award for outstanding performance.

On a Sunday afternoon I received a call from the Pentagon, requesting that I go to Vietnam, because they were having a lot of problems with a contractor who was not meeting the requirements of the contract. There were three people in the Personnel records who had the experience and expertise in this area. Supplies were not getting out to the soldiers in the field, and there were a lot of complaints from the Commanders. At first, I said, "Is this a joke?" and I was assured this was serious government business. I told the caller that I did not think I would take this job, but he insisted that I give it some thought. My husband, a 25 year Navy guy, asked who had called. When I told him, he said "that is the dumbest thing I ever heard of." I reminded him of his service around the world, while I in essence was taking care of home and children. The next day I called the person from the Pentagon, and accepted the assignment.

I got to Vietnam on a plane with 109 men and me. I landed at Tonsonute Air Base in Vietnam at 3:00 AM and called my contact, a Colonel who was very upset and did not know if I was a man or woman since my orders always spelled my name as Francis F. Williams, which suggested I would be a man. The

spelling "Frances" is for a woman. I reported to duty at Long Binh Vietnam, assigned to a group of five men and me and started our work. This was in November of 1967. Three weeks later the TET Offensive broke out with the North Vietnam Army attacking the South. I was waiting for my bus to go to Long Binh from Saigon, and while waiting I heard shots being fired at me from a Catholic Church by two North Vietnam solders. An Officer ran out of the BOQ, grabbed my hand and we went into the building. I told my rescuer that they must have known I was Jewish.

I traveled to Long Binh, 25 kilometers away from Saigon, and on that base was the 24th Evacuation Hospital. Being bored after working about 10 hours a day, I went to the hospital where the wounded were being brought in from the field. I asked if I could do something and they gave me an assignment as a letter writer and a gofer. One day, someone brought cookies into the ward I was working on, and the soldiers just loved them. I wrote to the Temple Beth-El Sisterhood and asked if they could send cookies to me for distribution to the wounded soldiers. They responded immediately, and there was even a story about this in the Sun News (This story with pictures of Sisterhood making the cookies appeared in the Sun News and at the Exhibit at the Library in Las Cruces) The first cookies arrived but had not been packaged well and they were crumbled. After I reported this to the Sisterhood they were wrapped separately and were great. Almost every week, I got packages from the Sisterhood with the cookies, and as I distributed them, these wounded soldiers were so grateful for the gift and I always told them where they came from and some stories about the Sisterhood. I became known as the Cookie Lady, and even though the patients were transferred to Japan for stabilization of their wounds the new patients were always so grateful for this gift. Yes, this was a Mitzvah of the Sisterhood. One that has never been told before, except when it was shown at the Branigan Library (the old one) and the picture of those making the cookies. There are so many stories to tell about the Sisterhood from past years, and as I come across them in my papers which I am donating to the Rio Grande Collection at the NMSU Library, I will keep you posted. G-d bless you my Jewish Sisters.





